Police Court. A very long docket was presented to Magistrate Atkinson on Wednesday morning. The respective owners of four dogs who allowed them to run at large were each fined one dollar and costs. Six drunks paid \$10 and costs. One, asked by the magistrate if he were drunk on that particular occasion, replied "Just a little." The case of serving beer to a minor (defendant represented by lawyer) will come up next Tuesday. Two cases of having liquor in a public place received fines of \$25 and costs each.

A lady, who appeared on a charge of having poor brakes on her car after a minor accident had brought the police to the scene, testified that the brakes were in good condition; she had had the car tested and fixed in the spring, she said. Magistrate adjourned the case till called on. A case was dismissed when the man accused of having no driving permit proved that the permit (produced) was in the car, but that children had removed it from its ordinary place and it was found afterwards in the back seat of the car. Three speeders paid \$10 and costs. For parking on the highway, a case will come up next week. An assault case from the Pamour hotel, Golden City, was dismissed after a lot of evidence, including the man who had been cut about the head and ears with a sharp instrument, the doctor attending, and other witnesses had been heard. Foul language, entry of a private room by force, and surgical attention all figured largely in this case. The constable from Whitney was complimented by the magistrate as the fair way in which his evidence was given. Fifteen small boys (in private court) were given a lecture by his worship on the seriousness of breaking glass insulators on the telegraph poles belonging to the T. & N. O. Railway. One of the company's constables gave evidence that he had elicited from these children the fact that each had had something to do towards these breakages which were getting serious for the company. Most of the small ones acknowledged breaking some at some time or other, but their testimony did not correspond with previous admissions. Parents were with the boys, and some were annoyed at the charges made against their small children. The magistrate made it quite clear that tampering with telegraph equipment might be a very serious thing, and all the boys promised him they would not do it again. They were all dismissed but given warning that breaking their word might lead to trouble, if further complaint against them was laid.

The board and teachers of the Schumacher public school have planned an extensive programme for the school children during the summer holidays. These activities are being planned in order that the pupils may have some regular form of spending their idle hours instead of roaming the streets during the holidays.

The programme will get under way to-day (Friday) and will last for ten weeks. W. Wiley and A. J. Fish, members of the teaching staff, have been appointed as instructors for the summer. Mr. Wiley will start his duties on July 2nd, and will be in constant charge for five weeks. Mr. Fish will then take over the duties of instruction for the remaining five weeks. The instructors ask that all children, both boys and girls, who would like to take part in the programme, be at the public school grounds to-night (Friday) at 6:30 p.m. or as soon as they possibly can.
