Expects to Leave Timmins in July and Take up Residence in Munich

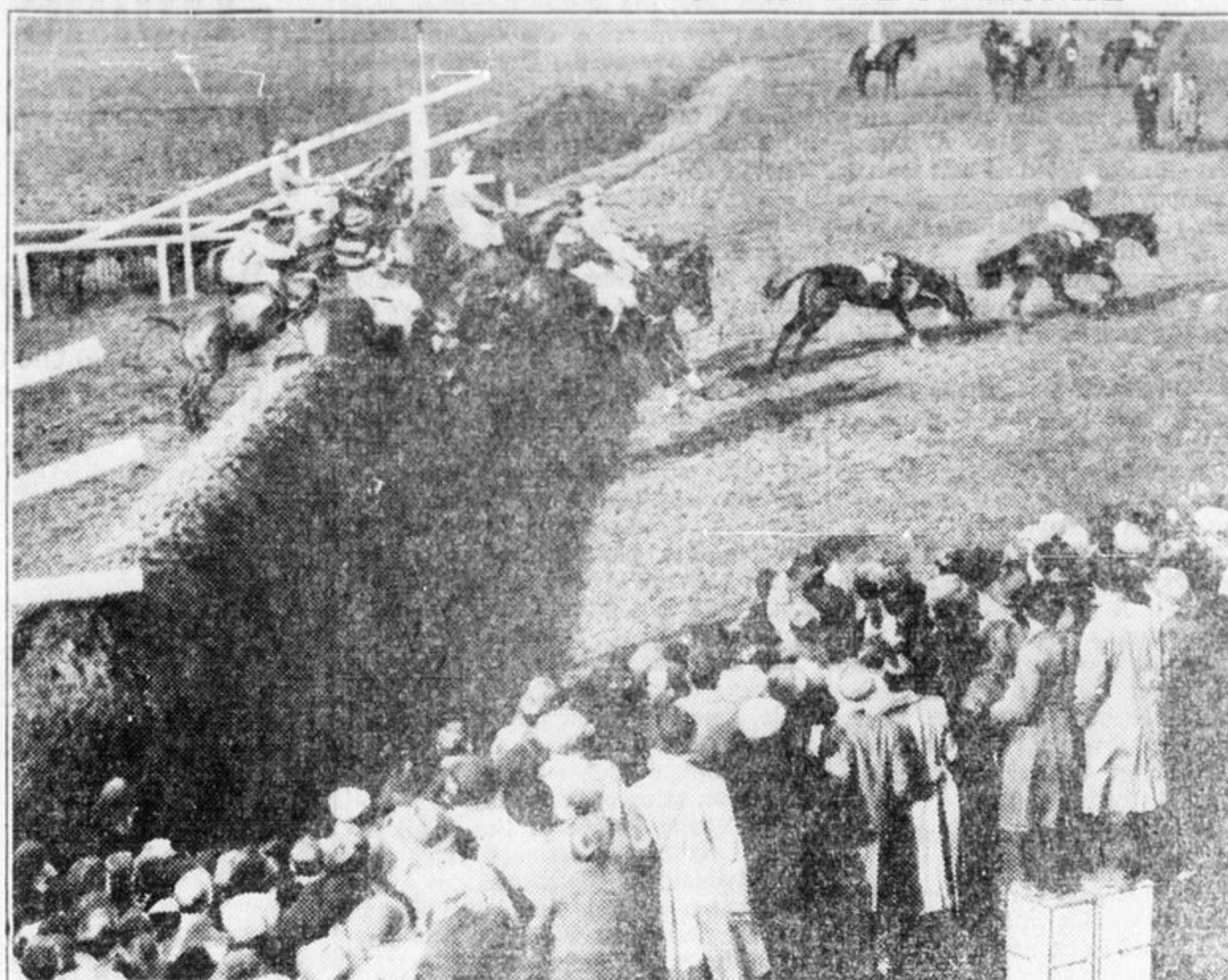

Defeat Waterloo 3 to 1 in Maple Leaf Gardens Game

District Juvenile Team Wins Right to Hold Mitchell F. Hepburn Trophy in Ontario Juvenile Hockey Association Final.

By defeating the Waterloo juvenile hockey club 3-1 in Maple Leaf Gardens on Saturday afternoon, Iroquois Falls Cubs became first holders of the Mitchell F. Hepburn trophy and juvenile champions of the province.

Although the Ontario Juvenile Hockey Association has been in existence for two years, this is the first time Northern Ontario has been included in the playoffs. By virtue of the win in the Porcupine district juvenile league, Iroquois Falls was chosen representative of the North. Waterloo won the

honours in an elimination contest in Southern Ontario.

Sudden Death Game
The game in Toronto on Saturday was a sudden death affair.

Affiliation of the Cubs with the Ontario-wide juvenile hockey association was made late in the season at the invitation of the Toronto headquarters.

There is no doubt now, hockey men-tors here agree, that the provincial juvenile playoffs will encourage an even greater interest in boys hockey throughout the province.

Asks Co-operation of All in Protecting Pickerel Here

Game Warden Phil Boudreau Urges Fishermen and Others to Observe the Law in the General Interests and for Conservation of Fish and Game.

Asking for the co-operation of all fishermen in the Porcupine in keeping Ontario's fish laws, Game and Fisheries Officer Phil Boudreau said today he intends this spring to make a thorough check-up of pickerel fishing.

The pickerel spawning season is from about April 15th to May 15th and during that period it is strictly against the law to take them from the water. Observance of the law keeps the natural stock of pickerel in the lakes and rivers of the northern part of the province at a point where there should be plenty of fish for all. Taking them in the spawning season cuts off natural

reproduction. In addition, the fish are not good eating at this time of year.

Trout Season Opens Soon

With the opening of the speckled trout season less than a month off now, many in the Porcupine are already planning fishing trips. For the first 15 days of the trout season, fishermen are particularly asked to avoid pickerel haunts, for mere possession of a pickerel out of season is an infraction of the fish laws and may be severely penalized. The brown trout and Aurora trout season also opens May 1st, continuing until September 15th, both dates inclusive.

N. O. F. A. Plans to Establish Juvenile Football in North

Intends to Work with School Teachers and Officials of the T.P.A.A.A. to Foster Junior and Juvenile Association Football. Meeting to be Called at an Early Date.

One of the primary objects of the Northern Ontario Football Association this coming season will be to attempt to establish Association football in the junior and juvenile sports. In the past, football has been played largely by players encouraged to come here by the different teams, from England and Scotland, and though there is no denying the fact that the Old Country players are finished and beautiful footballers, there is no valid reason why Canadians should not do equally well, if these Canadians who are naturally rugged and have an inborn love of sport, are brought into the game at an early age and properly trained.

It is the intention of the N.O.F.A. council to invite schoolteachers and officials of the T.P.A.A.A. to a meeting to be held in the near future with the

purpose of fostering junior and juvenile football, in view.

North Bay has had this system in practice for some time and they are having a large measure of success.

The clubs who will be in the N.O.F.A. this season are Hollinger, McIntyre, Dome, Lake Shore and Wright-Harveaves. No word has been received as yet from the Sons of Scotland in Kirkland Lake nor from Noranda but their acceptance may come later.

The officers for the next period are President, Theo. Glaster who was last year's head. The vice-presidents are Geo. Foster, Timmins, and M. Massey, Kirkland Lake. Mr. Foster is a representative of the Hollinger Recreation Football Club. The president of the H.R.F.C. is Edward Finchea.

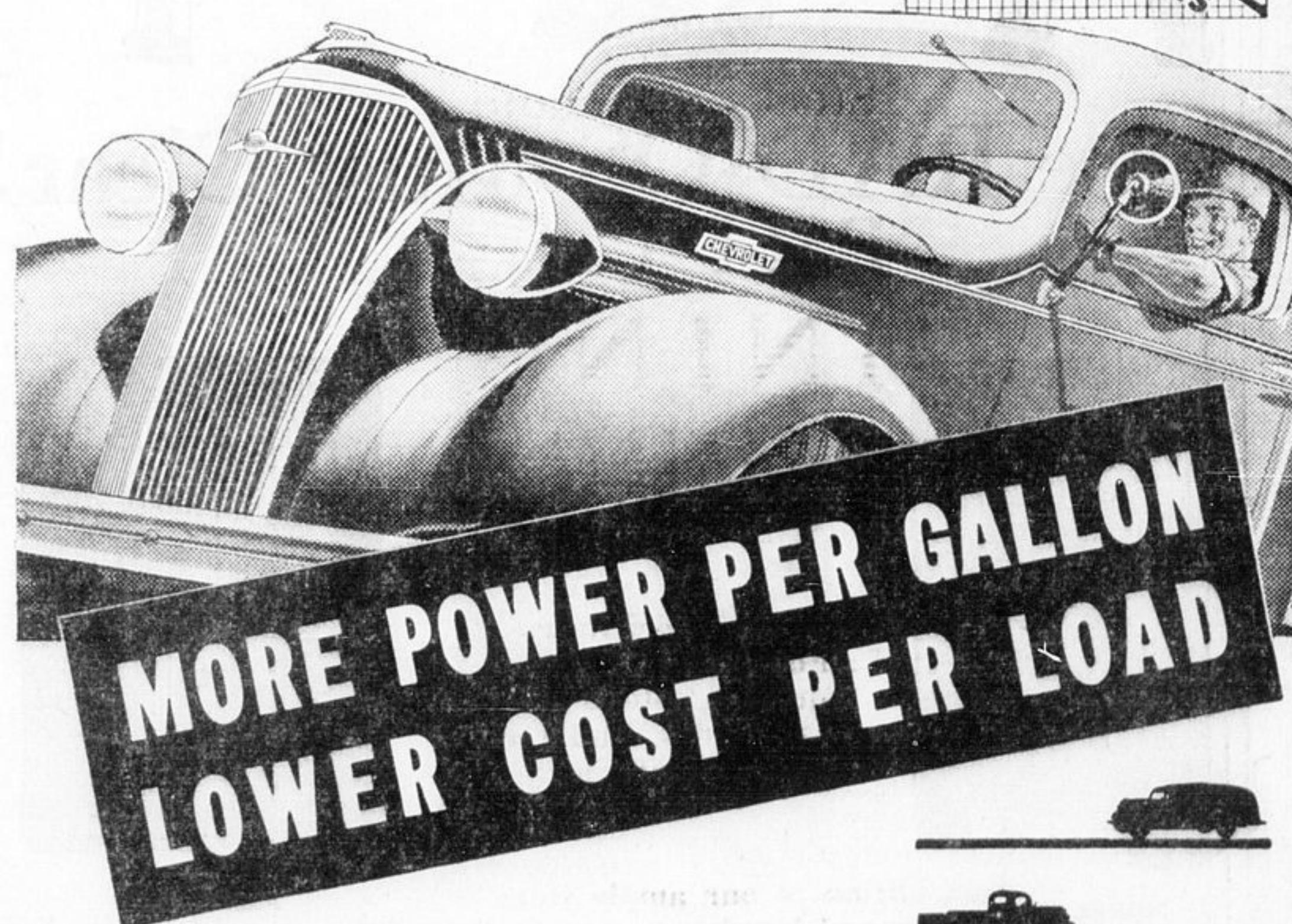
