

Fox Killed with Stone in South Porcupine Yard

Harold Helmer Proves a Good Shot Saturday Night. Arrangements for Use of High School at South Porcupine Satisfactory to All. Other South Porcupine and Dome News.

An arrangement, satisfactory to all parties, has been made concerning the use of the High School hall for dances, etc. At a meeting held on Monday in the town hall two delegates from each organization in town that has been privileged to use the hall during the past years met the High School Board. Next Sunday (24th) is the Silver Jubilee of the United Church in South Porcupine. As has been noted before in this column the first minister here, after the church was built will be here on Sunday to take both morning and evening services. It is the earnest wish of Dr. Fraser and the congregation that all "old-timers, irrespective of creed, who can possibly attend this jubilee celebration, will do so.

Any (and there are many) in Timmins who were present when this church was opened are extended a very cordial invitation to come and once more meet those old-timers who helped to keep alive the spirit of Godliness here in the old days, and upon whose efforts the present community has been built.

Police Court News

A case of reckless driving at South Porcupine came up for hearing. The driver pleaded not guilty. He said that the truck into which he ran was parked on the proper side of the road but that blinding lights from another car made him misjudge his distance—\$10 and costs.

A young chap who has been in trouble before is in again. He had had a drink or two and in a fit of temper had kicked at the door of the jail, refused to go home when told to do so by the police, and finally assaulted a young policeman. 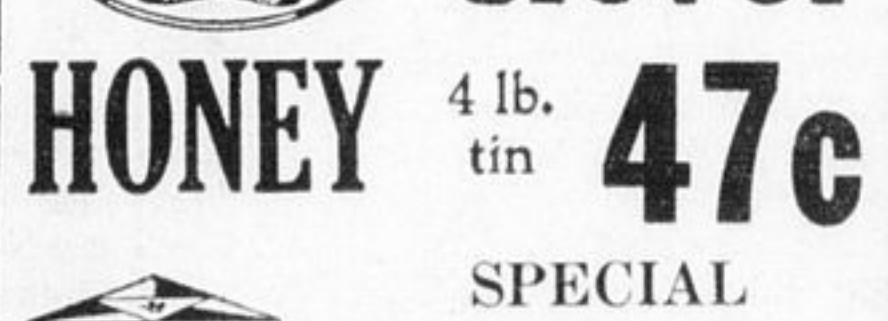

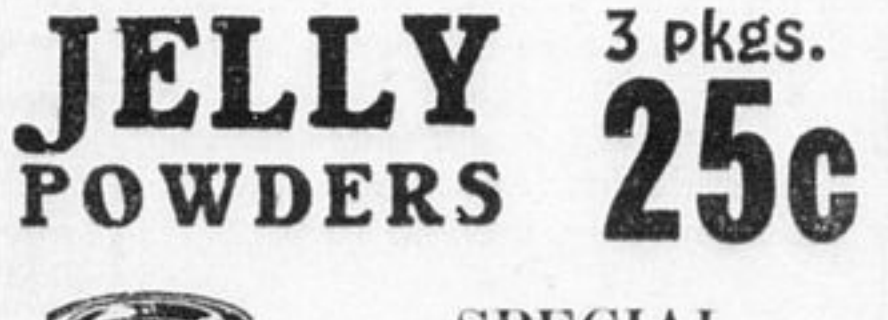

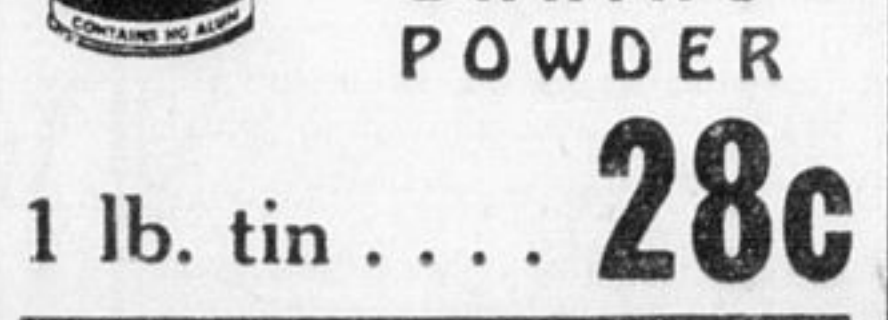
