

## ICED TEA

Iced tea is a deliciously different cool drink and it is very easily made.

Use 6 heaping teaspoons of "Salada" Black Tea. Infuse Tea in one pint of freshly boiled water for six minutes.

11/2 cups of granulated sugar, and juice of two lemons.

Then shake or stir contents well, until sugar is thoroughly dissolved. Fill container with cold water. Do not allow tea to cool before adding the cold water; otherwise, liquid will become cloudy.

This is now ready to serve in tall glasses with chipped ice or cubes. A slice of lemon may be added if desired. The above will make two quarts of iced tea, or 7 tall glasses.
