Snake Mounted Here Shipped to Winnipeg

Large Python that Died Here Returns to Conklin's Shows.

While Conklin's Shows were in Timmins some weeks ago one of their large snakes, a python measuring 22 feet 5 inches in length, died and was left behind to be properly mounted and forwarded to the shows. Charles Seguin, who lives at 53 Avenue road, was given the work of mounting the big snake and this taxidermist did a good job. The snake mounted in life-like way was duly boxed and shipped yesterday by Mr. Seguin to the Conklin Shows at Winnipeg.

When asked by The Advance yesterday whether he could tell what had been the cause of death of the big snake Mr. Seguin said that during his work on the body as taxidermist it was plain to him that the python died as a result of starvation, and the starvation was due to the fact that an injury to the snake made it impossible for it to eat. The injury so far as he could judge had been of long standing—perhaps as long ago as a year. He could not say what was likely to cause the injury but it was evident that whatever the cause the result was that the snake would avoid eating to save itself severe pain. With the injury sustained, it was a wonder, Mr. Seguin said, that the snake had lived so long. The python was an unusually large specimen and comparatively rare. It was very valuable and its death was a serious loss to the shows.

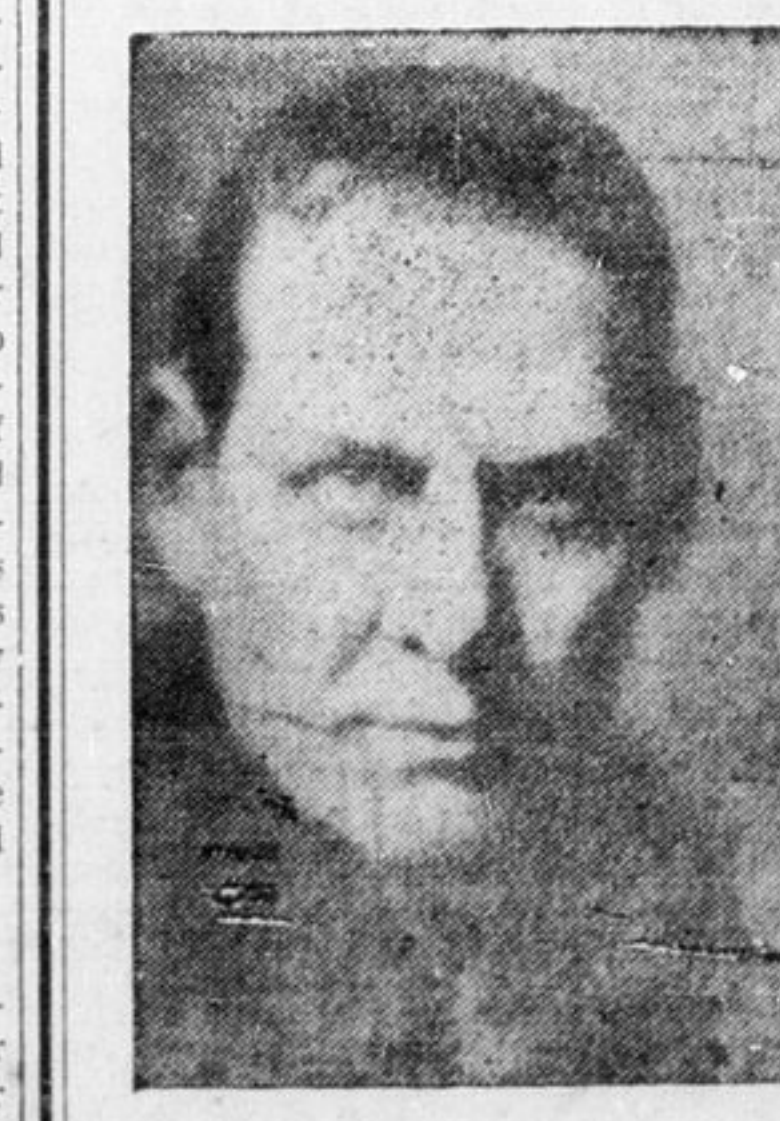
