Amusements Tax to be Discarded June 1
Premier Calls it Nuisance Tax and Promises its Abolition.

One of the specially interesting sections of Hon. Mr. Hepburn's budget speech is the following:—
Amusements Tax
"I doubt if there is a tax in the fiscal system of this or any other Province of Canada that gives more annoyance to the people than does the amusements tax. The Government has given considerable study to the question of reducing the amusements tax charged on admissions to entertainments and theatres and places of amusement. It is a difficult and expensive tax to collect, particularly in the smaller centres. "Nuisance taxes are bad taxes, and should be reduced and discarded wherever possible. The Government has decided that on June 1, 1937, the amusements tax will be totally abolished. I am sure that, in giving up this source of revenue, the Government will earn the commendation of all classes of citizens; for it might be added that this tax reform will put Ontario in a very enviable position in competing for tourist traffic which is becoming such an important factor in our economic life, but most of all the abolition of this tax will be of immense benefit to the citizens in what might be termed the lower economic scale, because over 80 per cent. of the amusement tax is collected from admissions of twenty-five cents and under.

Refuse Feldman Application
Application of the Feldman Timber Company to erect a fence on Third Avenue on the lot between Molesley and Ball's and the Timmins Furniture Exchange was refused by the council. Feldman explained that they had rented the lot from Mrs. Thomas for use as a used car sales ground and that a fence was necessary to protect the cars.

"I shouldn't think the council would take long to decide that," Mayor Bartleman said. "We've just had a building torn down there because it was a fire hazard."

"I don't think we should consider it at all," agreed Councillor Cousins.

Ask Lane and Sidewalk
Petitions presented at the meeting included one from owners of lots on the north side of Third Avenue between Maple and Birch streets. They are willing to donate the north 12 feet of their lots to form a lane parallel to Third Avenue. This would facilitate the installation of new water mains, they pointed out. The cost of the work, to be done under the local improvement plan, will be borne by the property owners. It was referred to the public works committee.

Residents of the north side of Wendie Avenue asked that a cement sidewalk be built from Mountjoy to Wilcox. This was also referred to public works.

Enclosing a copy of their financial statement, the St. John Ambulance Brigade asked a donation from the town. They will need a good squad here for the celebration of Timmins' 25th year of incorporation and old home week, they pointed out, and they will require more uniforms. "A crowd gives way more readily to a uniform," the letter, signed by Thomas H. Richards, said. The request was left with the finance committee for consideration with the estimates.

A special meeting, at which all estimates will be considered, is to be held at the call of the mayor, a resolution said.

A new map of the Porcupine, including 40 townships, has been prepared by Norman A. Nunn in Toronto, another letter said. The town may buy one for the convenience of people who make inquiries at the town hall.

Two letters from firework companies interested in putting on a display here on Coronation Day, were referred to Austin Neame, president of the Legion, who has charge of the celebration.

Want Relief and Work
Four verbal petitions were made by those who wanted relief or work. The first was a woman who had told the council she was a widow but who turned out on investigation to have married again. She wanted work for her boys to pay the taxes on her house. A young man asked that the council try to make some allowance for his widowed mother so that she might not lose her home in a tax sale. He made only \$2.00 a day, he said.

"There's quite a bit of work around here but they won't give me any," complained another man. He was not on relief.

Province to Pay Pensions Costs from First of April

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
