"Associations of the people of the Empire is rooted, and their fellowship is rooted in this doctrine of essential dignity of the individual human soul. That is the English secret, however feebly and faintly we have at times and places embraced and obeyed it.

"The torch I would hand down to you and would ask you to pass from hand to hand along the pathways of the Empire is a great Christian truth rekindled anew in each ardent generation. Use men as ends and never merely as means and live for the brotherhood of man, which implies the fatherhood of God."

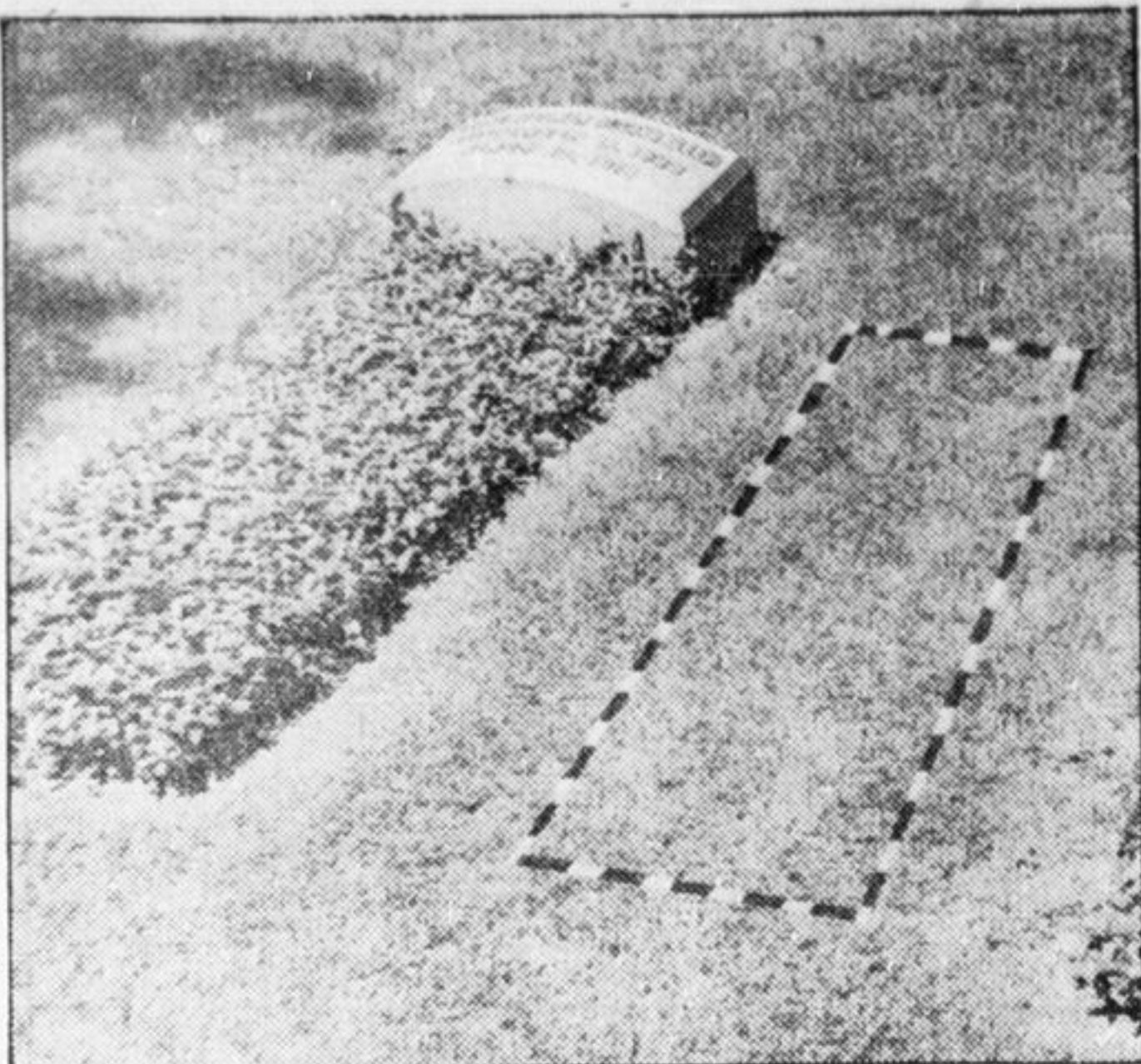

### Compares Zeppelin to Ship Carrying Dynamite

(Buffalo Courier-Express) Certainly to send 100 human beings aloft in a hydrogen-filled Zeppelin; seems analogous to putting a like number aboard a train to which a dynamite-laden car is attached—or afloat on a ship with a cargo of high explosive.

The train might go thousands of miles without the dynamite car exploding. The ship might be brought safely into port by a skillful skipper, just as the Hindenburg and the Graf Zeppelin have completed many transatlantic flights under the mastery of handling of Germany's sky navigators. to human life was present through every mile which the Hindenburg flew before it met disaster. And the hazard was there, because a hydrogen-filled Zeppelin could make bigger profits than a helium-filled Zeppelin.

But even helium doesn't make a dirigible safe—as the United States navy knows to its sorrow. Washington despatches report revival of the old controversy between the heavier-than-air and lighter-than-air schools of aviation thought. We see no need for reviving an argument which the heavier-than-air advocates won long ago.

The American people are not particularly interested in that technical debate between two schools of flying thought. Sentiment in this country is clearly against further sacrifice of American lives in new Macons or new Akrons.

### Young Reds Walked Out of Congress of Youth

(From Globe and Mail) With the indiscretion of their years, two delegates representing the Revolutionary Youth League withdrew from the Canadian Youth Congress meeting in Montreal, and in so doing revealed still more vividly what is in the minds of all extreme radicals. Why did these delegates withdraw? The congress had approved a basis of procedure, submitted by the French-Canadian delegation, enabling all groups to co-operate. Included in the points agreed upon were these:

That the congress proceeds according to the principles of democracy, and affirms: (a) Belief in God; (b) the right of individuals to private property; (c) the necessity for internal peace and co-operation between all classes; (d) the sanctity of the human personality. Also that "the congress condemn subversive doctrine."

This was too much for the Revolutionary Youth delegates. In due order, of course, they issued a statement, condemning "as fascist" the clause referring to belief in God and other views of the congress as set forth above.

Obviously, it was a blunder, this unnecessary exposure of the revolutionary views of this organization. Older "Reds" are more cautious. Better to sow this kind of seed in the underhand way. But impetuous youth shouts its views from the housetops. And these too impetuous delegates indicated definitely that their kind have no place in an assembly of Canadian youth. Attending the congress are delegates representing 487 youth organizations, with a membership of 531,435. If nothing else came of the meeting in Montreal, it is of importance as revealing to the young people of Canada exactly what they may expect from the revolutionary group.

### Clear Summer Camps of Poison Ivy Pest

Tillage the Most Effective Plan, but Other Methods Help.

The eradication of poison ivy in the vicinity of holiday camps, summer cottages, and tourist resorts is being undertaken by various communities throughout Canada. Although nothing is so effective against poison ivy as tillage, this method is usually out of the question where eradication is most needed in nooks and rocky situations in the close proximity to temporary or permanent residents. As pointed out in the circular issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture entitled "Poison Ivy," eradication by hand is a laborious substitute for tillage, but removal of the pest bodily is often the simplest and surest way to clean out small areas around dwellings. Incidentally, it is an interesting point that cattle, sheep, and goats can eat poison ivy with impunity and seem to relish it. Extensive tests of chlorate herbicides have shown them to have advantages in several respects over other chemical weed-killers. Sodium chlorate is a compound at present cheapest and easiest to procure, as it is sold by all wholesale druggists. A 10 per cent solution (one pound to a gallon of water) of sodium chlorate is applied as a spray at the rate of a gallon for 200 square feet. The first application may be made about the first of June when the leaves are well spread. Information on the treatment of ivy poisoning, and how to recognize and eradicate the plant will be found in the circular which may be obtained free on application to the Publicity Extension Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

### Mother of Allan Renton Passes Away at Kingston

Mrs. Renton, of Kingston, who had been visiting her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Allan Renton, of 16 Cherry street, Timmins, for the past two weeks, died of heart attack at her home in Kingston on Tuesday. Mrs. Renton is survived by five sons: Dr. John Renton, of Trenton; Dr. H. T. Renton, of Kingston; James, member of staff of Bank of Commerce in Toronto; Bill, residing with his mother in Kingston; and Allan, of Timmins. Mr. and Mrs. Allan Renton left here on Tuesday to attend the funeral at Kingston.

### Ice Cream Regarded Now as Regular Food

Department of Agriculture at Ottawa Recommends Some Recipes.

No longer should ice cream be regarded as a special treat for holidays and hot days, but rather as a part of the regular diet, being served as a dessert at all seasons of the year.

Like all dairy products ice cream is a nutritious food, easily digested, palatable and containing all the elements essential to body building and good health—fat, protein, carbohydrates and vitamins. When made from fresh, clean-flavored cream it has a delicacy of taste which makes it an ideal food for young and old. The following recipes are recommended by the Milk Utilization Service, Dairy and Cold Storage Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture:

**Vanilla Ice Cream No. 1**  
(Using freezer)  
1 cup milk  
2 teaspoons flour  
½ cup sugar  
Pinch of salt  
1 egg  
1 pint cream (16-18 per cent. fat)  
1 tablespoon vanilla.  
Heat ¾ cup milk. Mix sugar, flour and salt with remaining ¼ cup milk and add to hot milk. Cook over hot water about 10 minutes. Pour over beaten egg. Return to heat and cook 2 minutes. Strain and cool. Add vanilla and cream. Freeze. This makes one quart of ice cream.

Note:—Flour may be omitted and 2 eggs used instead of 1. 1½ cups milk and 1½ cups cream may be used instead of 1 cup milk and 1 pint cream.

**Vanilla Ice Cream No. 2**  
(Refrigerator)  
1 teaspoon granulated gelatine  
1 tablespoon cold water  
1 cup milk  
½ cup sugar  
1 tablespoon flour  
Pinch of salt  
1 egg  
1½ cups whipping cream  
1½ teaspoons vanilla.  
Soak gelatine in cold water. Heat ¾ cup milk. Mix sugar, flour and salt with remaining ¼ cup milk and add to hot milk. Cook about 10 minutes. Pour over beaten egg. Return to heat and cook 2 minutes. Add soaked gelatine. Chill. Fold in cream which has been whipped. Pour into refrigerator trays and freeze.  
Note: The egg white may be beaten separately and folded in with the cream.

### Maple Cream Sauce

1 cup maple syrup, ½ cup cream. Boil syrup and cream to soft-ball stage (232 degrees F.) Beat 1 minute. Serve on ice cream either plain or with ½ cup chopped nut meats.

### Strawberry Ice Cream

(Using freezer)  
1 pint cream  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
½ cup sugar  
¾ cup crushed strawberries  
½ cup sugar  
Crush the fruit and sprinkle with the ½ cup sugar. Mix remaining ingredients and freeze. Add crushed fruit when mixture is nearly frozen. Any fruit may be used in the same way, the amount of sugar being varied according to the sweetness of the fruit. Before adding sugar to seedy fruits such as raspberries, crush through a sieve to remove the seeds.

### Baldwin's Ringing Message to the Free

Words of Truth and Beauty to the Youth of Empire.

(An editorial in The Ottawa Journal) In an address which he described as "the last speech I will make before a great audience as Prime Minister of this country," Mr. Baldwin on Tuesday spoke words which for their truth and beauty must rank as one of the noblest utterances of his time. Indeed, The Journal ventures to say that it was a speech not merely in the authentic accents of British eloquence, but which for its wisdom, its philosophy and its ringing faith in freedom, takes its place beside the finest pronouncements in the language within a century.

Mr. Baldwin, speaking to youth, began with this passage of beauty:

"I have had my hour, I pass soon into the shade; but for you life lies before you like a boundless ocean, and the imagination of youth is busy launching flotillas of dream ships upon its waters. It's not only young men who dream dreams, nor old men who see visions."

"And then came this advice, so applicable to our own country:  
"In the next quarter of a century, as you come to play your part in the great world, the big problems will be the problems of government. The people of the world, disillusioned by the horrors of the war, are all seeking eagerly, earnestly for what they conceive to be the best form of government in which their peoples may find happiness, security and develop their talents to their best. So I say to you, take an interest in govern-

ment."  
After quoting a famous passage from Burke on the duties of citizenship, and making it his text, Mr. Baldwin went on to define his own conceptions of the citizen. Thus:

"And when I talk of your country I mean all its activities all that it comprehends the well-being of the people, their content, their education, their religion, their professions, their business, their public affairs, the capital of the village, of the county, of the province, of the country."

And again:  
"The beauty of the countryside is yours, the green fields, the trees, the wild flowers, the rivers, the moors, the prairies and the hills, and the treasures from the ages of literature and art, all these are yours. The accumulated wealth, material and moral, is being and will be transferred to your account that you may enjoy it."

Followed penetrating and inspiring passages on democracy, a rapid survey of the changes of the past 70 years, and then Mr. Baldwin went on to "proclaim my faith":

"Here we have ceased to be an island, but we are still an Empire and what is her secret? Freedom, ordered freedom within the law, with force in the background and not in the foreground; a society in which authority and freedom are blended in due proportions, in which state and citizen are both ends and means; an Empire, organized for peace and for the free development of the individual through an infinite variety of voluntary associations that neither defy the state nor its rulers.

"The old doctrine of the divine right of kings has gone, but we have no intention of erecting in its place a new doctrine of the divine right of states, for
