"The policyholders and shareholders of this and other companies," said Mr. Bain, "have had to suffer through the reduction in earnings occasioned by what were, in many cases, unnecessary defaults. That this policy of repudiation on the part of borrowers was a short-sighted one, was evident, particularly so in the case of governmental and municipal bodies. It is gratifying to report that, notwithstanding the fresh defaults which have occurred in Alberta during the past year, and the resulting depression of the market value of all Western securities, the market value of the company's holdings has increased to a point where the investment reserve is more than sufficient to take care of the depreciation in market value, as compared to book value of its securities."

"This improvement," the president went on, "is continuing day by day and market values at the moment are materially higher than at the end of the year. The investment reserve now maintained by the company must not therefore be considered as being permanently withdrawn from the company's surplus funds. With the prospect of final adjustment of the principal defaults in Ontario municipalities and with the undeniable improvement in general economic conditions, we are satisfied that much of this reserve will later be released for the benefit of

policyholders' surplus account." To hasten this, Mr. Bain announced. the directors had suspended the payment of dividends to shareholders and had transferred to the shareholders' account in respect of the 1936 operations no portion of the surplus funds to which it was entitled from the participating policyholders' account.

In 1936, when dividends were paid, total expenses of all kinds decreased by nearly ten per cent, and further

effected.

Mr. Bain said that, with the exception of the company's head office building occupied entirely by the company itself, the company had no real estate and no mortgages in its investment portfolio. The annual report showed an increase in assurance in force and in premium and investment income, accomplished with substantial savings in expenses and contributed to by a marked decrease in lapsed and

surrendered policies. Some of the figures in the company's statement may be summarized as follows: Total assurances in force increased by nearly a million dollars to \$56,324,000; New Assurances issued and placed and assurances revived were in excess of \$8,000,000; premium income increased to \$1,597,000; cash payments to policyholders, beneficiaries and annuities totalled \$1,150,000; policyhoicers' reserves increased by over \$350,000 to \$10,279,000; total assets increased to \$12,035,000; total receipts exceeded total disbursements by over \$300,000.
