

# Teams in Good Shape for Junior Title Match To-Night

## Timmins Holds Copper Cliff to Two-Goal Lead in Final

Aldege Bastien, Timmins Goalie Gives Stellar Performance at Stanley Stadium Thursday Night. Sudbury Fans Disappointed.

Sudbury, March 15.—(Special to The Advance)—In the first of a two-game series for the championship of the N.O. H.A., played at the Stanley stadium on Tuesday night, Copper Cliff Redmen gained a two-goal lead to take to Timmins for the Monday night final.

From the Sudbury fans' point of view, the game was not a good one, for the team on which they have built their hopes turned in one of its worst efforts of the season. Had the visiting Timmins team had more experience on artificial ice, they would probably have taken the game without much trouble.

Aldege Bastien, Timmins goalie, was the most popular man on the ice. As he dived on the puck, turned aside with his pads, or dropped his stick and caught it in the manner of a baseball catcher, he looked like a real comer in the game. Only 16 years old, he has a good many years ahead of him still in junior company. Richard, Cook, and Tony Delmonte looked best for Timmins in front of the goal while Roy Heximer and Tobin worked hardest for the winners.

### Zuke Scores First

As Redmen changed lines for the first time in the game, Zuke took Webster's pass to rap in the first Copper Cliff goal. Play had not reached the four-minute mark when the counter was made. Nummela tied the score as Copper Cliff was slow in clearing the puck and the Timmins forward lifted it from the blue line near the boards to flash the red light.

Hamill got a chance to break away and was followed down the ice by Heximer. He passed over to Heximer and there was no mistake on the play. The Cliffmen continued the pressure and a minute later Heximer scored in through Timmins defence to make the score 3-1.

### Timmins Puts on Pressure

Taking advantage of Copper Cliff's shorthandedness early in the second period, Timmins put on all the pres-

sure the team could muster. In a ganging attack that took the forwards in close to the net, Tony Delmonte got his stick to the puck to score. A little more than half way through the frame McReavy carried the puck into the corner of Timmins' defence area, shot it back to Heximer at centre ice, who banged it into the net to make the score 4-2.

A loose puck gave Cook an opportunity in the third period to pass out to Richard who was in scoring position near the Cliff net. The disc bounced off the goalie's stick and into the upper corner of the net. The Timmins lads appeared then to be hitting their stride. McReavy barged home Zuke's pass near the close of the game to make the final score 5-3.

## Goal Every Two Minutes as Porkies Take Locals at Falls

Score is 15-14 in Exhibition Tilt as Teams Warm Up for Kenning Cup Final to be Played Here This Week.

Iroquois Falls, March 15.—(Special to The Advance)—In a game of exhibition hockey played here Saturday night, South Porcupine defeated Timmins and set a new record for number of goals scored. When the adding machines had finished their job, it was found that Porkies had 15 and Timmins only 14 tallies. They flowed in at the rate of almost one every two minutes throughout the game.

Al Huggins opened the scoring in the second marking 7-4 for Porcupine on a lone rush. Lafamme broke up a Porkie attack at their goal mouth to beat Esseltine for Timmins' fifth. Morgan further reduced the Porkies' lead, scoring on Kerr's pass. Myers showed real ability in this stanza, beating several Porkies' attacks alone. The Porkies eighth and ninth were scored within seconds of each other, Frank Huggins netting both alone.

Morgan opens scoring on a lone rush and Dunn made it 2-0 for Timmins from a scrim, following his own rush. Haneberry drew the only penalty of the first period for boarding and Timmins threw five men up. This proved costly, Al Huggins and Horne breaking through for a tally by the Porkie coach and former Eskimo star.

Dunn ploughed through a scrim to score early in the third, reducing the Porkie lead to one. Nevins drew the second penalty of the game for tripping Frank Huggins, but no damage ensued. Maki made it 10-8 on Horne's pass; L. Huggins drew the game's third penalty for a trip and the Timmins team put on the power play which resulted in a score by McKinnon on a lone play.

Young put Timmins two up, breaking from a scrim when Esseltine failed to clear. Haneberry made up for his penalty, flashing in on Frank Huggins' rebound to reduce the Timmins margin to one. Woon tied the score at 3-3 on Morgan's rebound. Nevins alone put Timmins up again. A Frank Huggins to Len Huggins play tied up again. Maki got assists on the next two, passing to Woon and Horne respectively, for the Porkies fifth and sixth goals.

The score was again widened seconds later, Proulx scoring on Maye's pass to make it 11-9. Frank Huggins again pulled the lone-play stunt to make it 12-9. Nevins made it 10 for Timmins poking the disc in from a scrim. Maki followed suit, scoring alone, and Al Huggins made it 14-10 shooting from the blue line. Lafamme followed up for the Timmins eleventh, to bring the total score to the quarter century mark. Maki again flashed the over-worked red light, stickhandling through for a goal from the face-off to make it 15-12 and Nevins reduced the lead by one shortly afterwards. McKinnon made it 13-15. Richer made it 14-15 on McKinnon's pass with a minute to go.

The Redmen will arrive to-night on the 4:45 train. This the league officials would not sanction and the game was awarded to Ansonville, thus giving the Cubs the championship.

The Toronto Juvenile League has been in touch with the Cubs and have requested home and home games with the Cubs for the Birk Cup, emblematic of Eastern Canada championship. The Cubs have paid the entry fee and arrangements are under way to meet the winners of the Toronto League, which has still some games to play.
