### Berrigan With Beard

Police finally caught up with James Berrigan who had been charged with being drunk on August 7th. Berrigan appeared in court with a beard that must have been growing since that time, admitted being drunk on that and two previous occasions and was sent down for three months. Ed Walker took 30 days as a second offender. He might have paid a \$50 fine but couldn't raise the money. Four first offenders were assessed \$10 or 30 days. Fighting in a public place cost one citizen \$10. A remand was granted to a man accused of looking in people's windows at night.

Other reckless drivers fined were Herbert Harwood, and Wilfred Barrette. Adjudgments were granted in two other cases.

Defective brakes cost one driver \$10 and another paid \$1.00 and costs for illegal parking.

Ernest Chevrier, charged by R. Lamarche with the theft of \$62, has not yet been located by provincial police.

**Wage Cases**

Several wage cases were heard, among them five against one man who had taken a contract to tear down some building and who admitted owing his employees more than \$100. He said he would pay as soon as the contract was completed.

Men were hired at \$2.00 a day, he said, the foreman to get \$3.00. The foreman himself said he thought he was to get \$3.50. Judgment was granted in one claim of \$50.50 and the man ordered to pay it within eight days. Other cases against him were adjourned a week.

In another wage dispute, a mechanic claimed he had worked three days and a half for a Wilson avenue garage and had been paid nothing. The garage owner said the mechanic owed him money, since he had put him in complete charge of the place, including collection of debts. The mechanic had done some work, used some material but had collected nothing. He was advised to go to division court.

### Aged Man Trampled to Death by Bull (Near Bay)

Word from North Bay this week tells of the trampling to death of George Doig, an aged Sandridge man who was attacked by a bull as he was gathering wood in his own back yard. The bull was being led by two men on a nearby property when it broke away, crashed through a fence and entered the yard where Mr. Doig was working. Doig saw the animal coming but was not quick enough to escape. The bull pinned the unfortunate old man to the ground and then trampled him. He was quite dead when found after the bull had been shot. A neighbour who witnessed the tragedy got a rifle from his home and shot the bull, but unfortunately he was too late to save the old gentleman's life.

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## Rev. Fr. O'Gorman Tells C.W.L. of Europe To-day

Interesting Facts Gleaned on Recent Visit Overseas. Hundred Thousand Catholics in His Diocese, Says Bishop Rheume in Address at Annual Convention of C.W.L. at Cobalt. Good Work of the C.W.L. Outlined.

The growth of the diocese, a process which His Excellency said was not equalled by any other Catholic see in Canada last year, and the help which the members of the organization to whom he was speaking could render, were referred to in an address at Cobalt on Monday night by Rt. Rev. Louis Rheume, O.M.I., Bishop of Halleybury, at the opening session of the second annual convention of the Catholic Women's League for this diocese. The seven sub-divisions of the League in the diocese—three of them in Porcupine—were represented by delegates, who heard also at the initial gathering an interesting talk by Rev. Father J. R. O'Gorman, of the Church of the Nativity at Timmins, who spoke on impressions of his recent visit to Europe. Father O'Gorman said any opinions he expressed were purely personal and he told the audience that in his conversations with different people whom he quoted he said it had been difficult to get information he did not already possess, so that it remained a riddle and a mystery what the trouble was all about.

The League in the Halleybury diocese, Mrs. H. Hollands-Hurst, president, told the gathering, now has 556 members, who last year raised \$9084.51 by their efforts. She said that over \$7000 of this amount had been devoted to work in the parish churches where the League was represented, and she noted that over \$1000 had been spent in looking after the sick, to whom more than one thousand visits had been paid by members in the course of the year. The president further stated that \$114 had been donated to the bishop's diocesan welfare fund for helping wayward girls, and she spoke briefly of other activities of the League's branches. Mrs. Hollands-Hurst referred to the objects for which the members should strive and said they should help "to build up our beloved Canada and Catholic ideals." Mrs. Joseph Gorman, president of the Cobalt sub-division, welcomed the delegates. Rev. Father Caulfield, of St. Patrick's Church, said prayers and extended greetings, and brief addresses were given by Mayor Presse and George L. Cassidy, B.A., of the Cobalt high school staff, who had taken the trouble to familiarize himself with the conditions of the world and who had a spark of curiosity about what was happening.

Opening his address, Bishop Rheume said, "this is a great work and you must never get discouraged." His Excellency said the diocese of Halleybury was increasing faster than any other see in the country, and he told the delegates that 30 new parishes had been formed within the past year and that at present 29 new churches were being built. There were 100,000 Catholics in his territory, Bishop Rheume declared. Reminding the delegates what the Catholic Women's League could do to further the work of the church, His Excellency said that in Ontario "we must help ourselves," this province being different from Quebec, where some help was forthcoming from various sources. The bishop quoted a letter he said he had received that day from a woman living 16 miles from Englehart, and who wrote him that she had not seen a priest in that section for some years. The bishop added that if this and similar cases were brought to his attention he would see that they were dealt with.

Bishop Rheume referred also to the problem of Catholic boys and girls attending Protestant schools in those places where there were no separate schools available. In this connection, he named South Porcupine as a good example, and he declared he wanted the convention to consider this phase of their religion. "A great Apostolic work can be done by you," the bishop said, and he went on to point out that the law of Ontario allows the teaching of Catholicism after school hours, adding that this was being done twice a week at the Halleybury high school. The bishop stressed the necessity and importance of giving Catholic instruction to the pupils who were unable to attend separate schools, declaring that indifference to it meant a weakening of faith in later years. It had been expected His Excellency would have pontificated at High Mass in St. Patrick's Church on Tuesday morning, and have spoken at the banquet the same evening, but other engagements interfered and the bishop came to the convention on Monday night instead.

Father O'Gorman, home less than a week from the Vimy Pilgrimage, spoke gravely of the strain under which people in the Old World were living, although he declared he could not see why another war could not be avoided. He told of meeting a French baroness and family, a German industrialist, a young Canadian priest who had been studying in Italy, an English-
