E. E. Campbell Dies In Toronto Hospital

Mine Engineer Well Known in the North. In Timmins Hospital for Some Months

E. E. Campbell, mining engineer who has been well known in Northern Ontario, British Columbia and United States mining industries most of his life, died in Toronto on Monday afternoon, following a long illness.

He had been in St. Mary's hospital here for some months but was moved to Toronto General for another operation. This was performed last Tuesday but his condition became rapidly worse. Born in Prince Edward Island more than fifty years ago, Mr. Campbell took his master of science and mining engineering degrees at McGill University. He had been associated as assistant manager with Granby Consolidated, was general superintendent of Verde United, held positions with the Homestake mine in South Dakota and with Dominion Copper in British Columbia.

How Mining Research Was Formed. About four years ago he formed the kind of company that had been a dream of his for many years—Mining Research Corporation, a company whose chief object was to see that shareholders in mining companies got their money's worth in scientific and practical exploration and development.

He always had both feet on the ground. Harris Lumber, an associate of Mr. Campbell's for some years, told The Advance yesterday. That idea of having skilled management right from the beginning of a mining proposition was Mr. Campbell's own system. He lived to see Mining Research well established in its field. Recent work of the company has had to do with Polaris and Mineral Estates in the Porcupine field.

Mrs. Campbell was in Timmins during most of her husband's illness and accompanied him on the recent trip to Toronto. Their only son is a student of the Royal Military College, Kingston. A second son died in a mining accident at Kirkland Lake a year or so ago.

Valuable Aid Given by Life Insurance

Particularly Evident During Depression, Says the New President of National Life Assurance Co.

H. R. Bain, new president of the National Life Assurance Company of Canada, at the annual meeting of the company, held in Toronto on Wednesday, announced the new board of directors for the company, as follows: President, H. R. Bain; vice-president, Robert Fennell, K.C.; Col. the Hon. Herbert A. Bruce, M.D., lieutenant-governor of Ontario; Hon. Eric Werge Hamber, lieutenant-governor of British Columbia; Senator David O. L'Esperance; A. H. Beaton, K.C.; Allan A. Aitken, of Montreal, a brother of Lord Beaverbrook; Denton Massey, M.P., and Fraser D. Reid.

Mr. Bain, in addressing the meeting, said that it was his first public appearance as the president of a life assurance company and that he appreciated the contribution of life insurance, he went on to say, has been particularly apparent during the depression period from which we are just emerging.

substantial economies have now been effected.

Mr. Bain said that, with the exception of the company's head office building occupied entirely by the company itself, the company had no real estate and no mortgages in its investment portfolio. The annual report showed an increase in assurance in force and in premium and investment income, accomplished with substantial savings in expenses and contributed to by a marked decrease in lapsed and surrendered policies.

Some of the figures in the company's statement may be summarized as follows: Total assurances in force increased by nearly a million dollars to \$56,324,000; New Assurances issued and placed and assurances revived were in excess of \$8,000,000; premium income increased to \$1,597,000; cash payments to policyholders, beneficiaries and annuities totalled \$1,150,000; policyholders' reserves increased by over \$350,000 to \$10,279,000; total assets increased to \$12,035,000; total receipts exceeded total disbursements by over \$300,000.

Think Kirkland Girl Now Out of Danger

Remand to be Asked To-day in Case Against Ansara

Word from Kirkland Lake last night was to the effect that the doctors believed that Miss Helvi Mutka, who was shot through the abdomen last Friday morning at an early hour in the T. Elies apartments at the rear of the Smart Set Dress Shop, Kirkland Lake, is now out of danger. The critical third day in such cases, where the big danger is peritonitis, had been passed safely and the young lady seems to be on the way to recovery. She will not be in condition to be questioned to-day, or maybe for several days, and so it is

expected that a remand will be asked for by the crown when the case against Harry Ansara is called in police court at Kirkland Lake to-day. Ansara is held at Kirkland Lake on a charge of wounding, with intent to murder, and also with being in possession of a revolver without a permit, and it is thought that the bail will be very high if bail is granted in the case, until the young lady is able to appear and testify in the case.

In Kirkland Lake it is said that Miss Mutka gave the police a statement when it was not known whether she would recover or not. This statement is reported as saying that there had been a drinking party and she had told Ansara that she intended to go back to Toronto. Ansara went out and returned with a gun, which she asked him to give her. She had her hand on the gun when it discharged. She did not think that she got the gun from him before it was fired, but thinks both of them had their hands on it at the time.

When Ansara saw that the girl was hurt in one story says that he picked her up in his arms and went out to take her to a doctor, but another witness tells of seeing the girl run out of the building and collapse and Ansara then picking her up. When the police picked up Ansara and the girl, the man's right
