An attempt is being made to have the district tennis finals played here during the week of festivities. There has been no definite word received in this regard. Ordinarily the tennis championships would be played in Kapuskasing this year.

It was reported that the draws on the house and car are progressing favourably. It is expected that the house will be completed by June 25th.

Hooby and amateur shows will be staged for both boys and girls and prizes will be awarded to the winners in various classes.

A street dance will be held during the week and there will be nightly dancing on a special platform which will be raised in the ball park.

A carnival has been engaged by the Lions Club and it will also be situated in the ball park.

The streets will be well decorated with coloured lights and pennants. Special information and registration booths will be built and the archway will be redecorated.

One of the largest parades ever seen in the North will be held during the week. Between 40 and 50 large floats have already been promised for this event. National societies will turn out in costume on this day and they will present their native dances and folk-songs on the platform in the ball park. Prizes will be given for the best-decorated floats in the parade. Owners of the best-dressed store windows in town will also be rewarded.

It was understood at the time that the Timmins dog team visited Ottawa, that the Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King would visit Timmins for the celebration. It is not known whether or not he will be able to be here, but a second invitation is being cabled to him. Other federal and provincial representatives will be present.

A sound-truck, from which all activities will be broadcasted, has been donated to the Lions Club for the week by a leading Canadian manufacturer.

Special activities are being planned for the members of the "Old-Timers" Association. The souvenir book, which is being compiled by Noel Arthur, is almost completed. This book will give a full history of the Porcupine district from the time that canoes provided the only possible mode of travel until the present day.

The Lions Club wishes to thank all the public-minded citizens who have recognized the need of a community centre and have donated money for this project. They also wish to thank all the societies and organizations in town who have helped immeasurably in furthering the work.

## Change in T. & N. O. Trains on June 27th

Englehart, June 10—(Special to The Advance)—Effective on June 27, a change will be made by the management of the T. & N. O. Railway in the running of the through train north-bound on Sundays, the schedule being rearranged to drop the "Northland" on that day and substitute train No. 47. The latter, running on its regular weekday schedule, will revert to its former status of a daily train, and the alteration in timetables will mean that passengers from Montreal, Ottawa, and other eastern points will be enabled to make immediate connections for T. & N. O. points on Sundays, as on other days.

Readjustment of the service in the manner indicated has been rumored for some time past, and is due, it is indicated, to the existing lack of connections on Sundays at North Bay from points east of that city. At present, passengers from such centres reaching North Bay on Sunday mornings are required to wait almost 20 hours before being able to continue their journeys early the following day, but the rearranged timetable obviates this difficulty. Under the new schedule, the "Northland", the T. & N. O.'s new express train, will not travel over its lines on Sundays in either direction.

No other changes are contemplated at present it is indicated, but there are reports that railway officials are giving consideration to a bus service over Number Eleven Highway through from North Bay possibly as far as Porcupine. No official announcement has been made on this point, but it is understood three new buses, equipped for long distance travel, are available for such a service, should one be decided upon. The distance between North Bay and Timmins by road is rather longer than the 259 miles required by rail.
