

Timmins and Porkies Defeat Noranda Copper Kings

Timmins Defeat Noranda in Game Without Single Penalty

Noranda Weakened by Suspension of Rene Lortie as Result of Unfinished Game at South Porcupine on Tuesday Evening. Some Nice Hockey Shown Last Night.

Led by Jimmy Utman, second-string winger, the Timmins Gold Diggers defeated a weakened Noranda team by a score of 6-3 in a regular N.O.H.A. fixture at the Timmins Arena last night. There wasn't a penalty in the 60 minutes of fast and brilliant hockey.

Noranda Copper Kings were weakened by a suspension put on Rene Lortie, former pride of the Timmins defence, the evening before as a result of the unfinished game at South Porcupine. In the Porkie game when Lortie refused to accept a penalty imposed by Jack Wilder the Noranda Copper Kings had to forfeit the game to Porkies who were leading 4-1 at the time.

Gold Diggers Without Raybold
The Gold Diggers were weakened as well. Their star pivot, Joe Raybold, was out of the game. He had a sore shoulder and was shaking off an attack of the flu. His position on the team was taken for the game by "Spider" McKinnon who did a nice job of holding down the tough pivot spot between Jack Young and Ray Morgan.

Eddie Malone sported a dandy "shiner," a vivid reminder of the Tekima game last Saturday night. He played without the use of his right eye. There wasn't even one minor penalty handed out by Jack Pendar, the lone referee, but it was the opinion of many who watched the contest that a few should have been. It wasn't up to the usual high Pendar standards. Lajoie and Fortin were the principal offenders. Their style of play caused a great many "accidental trips" that should have been checked.

Team Improving Quickly
All the way from "Sparky" Vail, captain of the Digger machine, to "Spider" McKinnon, the latest recruit, the local boys played a fast, brilliant game and well deserved the taste of victory. The team has been improving with every game and if the improvement had started sooner there is no doubt that the team would be very close to the top of the league.

After being a goal down for half of the first period the locals started their scoring line and rapped in two fast goals by Vail and Morgan to take a one-goal lead themselves. A minute and a half before the canto ended Noranda tied the count with a Genois-Lajoie passing play with the former netting the rubber.

Utman Bags Two in Second
The second frame was all local with Jimmy Utman taking the spotlight. Two local goals were each scored by Utman to give Timmins a two-goal edge as the period ended.

Timmins Has Two Nicest Goals
The two nicest goals of the night were in the last canto and there was very little to choose between them. The McKinnon-Young play was a beauty that left the Noranda team inside the Timmins blue line and gave them a clear path to the goal. With Horner on defence alone McKinnon skated away off to the side to grab Young's pass and hoist a high one past Roche from close in.

The last goal of the game left the Noranda team inside the attacking zone again as they were bombarding Somerville with more rubber than he had seen in any other two games. Jack Darragh got his stick on the puck at his own blue line and passed to Malone at the Noranda blue line. Just as Malone was passing Horner on the Noranda defence he passed to Jimmy Utman and the former Pittsburgh man raised his scoring total to three for the night.

Noranda Opened the Scoring
There was only little more than a minute gone when Noranda opened the scoring with a Genois-Lajoie play that caught the Timmins defence off their guard. Somerville was given little chance to save the shot that Genois rifled past him about half way up.

Utman Starts His Goal Parade
Timmins' first goal in the second came from a scramble near the Copper Kings' villa. Jimmy Utman found the small opening and didn't waste any time to push the rubber through. The whole Gold Digger team was inside the Noranda defence zone.

Utman's second goal of the period was a nice play that Roche didn't have a chance to stop. JoJo Trembley was battling for the disc in the corner and finally got it and passed out to Malone. Just as Eddie stopped the puck he was bodied out of the play and Jimmy Utman speeding around behind him picked up the puck and drove into the top corner of the twine.

Fortin Crashed Into Timmins Goal
Just before the period ended Fortin of the Noranda rearguard rushed down the ice in an attempt to score. Somerville stopped the shot and flattened out on the ice, smothering the puck. Fortin tripped as he sped by Somerville and crashed into the goal post. He bruised his shoulder as he knocked the goal out of position.

Coughlin's goal in the last canto was a bit of tough luck for "Slim" Somerville. The shot from far out glanced off two pair of skates before coming into the net. The shot last passed through Vail's legs. Vail was standing right in front of Somerville and the goalie's view was blocked.

The two perfect goals by McKinnon and Utman in the last five minutes of play put the game on ice.

Play was fast all through the game, due to the fact that the cold weather of the few days before the game gave the boys the best ice they could wish to have. Noranda's first line of Genois, Lajoie and Coughlin was the most dangerous threat to the Diggers while big George "Milky" Marshall was always a menace.

For the locals Somerville stood out a bit more than the rest of the team with his sensational style of playing. The whole team played better than they previously had and sent the fans home with bright hopes of having a championship next year.

Smith Rink's Record Will be Hard to Beat

Won 37 Games in Three Bopsiels and Lost Only Two.

Emmett Smith's Haileybury rink has hung up a record that Northern Ontario curlers can shoot at for a long time to come. In three years, in three T. & N. O. bopsiels, his rink has won 37 games and lost only two. In all three years he won the grand aggregate and represented the T. & N. O. district against the N.O.C.A. in the North Bay playoffs.

In Noranda in 1935, the Smith rink won all three main events in 13 games played; the Lee, Power and Purty trophies; in 1936 at New Liskeard, they won the Lee and the Purty, losing one game in the Power to Mel Charron; in 1937 at Timmins they won the Power and the Purty, losing a game in the Lee to Pete Graham of New Liskeard.

That's the three-year record. But it goes back farther than that, for the rink he skipped won the first bonspiel of the Northern Ontario Curling Association, played at Haileybury in 1927. There has been only one change in the personnel of the rink since that time, Rev. W. A. Beecroft for D. E. Sutherland. The other two members of the rink are J. M. Robb and D. H. Millar.

Iroquois Falls Sees Lively Hockey Game

Memories of old time hockey feuds between South Porcupine and the Falls were faintly revived Saturday evening when a mixed junior and intermediate team from South End visited the Falls for an exhibition tilt with a team consisting mostly of players from the Mercantile team of the town league.

The visitors had a distinct edge, but only an edge, throughout, and the 7-4 score was largely due to lack of punch around the nets on the part of the locals. The Porkie team was faster and heavier but due to the fact that weight was practically never used the Falls first forward line seemed to be on top whenever they were on.

The visitors Thomas and Proulx stood out and Soucy, in goal, did a lot for the Falls. The two Cameron boys and Gignac did most of the puck carrying for the Falls but the latter was loathe to bore in close. Proulx started the fireworks early in the first when he got right in on Soucy, to have his shot turned back. He made up for it very shortly, netting the first goal of the game on a lone play.

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There are four teams in the group now, two from Schumacher and two from South Porcupine. They hope to arrange at least one exhibition game with Timmins but since the local lads have not yet been able to find a gymnasium they can use for practice or games, that is still only a possibility.

Noranda Team Leaves Ice as Lortie Refuses Penalty

South Porcupine Game Marred as Lortie Rushes Referee Wilder in Second Period on Tuesday Night. Porkies Get 4-1 Victory.

South Porcupine, Feb. 11—(Special to The Advance)—What started out to be a good game here Tuesday night was marred in the second period when Rene Lortie, former Timmins player, now with the Noranda Copper Kings, refused to take a penalty Referee Wilder had called. Lortie rushed the referee, jammed him against the boards, and Wilder immediately gave him a five-minute penalty.

This Lortie refused to take, and the whole Noranda team left the ice. Wilder gave them two minutes to make up their minds whether or not they would finish the game. The Copper Kings failed to appear and the game was awarded to Porkies, with the score at 4-1.

Noranda Played Hard
From the opening bell the Noranda forwards kept checking in and keeping the Porkies team disorganized. Esseltine had some busy moments but stood up brilliantly under the barrage of shots that were rained at him. The Porkies opened the scoring when Dunn took a neat pass from Nevin and beat Roche on a hard shot.

Hardly had the puck been faced off when Lyn Huggins rushed the length of the ice unassisted to register the second of Porkies' tallies. It was a brilliant bit of playing by the former Mercantile.

Noranda came right back after the face-off and Caldwell scored their only marker on a pass from Rice. Noranda tried hard to even the count and Esseltine handled plenty of rubber before the pressure was relieved when Horne, F. Huggins and Cattarello combined for the third Porkie goal. Cattarello back-handed the puck past Roche.

Marshall led a rush on the Porkies net and the rush seemed to have resulted in a goal. The goal umpire did not flash the red light and the goal was disallowed. The umpire was changed.
