### South Porcupine Having Old Timers' Banquet

Annual Event to be Held in the Parish Hall. Finding Out About that Fall of Yellow Snow. Marriage at South Porcupine. Other Items from South Porcupine and the Dome.

South Porcupine, Ont., Feb. 10th, 1937. Special to The Advance.

A theory advanced as to the reason for the yellow (creamy) snow which fell here on Monday, is that the air was full of sand from the sand-storms in the south and this coloured the snow as it fell. Credence is given to this theory by the fact that when some snow was dissolved a sandy deposit was found. Another (private) theory is that the sun-dogs were caused by the varying densities of atmosphere through which the sun was shining—the refraction of light causing the coloured effects noticed, and this density was the dust particles from Arctic volcanic disturbances. These particles fell with the snow and made it the peculiar color that it was. By next week the scientific explanation will have reached us from the Department at Ottawa which will be given here.
