References to Recent Convention at Meeting of Lions Club on Thursday. Praise for Boys' Band. New Officers to Take Over on July 10th

Lions Club keys were presented to Dr. R. W. Hughes, I. Whitney, William Wren and F. H. V. Ball at their regular meeting last night.

These keys are given to members who bring in at least two new members to the club during the course of a year. Dr. Hughes had previously won a key, but it was a new experience for the other members.

Edwin R. Kingsley congratulated the gentlemen on their fine accomplishment. He related the history of the "key" and said that it had been carried on by all Lions Clubs for a great many years and it is a thing that every good Lion looks forward to receiving.

Dr. Hughes replied for those who were receiving the keys. He said that there were quite a number of "key" members in the club and he predicted that inside the next two years the number would jump to 15 or 20.

Alex Allen, Morris Belanger, Charlie Brown, Fred Wolno and F. H. V. Ball, all of whom were delegates at the Ontario-Quebec showboat convention on June 13th-15th, gave a report on their activities during the trip.

Mr. Allen acted as spokesman for the delegation. He was very enthusiastic in his praise for F. H. V. Ball who, he said, topped the poll in the voting for representatives for the board of governors. Mr. Ball received 159 votes out of a possible 160. Mr. Allen mentioned the manner in which the numerous delegates were met when they langed

William Wren, chairman of the Old Home Week committee, reported that all final plans have been made for the week's festivities and that he could safely say that the anniversary celebration will provide entertainment which will long be remembered in the North.

Dr. O. J. Stahl, retiring president of the local club, announced that there would be no meeting on July 1st, but the new officers would take charge at a special meeting to be held on Saturday, July 10th.

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Heat Wave Here for Past Couple of Days

Another Cigarette Blamed for Causing Another Fire.

The longest heat wave of this year fell upon the Porcupine district last week last Friday and Saturday, when for 48 hours, the temperature never dropped below 64 degrees and for the greater part of the time it hovered around the 85 degree mark.

The average maximum temperature for the past four days was 81 degrees

and the average minimum temperature was 65.75 degrees. The individual temperatures were as follows: Thursday, June 24th, max. 85, min. 68; Friday, June 25th, max. 86, min. 64; Saturday, June 26th, max. 71, min. 65; Sunday, June 27th, max. 82, min. 66. Last night the mercury dropped to a low of 60 degrees and at 8.00 a.m. this morning the temperature was 62 degrees.

Precipitation—Rain fell on Saturday from 1.00 p.m. until 5.00 p.m. to a depth of .06 inches.

Forecast—Generally fair and continuing warm. There will probably be a few light showers to-night.

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
