Late word from Kirkland Lake says that Frank Bowman and Wiley Millard, who were injured when struck by a motor car on Monday night while they were walking behind a sleigh in which they had been members of a sleighing party, will be confined to hospital for six or eight weeks, according to the doctors. **Second Picketing of Stores Yesterday**

Signs Carried as Last Week, but Nobody Appeared to Pay Any Attention.

Three Timmins stores, Sam Bucovetsky, I. K. Pierce, and Marshall-Ecclesiere, were yesterday picketed for the second Wednesday afternoon. Signs carried by six picketers asked Timmins people not to shop on Wednesday afternoons at the three places because of the Wednesday afternoon closing by-law now being contested by the three firms in the Supreme Court of Ontario at Toronto.

Literature distributed to passers-by linked the retail clerks' association with the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers that has a membership drive on in the Porcupine. Action of the three firms in keeping their places of business open on Wednesday afternoon was said to be "a menace to the welfare of the retail clerks," according to the circulars distributed.

The three firms involved believe the by-laws passed by the council closing dry goods, hardware, and furniture stores on Wednesday afternoon are invalid. Summonses were served on them last week and at Tuesday's police court, as will be seen elsewhere in this issue, hearing of the case was adjourned for two weeks, pending the decision of the Supreme Court.

**Lindberghs Reported Sight-seeing in Italy**

Still 980 Unemployed Here

Not as Many Jobs Open in January as in December.

Although there are 980 people in Timmins who are registered at the employment office as unemployed and who have reported recently to ask for work, the placement of men and women through the government agency here has continued at a good pace.

Not as many people found work in January as in December. During the first month of the year 553 jobs were found; in the last month of 1936 there were 725 jobs located.

**Need Pulp Cutters**

Greatest demand is for pulp cutters and lumbermen—bushmen. There are still jobs open at Kapuskasing and Iroquois Falls for this type of experienced worker. One hundred and twenty-seven were placed in the bush in January, while during the previous month 127 found work there.

Municipal work gave 193 jobs last month.

The figure for "active unplaced applicants" as shown above, now stands at 980. Last month it was 766, and in January 1936 it was 635. This may not be taken to mean that the numbers of unemployed in Timmins has increased in that proportion, although there has undoubtedly been an increase since last month. One other factor that enters into the "active unplaced" figure is that the government bureau is being more widely used by both employers and job-seekers than ever before. This naturally leads to a greater number of names being carried in the active files.
