

# Record Crowd of 2600 Packs Arena for Junior Final

## Juniors Swamped by Redmen 11-2 in Second Final Here

### Copper Cliff Takes Home Junior Championship of N. O. H. A. Roy Heximer and Johnny Godfrey Lead Scoring Parade.

Copper Cliff Redmen, N.O.H.A. finalists from the southern section, gave the Nickel Belt its second N.O.H.A. championship here last Monday night when they thoroughly beat a battling Timmins junior team by a score of 11-2. Carrying a two-goal margin from the game in Sudbury last Thursday it gave the Redmen the right to travel along the Memorial Cup trail.

Over twenty-six hundred fans from this town that was "hockey mad" for the few days between the two games crammed their way into the arena and there wasn't even standing room. Every available bit of space was taken up as the town paid tribute to a junior team that gave them their first play-off chance for the Junior N.O.H.A. title.

Sudbury at times looked like real Memorial Cup contenders but their dazzling bursts of speed lasted only a few minutes at a time. Often they didn't even seem to be trying to score. They had a power play that can't help but click. On the other hand the Timmins juniors turned in one of their worst games of the season. The series against Noranda produced much better hockey than against Copper Cliff.

#### Heximer Scores Alone

Hamill and Cooke were chased just after the second frame started and while each team was a man short Heximer broke away alone to put Copper Cliff three up on the game.

When the teams were at full strength again Timmins came very close when Richard went in fast to almost bang in his own rebound. Four Redmen broke together and Bastien stopped the rush alone.

Faught was given a sentence for hooking Marinacci and Timmins three on five forwards for a power play. Cameron came down the ice and shot to get the puck over the line. Godfrey blocked the shot and as it bounced back over the line he raced after it and had no trouble scoring when he bore in on Bastien alone.

Timmins' first score came immediately after on a power play while Faught was still off. Hume drilled his shot from the penalty ring on Joe Delmonte's perfect pass back to him.

Timmins continued to play with five forwards and just after they changed back to their regular line Faught got another penalty for holding Theriault's stick and Joe Raybold threw on his five forwards again. They had several close ones before Faught came back.

#### The Cliff Exhibits Power

Cameron was chased for tripping Hamill and Redmen gave an exhibition of power play. After everybody had passed the puck and had gotten Bastien dizzy trying to follow it Heximer banged one in from right in front of the goal when the goalie was left uncoversed.

Just after the third period started Bastien robbed Hamill and McReavy of sure scores twice on the very same play. They came down and passed the defence perfectly only to have Bastien play sensationally to stop them.

Heximer sent Copper Cliff farther ahead when he coasted in on Bastien and feinted his shot to draw the Timmins goalie away off to the side of the net.

Marinacci was chased for hooking McReavy and Copper Cliff scored again on a pretty power play. McReavy did the scoring on passes from Zuke and Shewchuck.

Fergie Cooke's drive from the side on Joe Delmonte's pass was the beginning of a power play that was to last for the remainder of the period and one that enabled Redmen to score four more easy goals.

#### Timmins Plays All Up

Playing every man up Bastien had no defence and was helpless in the face of the two and three man rushes that bore in on him steadily. He played a good game in the nets but he couldn't stop them all. Godfrey scored the first of the four goals when he went down the ice alone and in the clear to drive a low hard shot past the plucky Timmins goalie. Tobin followed a minute later leaving the whole Timmins team behind him and had no trouble lifting his shot over Bastien who was flat on the ice.

With three minutes left to play Hamill and Shewchuck broke away and the flashy redhead passed near the goal. The game's last goal was scored at nineteen minutes when McReavy came from the side fast to bang in Hamill's rebound.

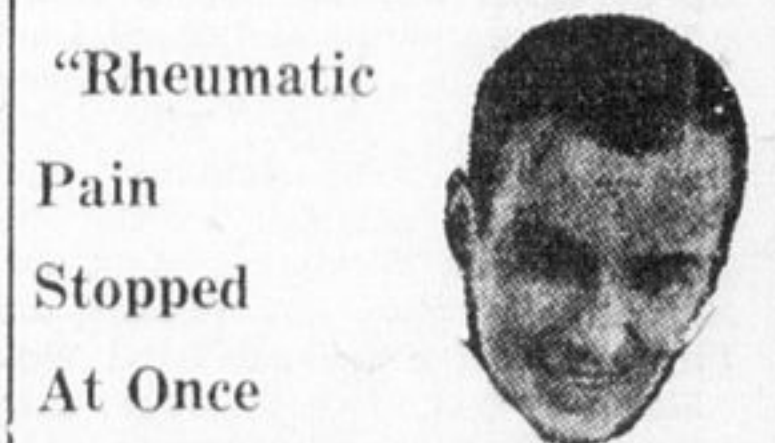
