CANADA-AUSTRALIA TRADE
 (Sydney Morning Herald)
 "Canada wants more Australian goods. She is more interested in your country now than she has ever been before," said Colonel L. M. Cosgrove, senior Canadian Trade Commissioner in Australia, who returned yesterday by the Aorangi, after a trip through Canada.
 "We in Canada took about 15,000 tons of Australian dried fruits last year," he said. "We could have taken far more, but our orders could not be filled. The same applies to canned fruits."
 Colonel Cosgrove said that the headquarters of the Canadian Trade Commission would now be in Sydney, and not in Melbourne. The Sydney office would cover the business for New South Wales and the Federal Territory.
