Boys sometimes ask me what is the meaning of our motto, "BE PREPARED". Be Prepared, for what? The answer is BE PREPARED for Service! BE PREPARED to render efficient and effective help! Suppose you were confronted by some of the emergencies that many Scouts have faced? Could you meet them bravely and competently? Probably every boy wishes he could prove himself a hero in an emergency. How terrible to feel shamefully because he did not know what to do!

To BE PREPARED involves several things. First of all it involves physical fitness. Every boy should know the facts about his physical condition, should correct any handicaps that can be corrected, and follow simple rules that will help him to become strong and well. Here in Timmins boys are lucky to have a sport and physical development programme being developed by the T.P.A.A.A. Get into it and give what you've got. Get out of it what it has to offer—a better physical being.

To BE PREPARED involves a certain amount of simple technical training. I do not mean that every boy should be an expert, but unless he has a physical

handicap I do believe that every boy should learn how to be a good swimmer and master the simple fundamental principles of life saving and first aid. These he should practice until he feels confident that he knows how to do the right thing and is able to do it. Another very important part of this training is to think out in advance what he should do if this or that emergency came up. Then he will not be thrown into a panic, but courage based on confidence and sound knowledge of the facts, he can act quickly and efficiently.

TO BE PREPARED in every sense of the word a boy needs a trained mind as well as a trained body. If you want to square your life with this motto, get as much general education as you can and as much special training as possible. Even the most willing worker, if he is ignorant and does not know how to apply himself, cannot expect to be as helpful as the one whose mind is equipped and trained. Take your studies with a mind that is active and alert.

The King Scout Proficiency Badge offer a splendid field of training for emergencies. Let's get out after them and as well as really being PREPARED, become a Coronation King Scout.

Porcupine Fish and Game Protective Association Decide to Start Drive for Membership. Motion Pictures Shown of Hunting and Fishing Scenes in Moosonee Area. Meeting to be Held May 6th.

A meeting of the Porcupine Fish and Game Protective Association was held on Friday evening, April 16, in the Daffodil Tea Room in Schumacher at which it was decided to start a drive for membership. The membership fees are one dollar and the tickets may be obtained at Marshall-Ecclestone's and the Taylor Hardware in Timmins, J. R. Todd's Drug Store and the Schumacher Hardware in Schumacher and the Marshall-Ecclestone store in South Porcupine.

It is essential that a substantial membership be secured if the Association is to carry on with the re-stocking and conservation work which has been begun.

Motion pictures were shown by J. R. Todd of wild goose hunting and trout fishing in the Moosonee district and these will be reshown at a meeting to be held in the Daffodil Tea Room, Schumacher, at 8:00 on Thursday, May 6.

The election of officers which was billed for last evening, was put forward to the next meeting. At this meeting also, the re-seeding with wild rice and wild vegetable matter in Frederickhouse Lake before the completion of the dam with the resultant rising of the water, will be discussed.

The deposition of trout, and application for trout and pickerel will be taken up at this meeting and any person interested in re-stocking or conservation should attend.

The matter dealing with the organization of a Provincial Association was approved at the meeting on Friday evening, and figures brought in showed that the treasury showed a favourable balance. Expenses have been met in connection with the re-stocking of streams and 180,000 trout fingerlings have been deposited.

One other matter that will receive consideration at the next meeting is an application for pheasants and grouse for this district. An attempt was made once before to establish pheasants near the Coniaurum Mine but a number of hunters with very little restraint put an end to the colony.

All citizens in this district who are interested in fish and game protection and conservation are again cordially invited to be in attendance at the meeting of the Porcupine Fish and Game Protective Association on Thursday, May 6th, at 8 p.m., in the Daffodil Tea Room, Schumacher.
