A very large membership was enrolled at the meeting and it is hoped that more members than ever will join the association. Membership tickets will be secured at the Taylor Hardware Company, J. R. The membership fee, which in former years was set at three dollars, was reduced to one dollar.

It was recommended and decided that a junior boys' club should be organized and affiliated with the senior association. The fee to join this club will be twenty-five cents. Educational programmes will be held at different intervals in order to teach the juniors the fundamentals of hunting, fishing, and the general conservation of wild life.

The association have applied for trout and Hungarian partridges, while pheasant eggs have already been set.

Moving pictures, depicting hunting and fishing scenes in the James Bay district, were shown by Mr. J. R. Todd after the meeting closed, and were greatly appreciated by all present. It was suggested that the same pictures be shown to the junior club in the near future.

A public-address radio car, two floats from the Consumers' Co-operative and other local merchants and businesses.

In the younger element there will be floats of groups of the Girl Guides and Brownies, Boy Scouts and Cubs.

There is also expected to be groups of High and Vocational students.

Music will be provided by the Timmins Citizens' Band, the Lions Club Boys' band, the Porcupine District Pipe band, the Tisdale band.

In addition to the above the floats and groups taking part in the Schumacher and South Porcupine celebrations will parade along with the Timmins contingent.

After the monster parade here the floats only will return the visit to Schumacher and South Porcupine.

The parade route will travel along the following streets and avenues, leaving the ball grounds at 2:00 p.m. sharp.

Pine street to Fourth avenue.

Fourth avenue to Spruce street.

Spruce street to Fifth avenue.

Along Fifth avenue to Vimy road.

Vimy road to Third avenue.

Along Third avenue to the T. & N. O. Station.

Marching groups will then leave parade but floats will proceed to South Porcupine and Schumacher.

It is specially desired to emphasize the fact that all the general public not taking part in the procession will be excluded from the ball park until after the parade is concluded. All organizations and floats taking part in the procession will enter the ball park at the south end entrance on Cedar street where they will be allotted their position in the parade. The rigid observance of these two rules is absolutely necessary for the successful handling of the parade, and the co-operation of all is earnestly requested.

The following is an outline of the programme for Wednesday:

10:30 a.m.—School children's massed voices accompanied by Lions Club Boys' Band in special patriotic and Coronation music. Short addresses by prominent citizens in the Ball grounds.

2:00 p.m.—The monster Coronation procession leaves Ball park as outlined above.

9:30 p.m.—Monster Fireworks display. Citizens are asked to view same from Lake Shore road side of Gillies Lake; in other words any vantage point opposite Hollinger compressor plant building.

Three Coronation Day Dances: The Ladies' Auxiliary, Emprie Hotel; The I. O. D. E. Coronation Ball at the Riverside Pavilion and the Schumacher Lions Club Coronation dance at the Croatian hall, Schumacher.
