Information About Labour and Unions

Interesting and Valuable Statistics in Regard to Labour in 25th Annual Report of Dept.

The twenty-fifth annual report on Labour Organization in Canada, covering the calendar year 1935, has been published recently by the Dominion Department of Labour...

for the past 25 years was as follows:

Reporting Local Branch Unions:—Of the 2728 local branch unions in the Dominion, 2289 reported a combined membership of 206,036, 73 per cent. of the total.

Trade Union Membership:—The information concerning trade union membership included in the report has been obtained from the officers of the various central labour bodies and from departmental records...

Trade Union Membership in Canadian Cities:—Twenty-eight cities in Canada reported at least 20 local branch unions. Their 1312 reporting branches represented 57 per cent. of all reporting branches...

The above figures indicate that there were in Canada, at the close of 1935, a total of 2728 trade union branches, 12 less than in 1934...

members; Halifax, 41 branches, 39 reporting 3451 members; Saskatoon, 41 branches, 38 reporting 1864 members; St. John, 41 branches, 35 reporting 2499 members; Victoria, 41 branches, 33 reporting 1355 members; Windsor, 39 branches, 26 reporting 2210 members...

Trade Union Benefits:—In 1935 five of the 23 Canadian central organizations reported payments for benefits, the total disbursed being \$27,371.24, a decrease of \$56,722.76 as compared with 1934.

Of the 82 international organizations operating in Canada, 54 had expenditures for benefits, the combined disbursements in Canada and the United States being \$18,131,478.00, an increase of \$221,793.00. The outlay for each class of benefit was as follows:

Banana All-Brain Nut Bread 1 cup shortening 1/2 cup sugar 1 egg (well beaten) 1 cup all bran 1 1/2 cups flour 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon soda 1/2 cup chopped nut meats 1 1/2 cups mashed bananas 2 tablespoons water 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

All Bran Apricot Bread 1 cup chopped dried apricots 1 1/2 cups sour milk or buttermilk 3 tablespoons shortening 1/2 cup sugar 1 egg 1 1/2 cups all bran 2 cups flour 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon soda 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg 1/2 cup chopped nut meats

Soak chopped apricots in milk about 15 minutes. Cream shortening and sugar thoroughly; add egg, beat until creamy. Add all bran apricots and milk. Let soak until most of moisture is taken up.

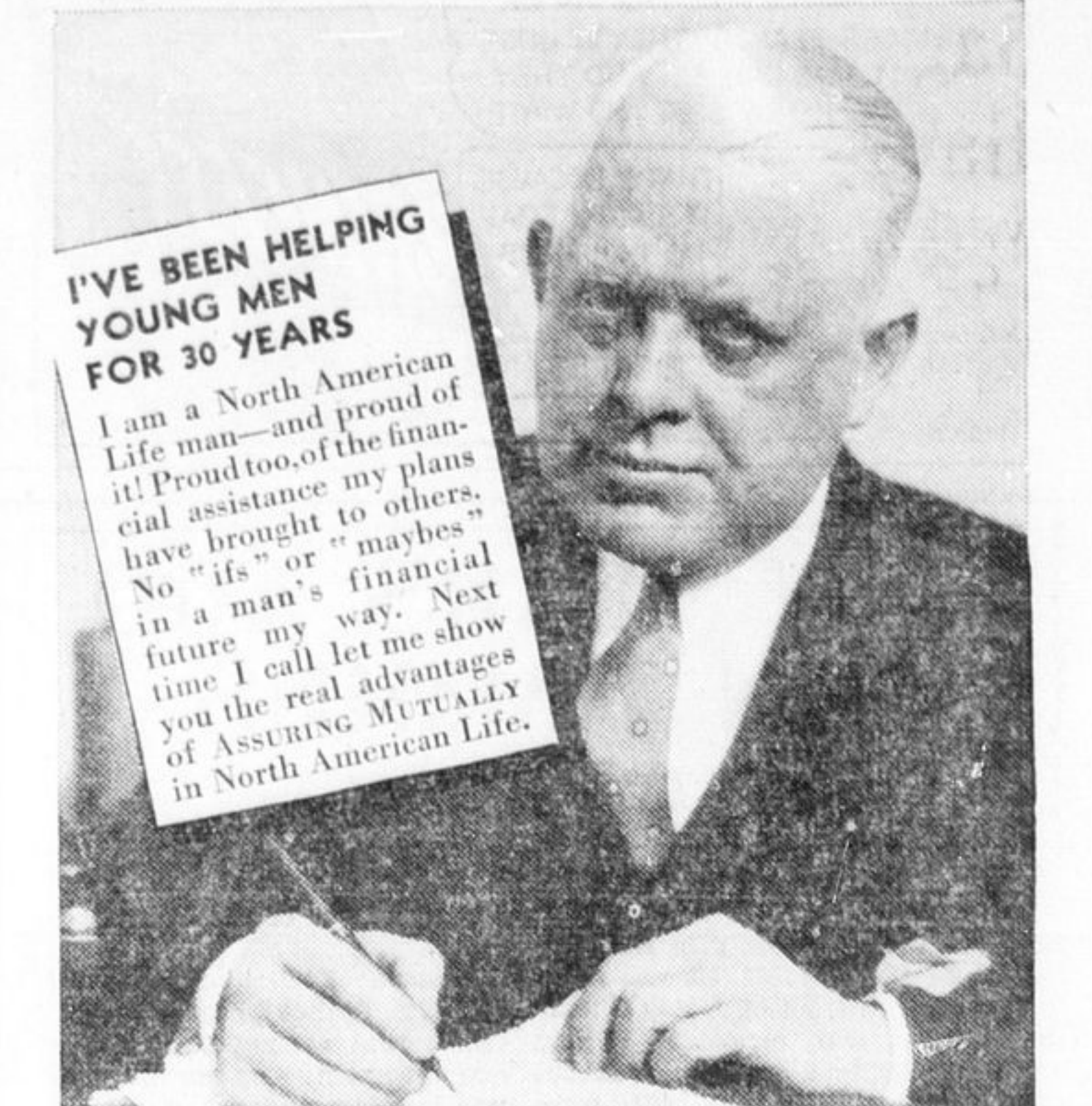
Chocolate Pudding 2 squares (2 ounces) unsweetened chocolate 3 cups milk 3 shredded whole wheat biscuits 2 eggs 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Put chocolate and milk in top of double boiler and cook over hot water until milk is scalded. Beat with rotary beater to combine melted chocolate and milk. Put biscuits in a greased casserole and pour hot mixture over them; let soak about 15 minutes.
