

Along Canada's Mining Highway

British Columbia reports indicate financing of the large B.C. Nickel deposits by a Canadian-U.S. Syndicate holding contracts for disposal of concentrates to Japanese interests.

Alberta reports Brown Oil Corporation No. 1 and No. 2 wells deepening rapidly, also drilling under way on Plains Petroleum No. 2 well. A new oil field is indicated by this company's No. 1 well. Acidizing of the Foundation well in Turner Valley is taking place to enlarge production.

In Manitoba, Sherritt-Gordon is preparing for resumption of production.

Ontario's fields are most active. Madsen in Red Lake is moving ahead with its shaft sinking and development plans. Hardrock in the Long Lac Camp is developing new high grade in the west shaft section. The M-Leod situation underground is reported to be better. Hutchison Lake will be drifting on two levels shortly.

In Porcupine, important ore is reported on Preston East Dome's 200-foot level west drive. The Viritia Porcupine has announced diamond drilling arrangements—Pamour reports improving operating results—Kirkland Lake

Gold reports a most important ore development at depth south of the Macassa line. The Larder Lake field, from fifteen to twenty-five miles east of Kirkland Lake, is the scene of intense activity. Kerr Addison, by diamond drilling, is enlarging its most important ore limits. Martin Bird continues to develop new ore on three levels underground. Omega steadily prepares for future enlarged production. Upper Canada has attained its 500-foot level shaft objective with underground ore development to begin shortly.

Chesterville reports important results in diamond drilling, with Noranda reported as having entered the company's affairs as a substantial shareholder. Pelangio Larder reports diamond drilling to commence at once. Armistice has already started to drill. Arjon, adjoining Kerr-Addison, is preparing for active work and Barber-Larder has surface work under way. Oriole has obtained the services of a prominent engineer to direct their diamond drilling and surface operations.

Quebec areas are making record progress. The Quebec Manitou section to the east of Lamaque is developing a boom, with many properties obtaining finance.

6.—East of Long Lac—Mr. R. D. Macdonald will make a geological survey of an area lying east of Long Lac. This is the eastward continuation of the area covered by Dr. H. W. Fairbairn in 1936.

7.—Townships of Thornloe, Price, Adams and Eldorado—Dr. W. D. Harding will make a geological survey of the above four townships lying south of Porcupine.

8.—Lake of the Woods—Mr. N. H. Fraser will make a geological survey of an area bordering Whitefish Bay of the Lake of the Woods.

9.—Sandy Lake, (N.W. Patricia District)—Dr. J. Satterly will make a geological survey of the western end of Sandy Lake.

10.—Miminska Lake (Albany River)—Mr. V. K. Piest will make a detailed geological survey of an area bordering Miminska lake and extending eastward.

11.—Spirit Lake (Patricia District)—Mr. J. D. Bateman will make a geological survey of an area in the vicinity of Spirit Lake.

12.—Schreiber Area—Mr. M. W. Bartley will make a geological survey of an area in the vicinity of Schreiber. This is an extension of the area covered by Dr. G. A. Harcourt in 1936.

13.—Onaman Lake, Sturgeon River Area—Mr. W. W. Moorhouse will make a geological survey of an area south of Onaman lake. This area adjoins the north boundary of the Sturgeon River area just completed by Dr. Bruce and Dr. Laird.

14.—Atkokan Area—Dr. E. S. Moore will make a geological survey of this area.

15.—Sudbury—Dr. T. C. Phemister will carry out some geological investigations in the vicinity of Sudbury and examine a number of active gold properties in the district.

16.—Larder Lake Area—Provincial Geologist, H. C. Rickaby, will do some preliminary geological work preparatory to a detailed study in this area in 1938. It is the intention of the Department of Mines to arrange to have an aerial survey made of the townships adjoining this district during the coming summer.

The geologists of the Department of Mines will also visit a number of active mining areas not included in the above list.

The appointments of the assistants for the above parties have been made and include 46 students recruited from the departments of geology and mining at Ontario universities.

Niagara Falls Review—Welland city council is considering the advisability of making a grant of \$500 to help along the home improvement plan in that city, and it is possible that expenditure of such a sum to popularize the plan might save more than that in relief when more employment is given as a result.

Urges Central Office for Associated Boards

With Permanent Secretary. Ralph S. Taylor, of New Liskeard, Sure that Plan Could be Financed and That it Would be Well Worth While. Some of the Advantages Suggested.

In a recent issue of The Advance there was reference to a suggestion by H. G. Laidlaw, of Timmins, that the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade should have a permanent paid secretary with a central office open all the time. Mr. Laidlaw referred to the good work done by the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade and pointed out that with a permanent central office its usefulness could be greatly increased. He proposed that to meet the necessary cost the functions of the motor section of the Associated Boards should be extended to take in the collection of Motor Club fees. This would form a solid basis for the financing of the secretary as well as the extending of the work already done in matters affecting motorists by the Associated Boards.

The suggestion of Mr. Laidlaw has found an able seconder in R. S. Taylor, of New Liskeard. Mr. Taylor has been a valued supporter of board of trade and Associated Boards of Trade for many years. In these capacities he has won the appreciation of all and his views will accordingly be received with much interest and attention. In a letter to Mr. Laidlaw, Mr. Taylor writes as follows:

New Liskeard, Ont., April 14th, '37
Mr. H. G. Laidlaw, Timmins, Ontario.
Dear Horace: I read with considerable interest an editorial in one of the issues of The Porcupine Advance last week which had to do with the suggestion made by you, that the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade should have a permanent central office with a paid secretary and I am very glad to find someone advocating this idea.

At the annual meeting of the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade held in New Liskeard last fall, I introduced a resolution embodying exactly this idea, and while the resolution carried, there was considerable discussion and criticism, it being felt the cost would run so high that it would be prohibitive.

My resolution was not that this be immediately done but that an attempt be made to engage a paid secretary, etc., and the matter was apparently left with the executive to deal with and insofar as I knew they do not appear to have made any further headway.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr. W. O. Langdon who, while in the chair at the time, supported my resolution. Perhaps you might talk it over with him sometime. I have always felt the interest of matters served by this Northern Ontario Board of Trade in this area were of sufficient importance to warrant one man spending his full time in connection with them. The question of financing I know is a serious one, but surely there are sufficient concerns throughout the north who could be interested in making a regular monthly contribution towards such a good cause. I am quite sure in my mind the proposition would pay for itself in indirect returns; one important item of course would be to secure a man capable of satisfactorily handling the job. He would have to be an individual who was capable of standing on his feet, addressing meetings here and there, and in general one who would be sold on the matters handled by the board of trade and able to put them across in every way.

Nothing Definite About Increase of Pamour Mill

(From Northern Miner)
Drilling at Pamour, between its shaft and the Hallnor line, has had results which, while inconclusive as yet, could perhaps develop importance. One good hole has been had and one interesting one. The next two holes brought no ore results but instead indicated a fault plane. Difficulty is experienced in getting drill holes down through the very deep overburden so progress is slow. At this time it is quite impossible to appraise the value of the knowledge gained but ore to the west of the shaft could have considerable meaning, if found, for it might lead to the finding of ore below the present chief ore, to the east of the shaft. There is, of course, a pronounced rake eastward of Pamour ore-bodies.

At the Hallnor, also controlled by Noranda, three levels, the 200, 300 and 600, are now approaching the ore zone and should be contributing news within a month.

Gold Brick Poured at the L. B. United Mines Recently

Dr. T. L. Gledhill, consulting geologist, following a visit to the property of L. B. United Mines, during the first week of the current month, stated that while at the property a gold brick was poured valued at about \$2,500, which came mainly from development rock and ore from one of the new stopes. Mr. Gledhill further stated that the material was largely unsorted and does not represent clean ore.

In reference to underground development Dr. Gledhill stated in part as follows: "The drift on the first level is being continued north, the last forty-five feet being in ore of good grade. A new stope is being prepared in this area and the grade going through the mill should improve. On April 5th, the millheads were running \$16.00 per ton and the tailing assays were low about 35 cents

per ton. Free gold could be easily seen in the ore from the last drifting.

"When the new stope is prepared, the mine crew will be put on three shifts, and the tonnage of the mill stepped up to 60 tons per day. The recovery for the month following the 60 ton schedule should be \$10,000.00 or better. This amount will take care of all expenses at the mine and allow a surplus for exploration of new veins.

In concluding his report Dr. Gledhill, stated that after the mine is running steadily on a basis of 60 tons daily, it is proposed to do some diamond drilling in order to pick up other veins known to exist on the property.

Delosha Porcupine Mines Has 560 Acres in Shaw Twp.

Delosha Porcupine Mines Ltd. has been formed on two groups totalling approximately 560 acres in the southern part of Shaw township in the Porcupine district. No. 1 group of eight claims is located in the central part of the township near Arcadia Gold Mines, and the other, consisting of six claims, lies on the boundary of Deloro township.

The larger group was acquired from Nugold Mining Corporation in exchange for 800,000 shares. Considerable surface work has been done and the vein system has been traced for approximately 800 feet.

On the No. 2 group several promising showings are reported but further prospecting and exploration will also be necessary here to indicate definite possibilities.

Authorized capital is 3,500,000 shares and 1,200,000 were issued for properties. Officials state that cash payments have already been received in connection with financial arrangements made to supply finances for an aggressive campaign of exploration on both groups.

Progress Being Made at Aquarius Porcupine Mines

On the Aquarius Porcupine Gold Mines property, adjoining the Electra Porcupine, East Night Hawk Lake, Porcupine, No. 6 diamond drill hole, as at last report from the manager, was in green dolomite at 501 feet depth and continued to 523 feet. On this there was good quartz and rather scant mineralization. From 546 to 625 feet the condition was carbonate with narrow quartz stringers. From 467 to 480 feet this hole had been in grey siliceous greenstone, with the mineralization in the core good, and in general similar to core and mineralization in hole E-3. The programme will be extensively conducted.

The Aquarius Porcupine Gold Mines has ample funds in hand, the current assets being approximately \$90,000.

Pushing Exploration At Williamson Mines

Intensive surface exploration work is being pushed at the Porcupine property of Williamson Mines, Ltd., in preparation for the early commencement of the proposed diamond drill campaign, officials report. Stripping and trenching of the known vein system is being carried out, while a recent discovery described as the most important find to date, will be test-pitted immediately. Where picked up it showed a width of 100 feet. Samples of ore taken across widths of five, seven and eleven feet, from the vein opened up to date, returned assays of \$14; \$12.00; and \$21; respectively. One grab sample returned an assay of \$60 in gold per ton.

New Orebody Discovered on Seventh Level of Dome

A new orebody, this time on the seventh level, has been lately disclosed by Dome work on its Schumacher lot, near the line between this lot and the main Dome, and lying in the north-sedimentary trough. The ore previously reported is in greenstones on the 10th, 11th, 12th and 13th levels, and there was \$6,000,000 in ore developed early in the year, since increased. The new material is very good grade. Dome's No. 6 internal shaft at the beginning of the week was down 1460 feet; below the 16th level (2030 feet), reaching toward its immediate objective of the 31st level (4250 feet).
