## Crawford Stars as 'Shore Beats Hargreaves 5 to 2

### "Best Sportsman on Kirkland Ice" Leads Lake Shore Team to Seventh Victory in Gold Belt Loop.

Kirkland Lake, Feb. 8. (Special to The Advance) Johnny Crawford, the best sportsman on local ice, embarked on a personal field day here on Friday to add 12 points to his scoring total with three goals and one assist as Lake Shore Blue Devils took a 5-2 decision from Wright-Hargreaves Miners here Friday.

Large John, who always stands barked after the toughest game to "shake" with his opponents (that salutation was just as sincere as the loss to Red Flyers early in the season as it has been for wins) was head man in Lake Shore's big periods at each end of the contest.

In between, Freddy Ingram, the defenceman who can show most forwards a trick or two in skating speed and who acknowledges no peer in the practise of "whistling bullet shots at small targets, popped in a pair for the losers.

His mark was equalled by Leo Lamoureux, who is making up for lost time at Lake Shore's second centre, on a pair of defence-assisted centres.

Was Good Game It was a good game, hurt in the late stages by a charge on the referee and a positive rush of penalties as tempers frayed, but maintaining its exciting pace throughout.

Crawford got unselfish support from front-liners for his first two goals which came while fans were settling in their

stamping stands, the first one indeed coming while many of the "faithful" were still filling in.

Crawford was in perfect position at the goalmouth for both goals. He took Olliver's pass from the side for the first one and on the second passed to Grivel and hustled to the payoff spot for the return to trim Conway all the way and Conway played a standout game all night for the Miners.

Lamoureux's third goal of the period came from "Red" Wright's pass with Crawford in there too, as moral support perhaps.

Ingram's famed backhand was blocked just at the end of the first period when he broke clean from a power play on which the switch was thrown when Young was waved off a leave 'Hargreaves short-handed.

The big ex-Campbellford Maroon made no mistake when he got his next chance. He flipped a pass to Roberts as he passed the blue line, Roberts angled nicely to the side of the net and slipped back a pass which gave Ingram the unguarded side of the net for a target.

Bill Durnan had a gasping good time of it a moment later when Ingram whizzed in and did a back pivot just about at the crease as he wheeled for a possible pass. The Durnan was a bit out of his protected territory and the Ingram rearguard checked him to the ice with a good deal of bounce, for a loss of breath, but no goal.

The Duncanties' second goal came when Grivel was off for slashing. Ingram got just inside the blue line and fired one that fairly smoked to its resting place in the off corner of the net.

At this stage Wright-Hargreaves second line was particularly effective pitted against Lake Shore's firsts with a checking game which rocked back the Blue on their heels.

Armstrong's penalty in the third period was the period for action. Once the red light went on, a very tardy flash after the goal had been piled up for quite a spell as such things go, and Hargreaves claimed a goal that "Buck" Dempsey had pried the puck past Durnan's foot which was holding it against the post. It wasn't allowed.

Then Durnan caught one and turned into his net for the throw. Hargreaves claims he carried the puck over the goal line in his own line as he made that toss and that he faked it into the bargain and roared for a penalty shot. It was just after that when the celebrated mob scene was staged with a Roberts-Vair start.

Crawford and Olliver repeated their first-period act a minutes or so later with a nice pass pattern inside the blue line and Lamoureux got the game's final goal.

In the late stages of the period there was a personal feud between Young and Wright. Wright slashed Young over the backs of the legs once and on Young rushes after that, though looked imminent but it didn't break.

For Wright-Hargreaves Conway in goal played a nice game. Dudgeon was good up front and Ingram scintillated on defence while the winners featured Crawford, Lamoureux and the front Lake shore: goal, Durnan, defence, Crawford, Milton; centre, Olliver; wings, Grivel, Mitchell; alternates, Wright, Lamoureux, Wilkes, Chipman, Armstrong.

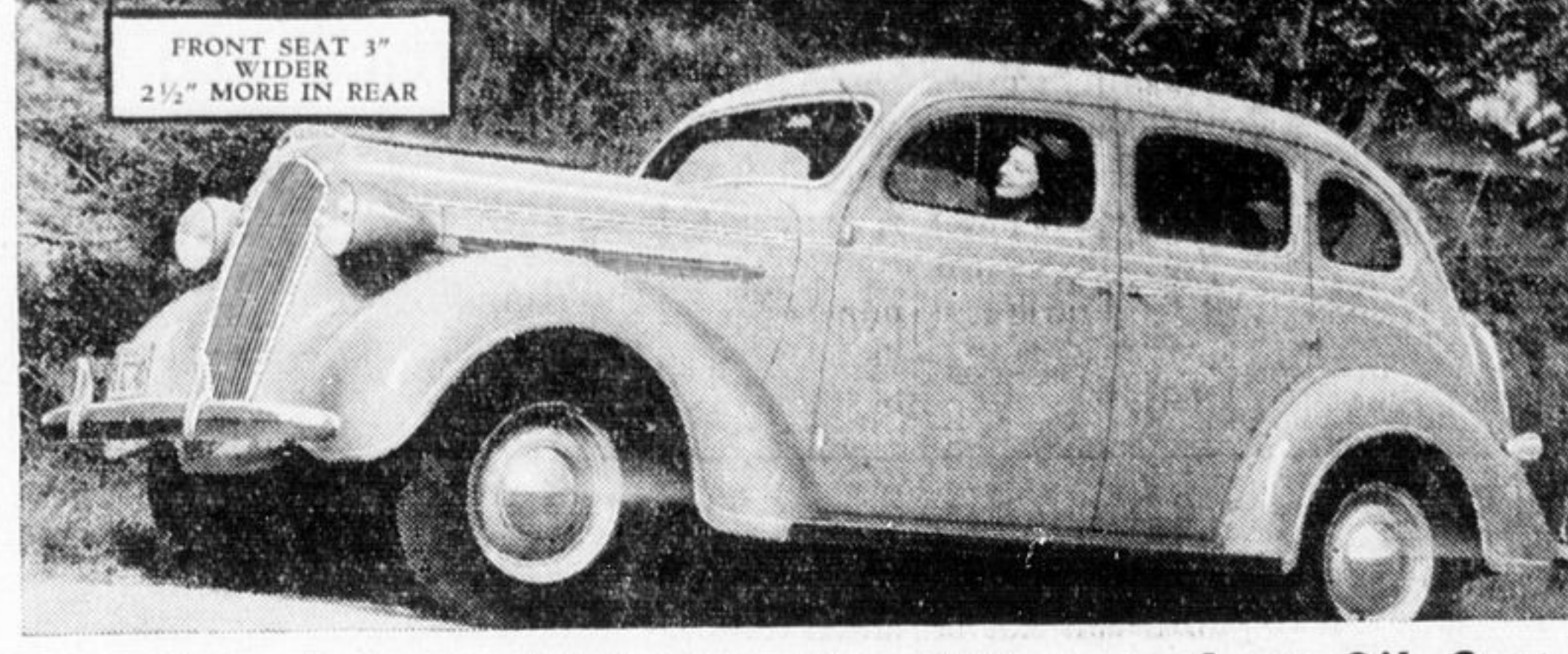
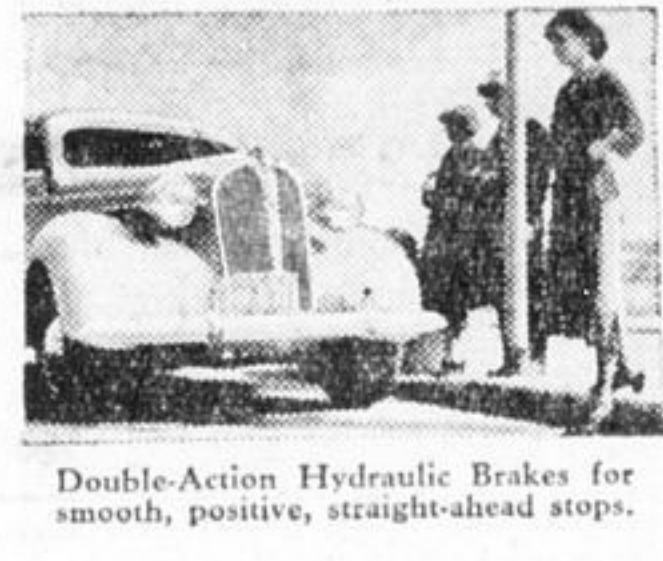

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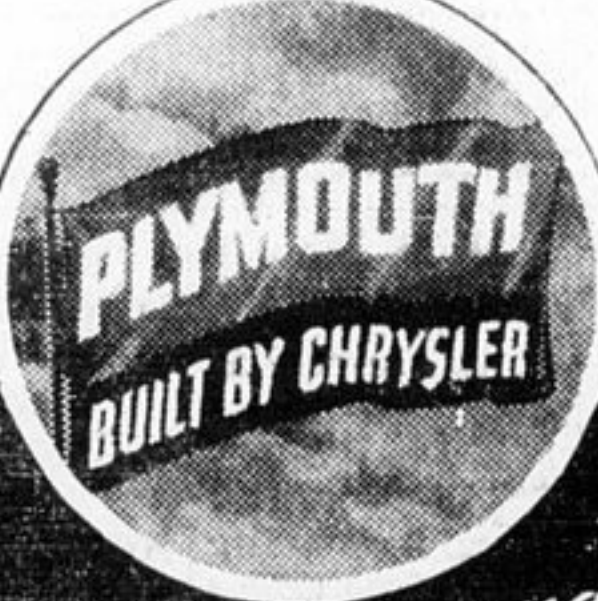

## Observe Wedding Jubilee

Brother of Timmins Man Celebrates Fifty Years of Married Life.

Cobalt, Feb. 8th, 1937.—(Special to The Advance)—Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Latour, pioneer residents of Cobalt, yesterday celebrated their golden wedding anniversary at their home on First street, where relatives and friends in the community felicitated them on completing 50 years of married life. Former residents of the Buckingham district, Mr. and Mrs. Latour have made their home in Cobalt for nearly 30 years, having come here from Notre Dame de la Salette in the spring of 1907.

The couple were married in the Catholic church at Notre Dame de la Salette on February 7, 1887, the ceremony being performed by the then parish priest, the late Rev. Father Leclaire. They were attended by Miss Rose Latour, sister of the groom of 50 years ago, and by Alderic Boileau, both of whom have since died. Both Mr. and Mrs. Latour are members of families well known in the Buckingham district, the former being a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Latour, and his wife, who was Rose Emma Lafleur before her marriage, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Eusebe Lafleur. Mrs. Latour is one of a family of twelve children, eleven of whom are living.

In earlier life, Mr. Latour farmed for a time and engaged also in lumbering. For 24 years he carried the mail by road from Ottawa to Notre Dame de la Salette, in which community also he kept the hotel prior to joining in the rush to Cobalt in the earlier days of the silver camp. Since coming north, Mr. Latour has been engaged at a number of mining properties of Cobalt, while he worked for a time also for the Booth lumbering interests at Latchford, where, he said, he assisted in building the wharf and the alligator type of boats used in the company's work on the Montreal river. An operation five years ago left his sight impaired in some degree and since then he has not been actively engaged. Except for this disability, Mr. Latour, at 75, enjoys good health, as does his wife, nine years his junior.
