Cobalt Chief of Police Resigns Before Raise

Cobalt, June 3—(Special to The Advance)—Increases in salary aggregating \$66.50 monthly were granted six municipal employees here when town council met Tuesday night, and the largest raise, a \$20 boost for the chief of police, was made a few minutes after P. H. Miller, holder of that office for some time past, and tendered his resignation in a brief letter to council. He gave no reasons or hints of his future plans, but asked to be relieved of his duties by Saturday night. He is leaving police work, it is understood. The chief has been receiving \$100 monthly, but in the new scale of salaries presented by Councillor H. W. Rowdon, chairman of the finance committee, the rate for his successor will be \$120 per month. Other raises were \$10 monthly for A. W. Harrington, town clerk, Mrs. Rena Lockhart, the office assistant, P. J. Murphy, pumpman, and William Stinson, town foreman, while the day's pay of Isadore Mercier, teamster, will be stepped up by twenty-five cents, from \$3.50 to \$3.75. Increases are effective with June 15 cheques.
