Additional Supplies of Coronation Programmes

Believing that thousands of Canadians who are planning to listen in on the Coronation broadcast will only come to know at the last moment about the Official Coronation Programme, and its vital importance to an intelligent understanding of the proceedings, the King George's Jubilee Trust, have shipped to Canada, over and above the quantity ordered in the regular way through the trade, a reserve supply of 10,000 copies. These have been split up into small consignments, and warehoused with wholesale newsdealers from Halifax to Victoria.

Although the retail sale of the programme only opened on Friday last, many dealers report that they were completely sold out by Saturday night. In most cases stocks had all been reserved for customers who had been re-sighted enough to order in advance.

It should be welcome news, therefore, to those who were disappointed over the week-end, to learn that copies of the programme are still to be had. The trade are now being advised where to send for additional supplies, so the procedure for radio listeners anxious to secure a copy is to order through their bookseller at once. So far as the wholesalers are concerned, it will be strictly a case of "first come first served."

Sunday Connection to Montreal Train?

Matter Being Considered by T. & N. O. Officials.

Englehart, April 29—(Special to The Advance)—Revision of the new timetable effective at present on the T. & N. O. railway to provide a Sunday connection from Montreal and Ottawa not available under the existing schedule is receiving the attention of the officials of the road, it is stated here. What steps will be taken have not yet been determined and several proposals are under survey, these including a suggestion to run the local through from North Bay to Timmins on Sunday afternoons as on other days, with another tentative scheme to hold the early morning express at North Bay for some hours awaiting arrival there of the C.N.R. and C.P.R. trains from eastern points.

Last Sunday, first day the new schedule was in effect, passengers from the east had to remain over in North Bay until early Monday morning before catching a train for T. & N. O. points, as the second Toronto-Porcupine train does not run north on Sundays and the local starts its run this way at Cobalt on Sundays and goes back to Timmins. There is no difficulty southbound, as the through train from Timmins to Toronto on Sundays reaches North Bay in time to make regular connections eastward on both C.N.R. and C.P.R. lines.

The new train north is proving very acceptable from the point of view of mail for northern points, it is declared, and particularly for stations in Quebec mining areas, as it is possible now to get letters away on the early train and catch the connections at Cochrane and Rouyn the same day. Formerly, a day was lost at these points. At this end of the district, the late train is not getting much of the mail for southern points, since it is possible to make No. 46, and postmaster E. J. Holland at Cobalt told the correspondent that, on the first day, he had only four letters for the outgoing south late mail, and on second evening but three, none of them for Toronto.
