# Amos Man Reported Missing Two Weeks

### Rosario Francoeur Believed to Have Flown to Rouyn, Not Yet Found.

Noranda, April 13.—For several days a thorough search has been conducted by the police for Rosario Francoeur, well-known contractor's equipment supply agent of Amos who mysteriously disappeared on March 31, after supposedly boarding a General Airways plane at Revillart Lake for Rouyn.

He had left Val d'Or that day, checking out of the Val d'Or hotel and it was known that he had cashed a cheque at the bank there for \$1,000 before he left, also that he had \$400 in cash in his pocket on his departure from Amos for Val d'Or.

Thought To Be Ill

Ill-health may have something to do with his disappearance, for at Revillart Lake, situated on the border of Cadillac and Malartic Townships, where he was last seen to be identified, Mr. Francoeur took a rest at a cabin, telling the people there he was not feeling well, and asking them to keep watch for a plane to take him into Rouyn. They did as he requested and he left their cabin for the plane.

Several days elapsed before a search was made upon Mrs. Francoeur becoming alarmed at her husband's long absence, and the missing man's brother came to Rouyn on Friday last to make inquiries and inform the police.

### Pilot Not Sure

The pilot of the plane was unable to say definitely from description if Mr. Francoeur was one of three men who boarded the plane that day at Revillart Lake. All he recalled is that he picked up three men at that point and flew them into Rouyn.

The missing man was to have caught the train from Rouyn for Amos that night by the C.N.R., but inquiries have resulted in no trace of his movements since he left the plane, that is, if he was one of the three men who boarded it at Lake Revillart.

Both the provincial and local police are on the alert for any clues that may lead to the explanation of Mr. Francoeur's disappearance and his whereabouts, though no light had been shed on the mystery over the week-end.

Later information from the local police is that his brother is reasonably sure Mr. Francoeur reached Rouyn. His description is: Height five feet eight inches, weight about 145 pounds, slim of build and fair of complexion. He was last seen wearing a brown wind-breaker with zipper, and rubber boots drawn up over his trousers.

The age of the missing man, who was an overseas veteran, would be in the early forties.

# Suggests that Austria May Cheat Italy by Alliance

Vienna.—In view of the recent Italo-Yugoslav pact, much interest is aroused here in the progress made by Austria and Czechoslovakia in their efforts for co-operation.

Prime Minister Milan Hodza of Czechoslovakia recently visited Vienna at the same time that the Italian Foreign Minister, Count Galeazzo Ciano, was at the Yugoslav capital. It begins to be apparent that Premier Hodza's moves for better understanding between Vienna and Prague are beginning to bear fruit.

Relations between Austria and Italy have been definitely cool since Premier Mussolini, allegedly at Berlin's instigation, declined to support the Hapsburg restoration. The result has been an increasingly independent attitude on Chancellor Schuschnigg's part at Vienna.

It has been stated here that Premier Mussolini wanted Chancellor Schuschnigg to help him bring Yugoslavia into the orbit of the Rome Pact, now comprising Italy, Austria and Hungary, and thus to separate Yugoslavia from the Little Entente and France. Chancellor Schuschnigg seems to have other ideas, however, all the more so since such a move would also involve closer co-operation with Berlin and the abandonment of all hopes for a Hapsburg restoration.

If Czechoslovakia's more recent moves lead to an accord between Austria and Czechoslovakia, it is presumed that Chancellor Schuschnigg's proposed trip to Belgrade would be made under Premier Hodza's auspices instead of Premier Mussolini's. The Czech Premier would certainly desire to introduce his new friends to the other members of the Little Entente circle.

What is seen here as an act of defiance to Premier Mussolini was Surrigay's monarchist demonstration, in which the Austrian Vice-Chancellor, Field Marshal Lieut. Ludwig Hulgerth, Chancellor Schuschnigg's personal representative, ostentatiously participated and cheers for Archduke Otto rent the air.

# Pleasing Results at MATAHEWAN PROPERTY

Raise from 125-foot level to the pit in northwest part of the Matachewan property of Matona Gold Mines has been completed and shows values of free gold throughout, officials advise.

A. H. Smith, mine manager, estimates good average values across width of about 54 inches.

On the 125-foot level a crosscut has been run to explore an ore body in this section. Good mineralization has been encountered.

Several tons of material and supplies are at West Tree, and will be freighted into the property shortly. Another engine-room will be erected, and the shaft continued to a depth of 500 feet.

### Police Reserve Held at Toronto Increased for Emergency.

Premier Hepburn at Toronto Tuesday afternoon said he had arranged for augmentation of the emergency police force now concentrated in Toronto. He summoned Royal Canadian Mounted Police and Ontario Provincial Police to the city when the 3,700 General Motors workers quit their posts last Thursday, demanding recognition of the union linked with Lewis' forces, wage advances and improved conditions.

Ontario provincial police have been instructed to swear in additional constables, said the Premier. He said he telegraphed the Dominion administration for additional assistance. In Toronto at present are 100 R.C.M.P. officers, but it was not revealed how many were sought to add to this number.

Mr. Hepburn said his action was the result of police report from Oshawa and his discovery that "Communists from outside were ready and willing to take an increasingly active part in the Oshawa situation."

If trouble were caused by Communists it would be unfortunate for General Motors employees who have conducted themselves during the strike as respectable, law-abiding Canadian citizens.

### Ready for Emergency

Police centred in Toronto would be sent to Oshawa only in the event of an emergency with which the local police would be unable to meet. From all reports, the Premier said, the Oshawa situation was becoming "a little more tense."

If the C. I. O. representatives stepped out of the picture, said Mr. Hepburn, he believed settlement could be reached with the General Motors employees.

"But the thing is a deadlock now and I'm afraid it may remain that way indefinitely," he continued. "Of course, the company is free to carry on negotiations independently of me but I know that at the moment there are no such negotiations."

The Premier said he was not opposed to international labour organizations such as the American Federation of Labour.
