Favourable Results at the Deloro-Wright

Substantial Buildings Built to Carry on Work All Winter

Of the many mining companies formed recently to develop properties in south-eastern Deloro township, one of the most active is the Deloro-Wright Syndicate. Adjoining the Concordia mine to the south, the syndicate has under its control a group of claims on which favourable surface results have been obtained.

New substantial camp buildings have been erected—bunkhouse, cookery, and workshops—so that work may be continued throughout the winter. Deloro-Wright is reached by an extension of the Concordia road that is at present in poor shape for travel but is the only means by which supplies can be taken in to the camp.

Increased Recovery at Dome Mine for September

Despatches from Toronto last week say that improvement in grade of ore handled allowed Dome Mines, Limited, to recover \$647,175 from 45,800 tons milled during September, it was reported last week. This represents an increase of \$70,487 over the same period a year ago.

Production for the first nine months of the current year is trailing the 1935 period, the total being \$5,298,581 for the year to date, against \$5,480,000 last year.

Further Expansion at Canada Power Co.

Report for Quarter Ending Sept. 30th Shows Continued Increase in Power Business in North

In the report sent to shareholders for the quarter ending Sept. 30th, 1936, B. V. Harrison, vice-president and general manager reviews the continued expansion and service of the Canada Northern Power Corporation. Mr. Harrison says, in part:—

"The continued growth of the business secured by your company is reflected in the following comparative figures showing the gross and net earnings of the company for the twelve months ended August 31st, 1936, and those of the corresponding period of the previous year:

"The past quarter has been a period of exceptional activity in the most of the camps served by the company, particularly in Northern Quebec.

"In the Cadillac area, contracts have been entered into with three new mining customers, i.e., Bouscadillac Gold Mines, Limited, whose property lies immediately west of the property of Thompson-Cadillac Mines; Central Cadillac Gold Mines, Limited and Canadian Gold Operators, Limited, both of whose properties are situated east of O'Brien Gold Mines, Limited.

"To each of these properties short feeders are being built, and service will be commenced shortly.

"In the Rouyn-Noranda area, the mill at Stadacona Rouyn Mines has been completed. Operations will be commenced shortly resulting in an appreciable increase in power load.

"To the west of the Rouyn area, recent diamond drill discoveries have stimulated activity in the Boischatel camp, and an expansion programme is under way at the Alderman.

"In the Kirkland Lake camp, operations are being resumed at several properties on which considerable work had been accomplished prior to closing down several years ago. These include: Ritchie Gold Mines and King Kirkland Gold Mines, and power is being supplied to both these properties.

"In the same section of the camp, Morris Kirkland Mines has completed the construction of their mill, which will be in operation shortly.

"In the Porcupine area several of the larger mines are adding to the scope of their operations, resulting in increased power requirements, and a new customer, D. Sanis Gold Mining Company, was connected with our lines.

"The increase in the number of domestic and commercial customers in the new town of Val d'Or, Quebec, has resulted in your company opening up a new merchandise store at that point, bringing the total up to ten."

Ankerite Output for September, \$185,741

Profit of \$88,242 for Month. Group of Claims Acquired in Deloro.

Production at the Buffalo Ankerite for September was \$185,741, according to an announcement by R. P. Kinkel, manager, this week. Of this sum, \$88,242 was profit. Tonnage run through the mill during the month was 23,535, of an average grade of \$7.89, somewhat higher than usual.

Underground work at the Buffalo Ankerite continues to produce new ore and reserves, broken ore in the stopes and development is keeping well ahead of production.

A property recently acquired by the Buffalo Ankerite, a group of claims in central Deloro township, near McKay Lake is to be used for supplying gravel needed at the mine. Mr. Kinkel said yesterday. Exploration may also be done at the same time the gravel is being taken from the surface, but this is not the primary purpose in obtaining the property.

The particulars relating to costs have been compiled from the annual printed reports of the various mining companies and the total costs per ton should not be interpreted as being generally comparable as depreciation and certain charges including those for pre-development, exploration, marketing, taxation, etc., are often treated differently and may or may not be included in the total. The fact that some of the mines listed below commenced milling for the first time in 1935 should also be recognized.

Crew Working at Galore Mine, Deloro

Work Preparatory to Diamond Drilling is Being Carried on. Buildings in Good Shape.

Surface work at Galore Gold Mines Limited, owners of one of the largest tracts of land in active Deloro township, is going ahead steadily. J. C. Mangan of Toronto, told The Advance last week. Under the direction of A. Stewart and Goodwin Davis, a crew of eight men is doing the work preparatory to diamond drilling.

Buildings on the property have been put into good shape now and everything is set for the arrival of colder weather. Operations will be continued throughout the winter. Mr. Mangan said, and diamond drilling will be begun as soon as possible. The job of tracing a number of veins that have already been exposed at the eastern side of the property on the east-west strike is coming along well.

Funds being used in the present development of the property have been subscribed privately.

Gillies Lake Porcupine Encounters \$35,000 Ore

Highest Grade of Ore Yet Found at Property. Crosscut at the 800-Ft Level Recently Cut a Very Interesting Break. Other Interesting Information from the Gillies Porcupine.

The highest grade of ore ever found at the Gillies Lake Porcupine mine was uncovered this week as work was going on in 310 east stope. Two hundred pounds of this ore was found to contain \$3,500 in gold. That is at the rate of \$35,000 in gold to the ton. While some of this ore can be taken out immediately, a large por-

tion will be mixed with the ore in the stope, an official of the mine told The Advance yesterday. A large portion of the ore being milled at present is coming from this stope.

The cross-cut on the 800-foot level recently cut a "very interesting" break, it has been learned. This is now being checked and results will be announced soon.

Official Report on the Preston East Dome Mines

The following is official information on Preston East Dome Mines Ltd. over the signature of L. I. Hall, secretary:

"D. G. H. Wright, general manager, and D. J. Ludgate, superintendent, report favourable progress in all phases of mine development and construction. Hydro power has been turned on at the mine, and the new electrical plant will shortly be operating to extend shaft sinking and the conduct of underground work. This will considerably speed up general work. The management has disposed of the steam plant used previously for development through the No. 1 shaft, at a very favourable figure, as it will not further be required.

"Construction work on the new complete mining plant for No. 2 shaft is being pushed with all possible speed. The new headframe is near completion and the 5-compartment shaft is being concreted to a depth of 40 feet. To date the development from the old No. 1 shaft has more than confirmed drilling results of earlier in the year."

Signs for Ferguson Highway as Number Eleven Highway

New Liskeard, Oct. 15—(Special to The Advance)—Work of designating that the main north road in future is to be known as No. 11 Highway of the province of Ontario continues steadily northward. Signs bearing the number and the coat of arms of the province are being erected at prominent points and this job has reached past New Liskeard in its northward progress. While the road was christened Ferguson highway when it was formally opened at Temagami by Hon. William Finlayson, then Minister of Lands and Forests, and has been known by that name ever since, no signs confirming this event were erected in the district. The present work will continue north to the end of the road.

QUEBEC YIELDS UP HER MINING RICHES

Quebec stands as the second Province in Canada in the production of gold, producing some 470,471 fine ounces, valued at the sum of \$16,555,874.00 for the year 1935.

As far back as one hundred and thirteen years ago Quebec produced gold. The production, however, consisted only of the small quantities recovered in the treatment of the lead and zinc ores of the Notre-Dame-des-Anges district and from the gravels of the Chaudiere River.

After gold was found at Kirkland Lake, Ontario, in 1911, men pushed their canoes up the rivers which ran north instead of south and finally found themselves on Lake de Montigny in the Province of Quebec, located the district which now holds the Siscoe, Greene Stabell, Sullivan, Lamaque and other mines. Thus saw the first discovery of the great gold-bearing deposits of Northwestern Quebec. Then came the Great War. In 1921, Edmond Horne staked the mineral showing which afterwards became Noranda Mines, Limited, the great copper-gold producer of Quebec.

The staking of Noranda Mines riveted the attention of the world on Northwestern Quebec, and created another great mining rush. For hundreds of miles east from the Ontario-Quebec boundary, men pushed their canoes up and down the slow streams of Northern Quebec and across its flat lying lakes, hunting for copper and gold.

and discovery after discovery was recorded. The activity resulted in serious interest being taken in the gold deposits round Lake de Montigny which had been staked in 1911, and they emerged from the coma into which the Great War had plunged them.

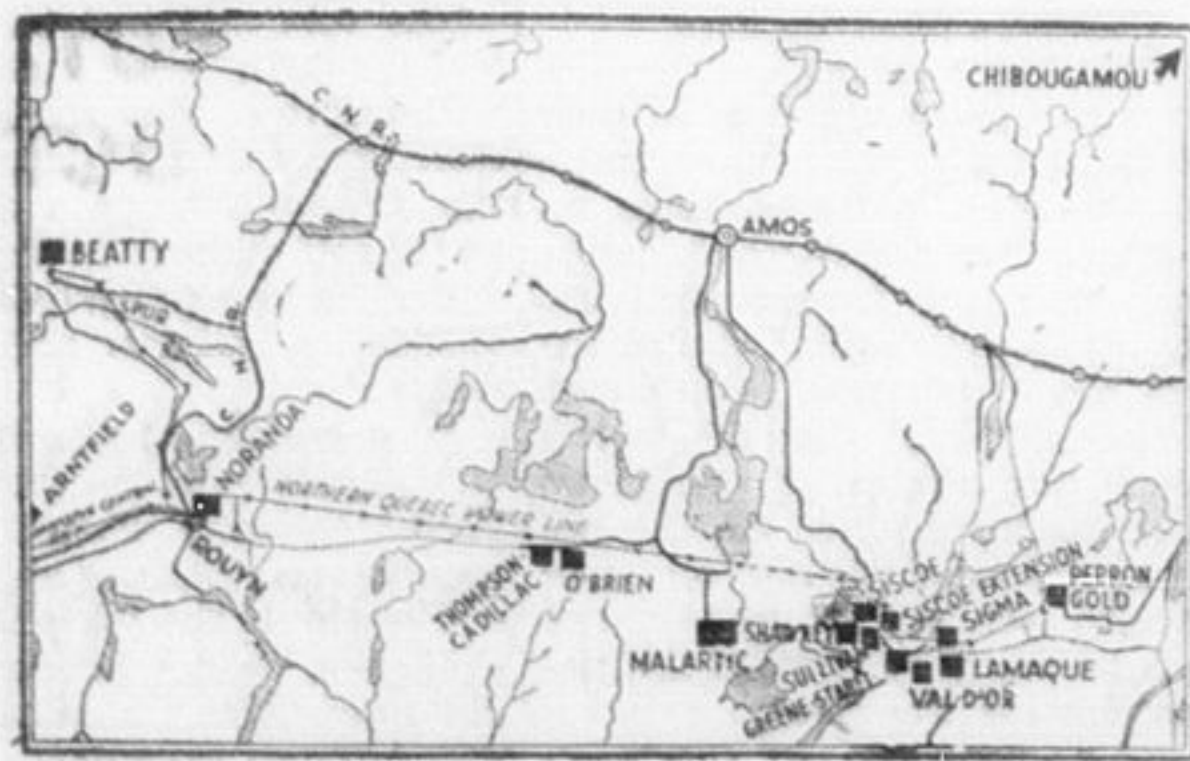
