## Action Dismissed in Mining Lands Deal

Action Brought by Baptiste David, of Timmins, and Others.

Despatches this week from Toronto say:—

"In a judgment handed down at Osgoode hall, Mr. Justice J. Keiller Mackay dismissed action concerning certain mining lands purchased by Hollinger Exploration Company.

"The action was brought by Baptiste David, of Timmins, Edouard Ross, of Hespel Township, and Frank Tremblay, Teck township prospector, against Harry J. Fine, Kirkland Lake solicitor; Patrick J. Brennan, Toronto; W. J. Hanley, solicitor, Toronto; J. B. Holden, K.C. Toronto; Percy C. Finlay, Toronto solicitor; Hollinger Exploration Company Limited and Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines Ltd.

"Plaintiffs asked for cancellation of an agreement between themselves and Hollinger Exploration or \$75,000 damages.

"Ross owned certain farm lands. Tremblay owned adjoining unpatented mining claims. In June 1933, with David, they made a joint agreement giving each an equal interest in the properties.

"In October 1933, they agreed to sell to Brennan for \$150,000 and a week later he received \$225,000 in an agreement with Hollinger Exploration.

## Dispute Settled in Kirkland Lake Case

Damages Arranged in Case Where Sellers of Bakery Opened New Shop.

According to a despatch from Hallsby, after many attempts, a settlement was finally reached in the case of Paul Wozniak of Kirkland Lake against Joseph and Mary Szalajko of the same place in their dispute over an agreement alleged to have been made by Szalajko two years after selling out his interest in the Purity Bakery to the plaintiff.

It had been alleged by the plaintiff that the starting up of the Modern Bakery by the wife of the defendant (through her brother who was in reality an attempt by the first named to break the agreement and a damage suit had resulted in which a verdict had been given for the plaintiff without damages being assessed. The case was appealed and the Toronto Court ruled that the judgment should stand and that damages should be assessed by Judge Henry Hartman, acting as referee. The damages were accordingly fixed at \$3600 and costs and the present suit was instituted for the purpose of collection.

The case started on Thursday at Hallsby and on the following morning His Lordship Mr. Justice Jeffrey made the first attempt to get the two parties together. He stated that the case presented many difficulties and legal technicalities and warned the contestants that "law is a luxury and in many cases the winner loses."

Following this an attempt was made to reach an amicable basis of settlement without result and the case continued with a further effort being made to settle the dispute later in the day. This time His Lordship warned the parties that "you now have two bakeries which may not go up in smoke but they will go up in law costs." Then followed a protracted effort to get together each side taking to heart His Lordship's advice to do a little horse trading and through the efforts of M. G. Hunt, plaintiff's counsel, and J. T. Jackson for the defence an agreement was finally reached whereby the defendants would pay to the plaintiff \$1350 and each side would take care of their costs.

## Esteemed Pioneer of Timmins Passes

Wm. McHugh, Dies on Monday Afternoon. Funeral To-day.

Timmins lost another of its well-known and esteemed residents on Monday afternoon, May 10th, in the person of Wm. McHugh, who passed away after an illness of some months. The late Wm. McHugh was a native of Scotland, and was 69 years of age at the time of his death. He was one of the charter members of the Caledonian Society of Timmins and was prominent in Scottish affairs in town. No Burns banquet seemed complete unless Wm. McHugh made the haggis and he had his own able way of giving the full address to the haggis. Mr. McHugh was also prominent in Masonic circles, being a member of the Order for many years. He was in charge of the Masonic hall here for many years.

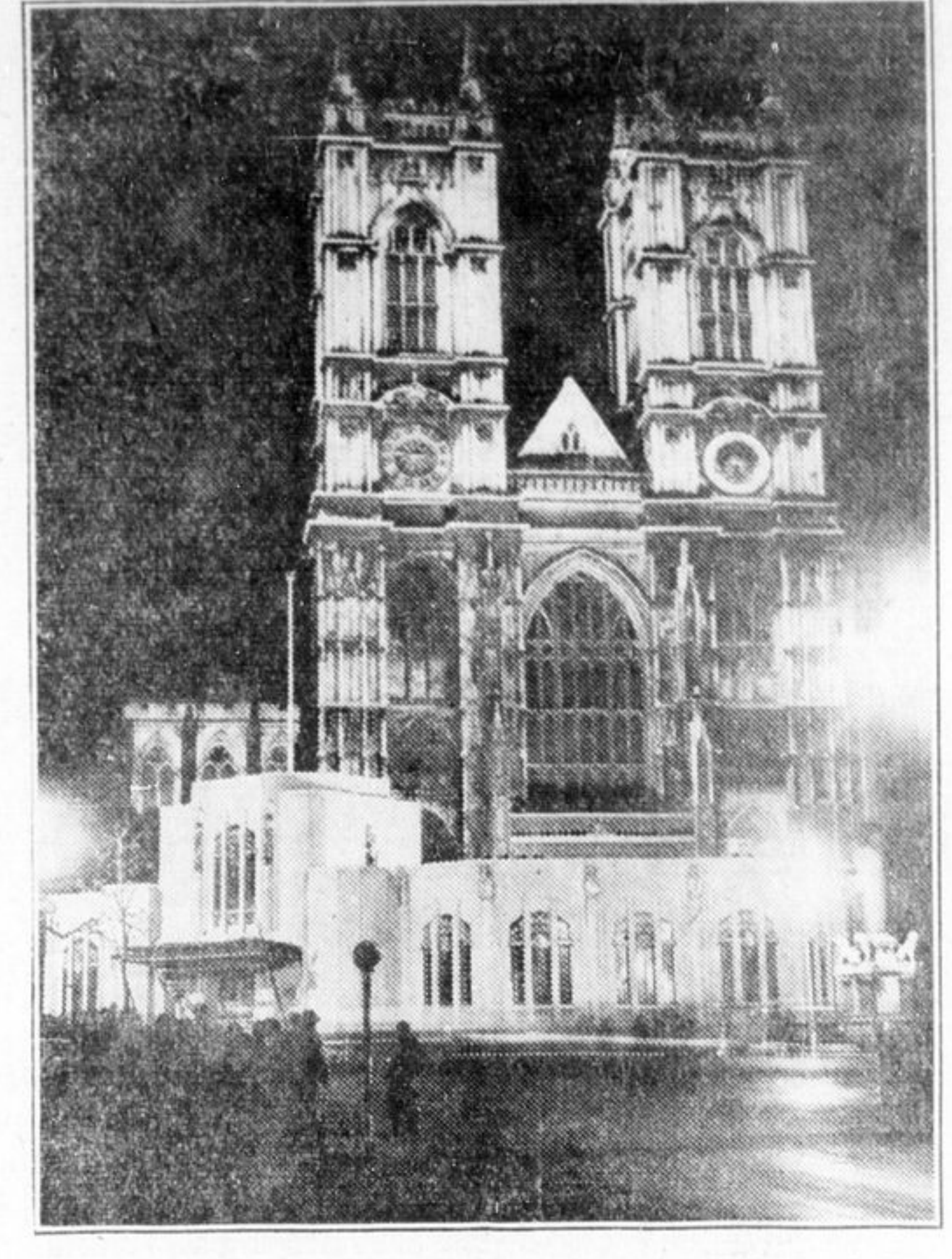
The late Mr. McHugh came to Timmins twenty-three years ago and was first with the Gordon Davies firm, going then with J. R. Gordon, Hollinger Stores and Pioneer Stores in succession. More recently he was caretaker of the S. Bucovsky Limited store here.

In addition to the bereaved widow, he is survived by one daughter, Mrs. H. Stevenson, of Schumacher, and one son, W. G. McHugh, accountant at the Northern Canada Power Co. here. To these the sympathy of all will be extended in their loss.

The funeral was held this afternoon with Masonic honours, service being held in the United Church of Timmins and interment being made at South Porcupine cemetery.

## Investigation Into the Death of Young Woman

Prof. L. J. Rogers, Provincial Analyst, and Dr. Edgar Frankish, Provincial medico-legal expert, have commenced investigation of the internal organs of Marjorie MacMurchy, of Collingwood, whose death is shrouded in murder suspicions.

The former associate editor of the Collingwood Enterprise-Bulletin was reported missing on April 15, and last Friday her body was found in the harbour. An autopsy was held at Collingwood. The internal organs were sent to Toronto. Professor Rogers will endeavour to trace poison, while Dr. Frankish will conduct other medical investigation. The woman's organs arrived in Toronto Monday afternoon.

## Production of Bullion Drops at Dome for April

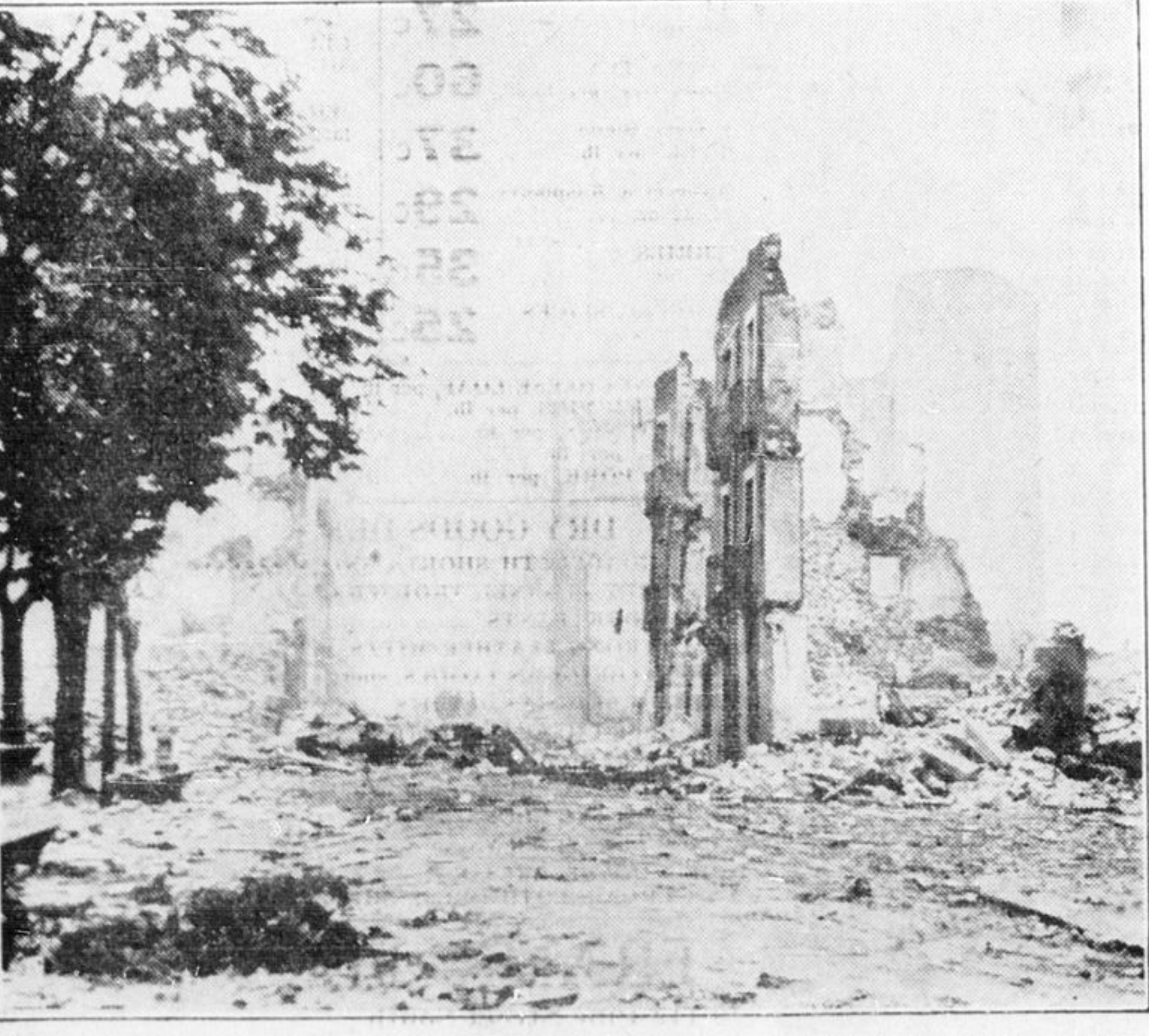
Due to decreased tonnage and treatment of lower grade ore during April, value of bullion produced by Dome Mines, Porcupine district, was down \$40,498 from the previous month.

Output was valued at \$599,265 from treatment of 47,600 tons, average recovery being \$12.59 per ton. In March, output was valued at \$639,763 from the treatment of 48,700 tons, with average recovery of \$13.14.

In the first four months of the year production reached \$2,500,888 from treatment of 188,400 tons, average recovery being \$13.29. Comparative monthly figures are as follows:
