Those who do not wish to misunderstand, have found no such cause for offence in Major Murray's speech—even in its abridged and imperfectly reported form—as Mr. Bennett and Mr. Church have been at pains to conjure up. Obviously the C.B.C. manager's meaning is that Canadian broadcasts, as officially developed, must reckon with the French as well as the English language section of the population, and aim to interpret the one to the other, so as to eliminate differences arising from misunderstanding, and thus help to foster the spirit of national unity. Major Murray's was the statement of a broadminded Canadian, of the responsible administrator of a great national public utility. The criticisms levelled at him in the House sound artificial, as mischievous in substance, are unworthy of the kind of statesmanship that has made the Canadian Confederation one of the great cornerstones of Empire. Politically Mr. Bennett's impulsive utterance in this connection is another of those in this connection is another of those which make him the despair of his friends.

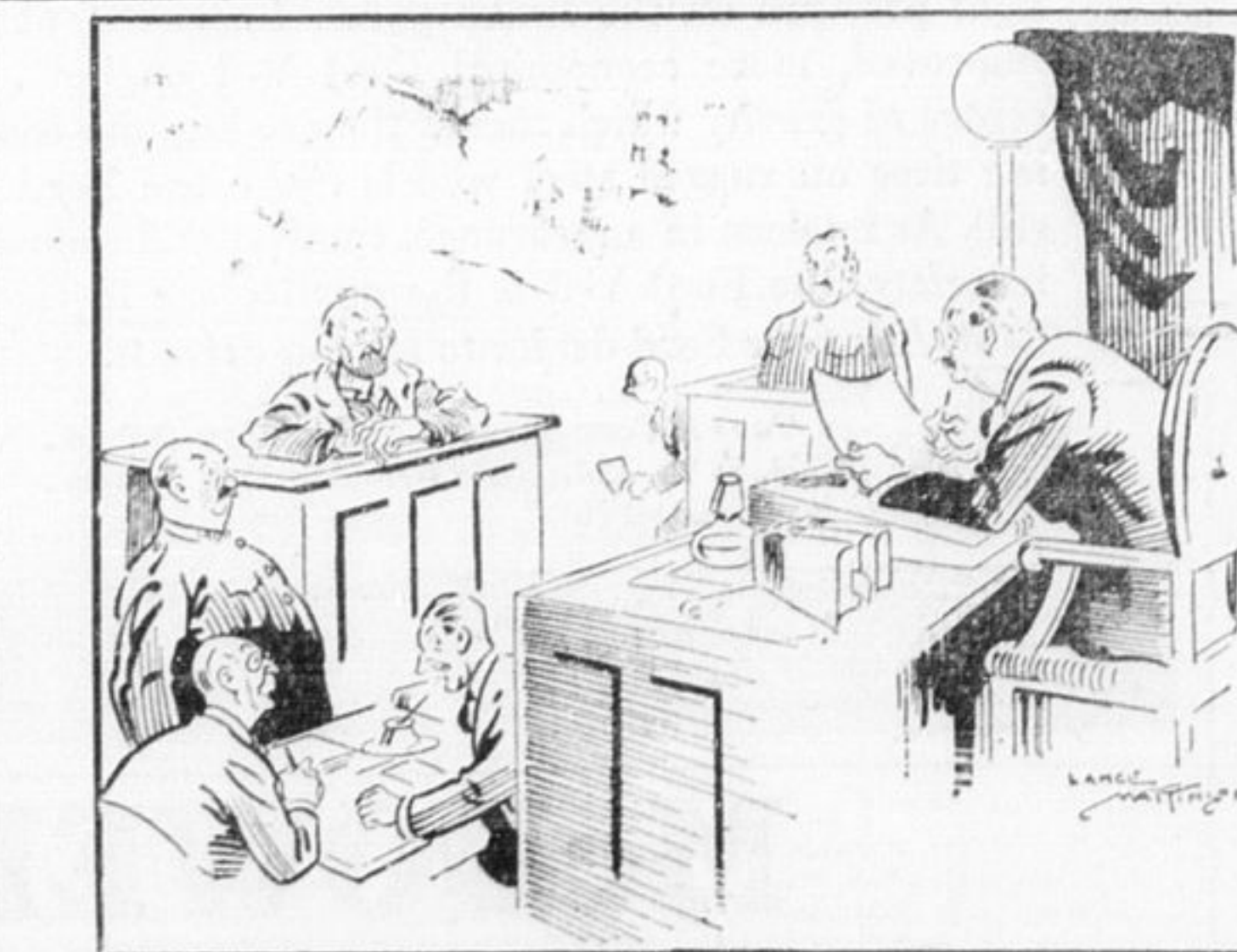
