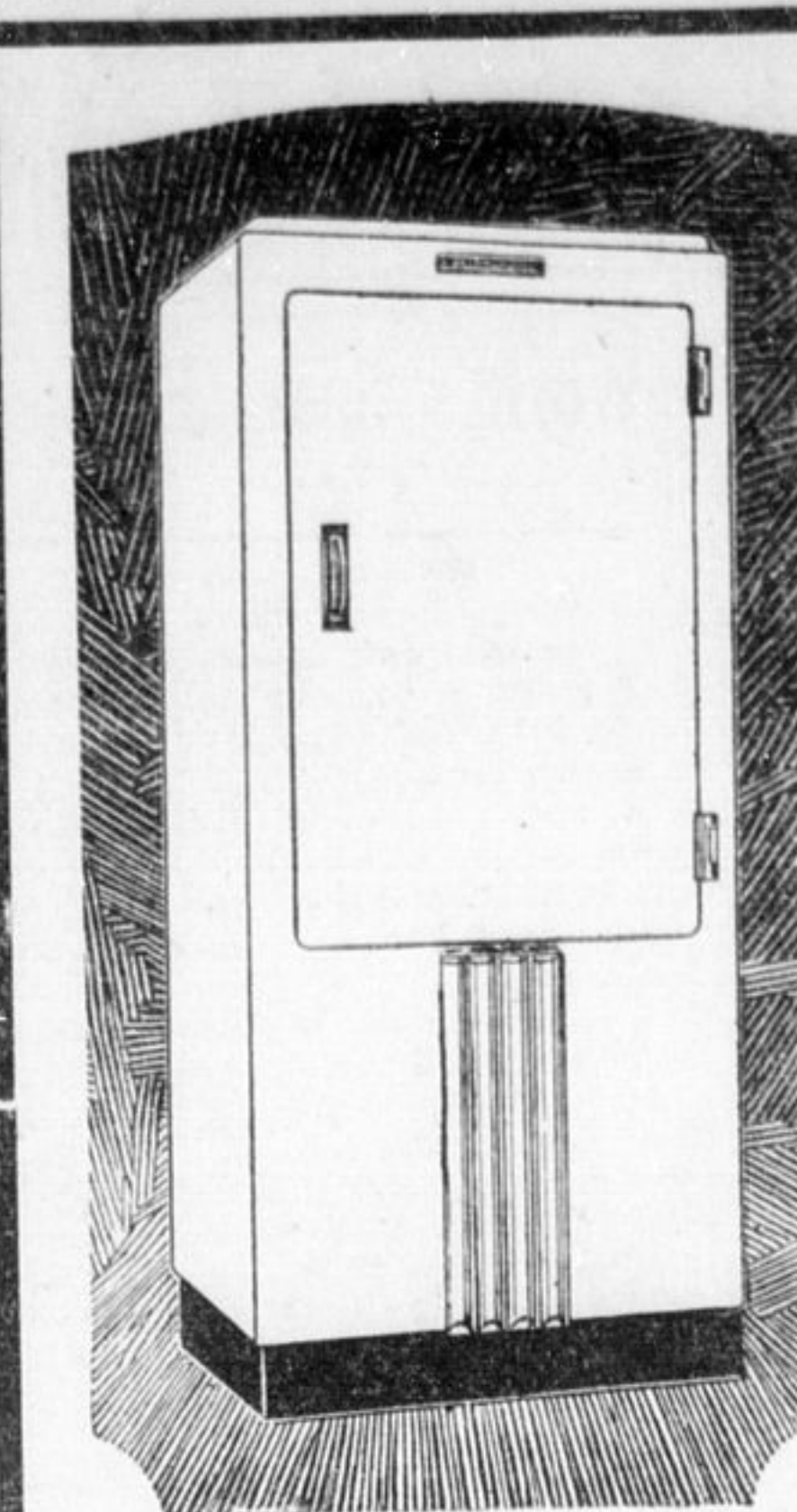

At Tuesday's court, before Magistrate Atkinson the following cases were heard. First one of reckless driving, accused pleaded not guilty. Constable Woods said on May 12th, while the Coronation parade was passing a certain spot, the accused backed up about seventy feet. He was going backwards parallel with the parade, to the danger of the persons in the float. Magistrate Atkinson gave him the benefit of the doubt and dismissed the case. A case of the theft of \$63 against a Schumacher man was not heard as the case for the prosecution was not ready. The accused was remanded to the hearing in Timmins on Tuesday afternoon when the prosecution would have their case ready. In a case of keeping liquor for sale, the accused was released on bail and remanded until next Tuesday's court. Next case was one of having beer in possession. Accused pleaded guilty. Constable Woods said:—"The man was running a joint in Moneta and cans of beer were found in the house and in hiding in the wood pile." Accused was fined \$100 and costs or 30 days and the placed declared public for a year. A case of parking without lights was not served. A local case of assault involving two men was settled out of court, the accused paying the costs of the court, \$10.25. This closed the proceedings for this week.
