## All Eyes Now Focused on Porcupine, Says Member

Jos. A. Bradette, M.P., Speaks to Kiwanis Club on the Place Northern Ontario Takes in the Dominion Federation. Regret Expressed at Departure of Rev. Bruce Millar.

"The Place Northern Ontario Takes in the Dominion Federation" was the subject of Joseph A. Bradette's address at the regular meeting of the Kiwanis club, held Monday at the Legion Hall.

"In early times Northern Ontario and Quebec were really overlooked, but now all eyes are focussed on the Porcupine," said Mr. Bradette. "It is really the geographical centre of Canada."

"It is a relatively new discovery," continued Mr. Bradette. "In 1898 a Belgian syndicate offered the government the sum of \$75,000 for all the water mineral and timber rights of the country and the members of the legislature were very nearly tempted to accept the offer. In fact, a great proportion of Southern Ontario's population were quite peeved because they did not accept it."

"In the North it is impossible to act partisan in either politics or nationality," said Mr. Bradette.

He spoke of the racial situation in the North and said that the French citizens were copying certain qualities from the English and the latter were using certain French tactics, making co-operation more and more pronounced.

Dr. Lee Honey, in his reply to Mr. Bradette's address, stated that it was the third time the speaker had been present at the club luncheons. He said that Mr. Bradette's remarks were always most interesting and that he hoped the speaker would return in the near future.

George Drew spoke in connection with Rev. Bruce Millar's departure from Tim-

mins and the secretary was instructed to write Rev. Millar expressing the regrets of the club in that he saw fit to leave the community where he has always been a respected and valued citizen.

Before Mr. Bradette left he invited the club to visit his summer camp near Cochrane whenever they found it possible.

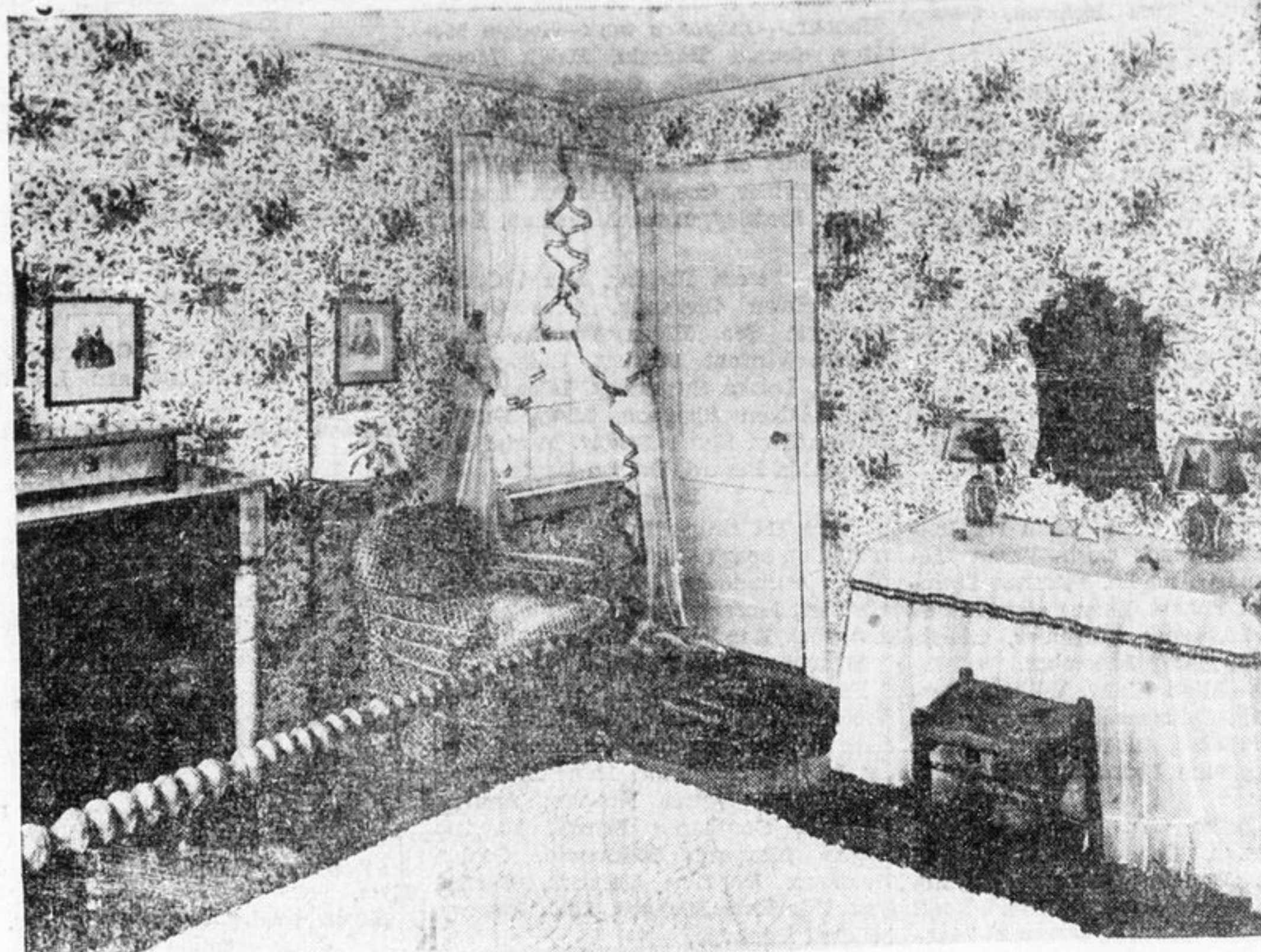

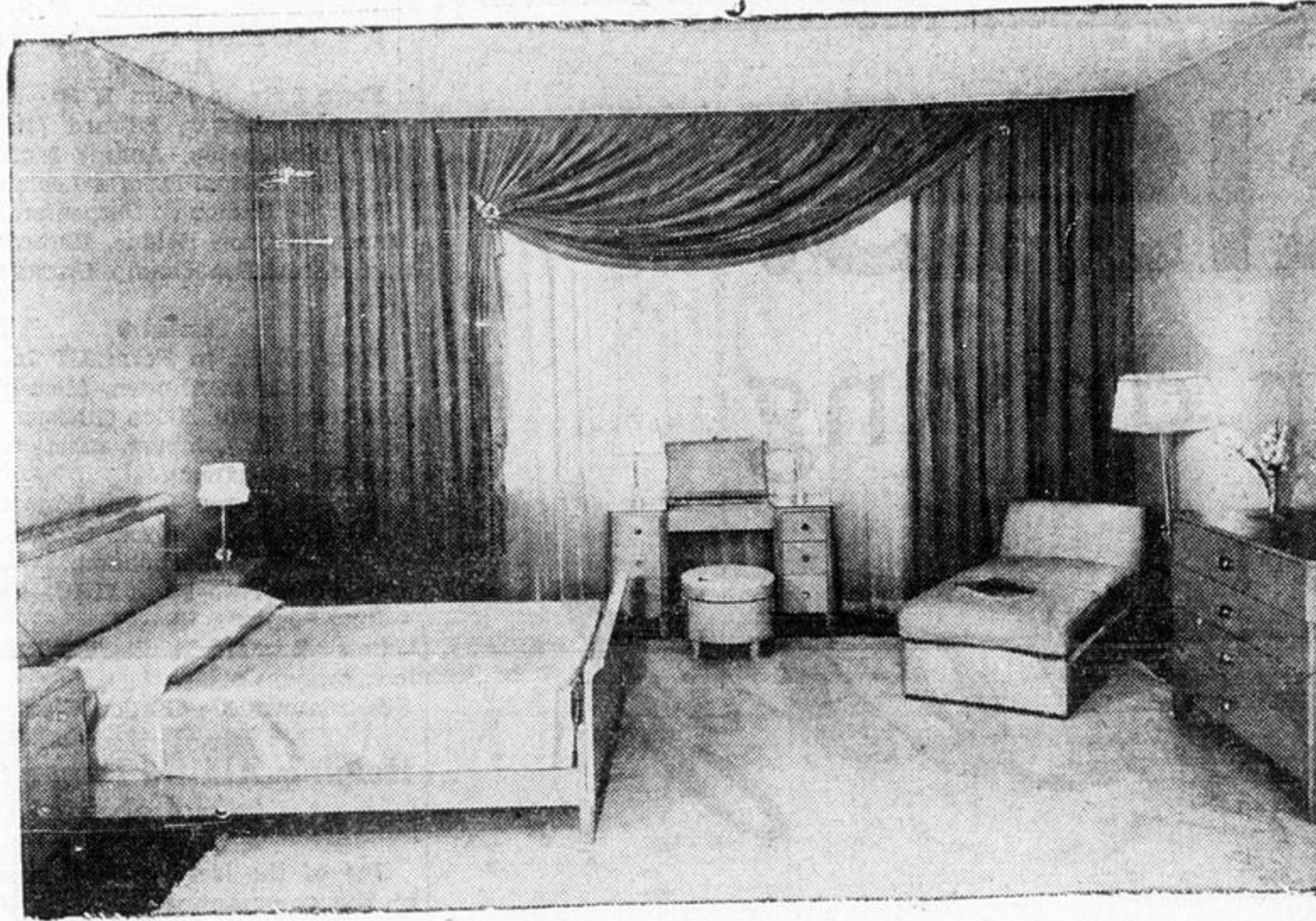

### When the Bride Budgets Her Bedroom

Average Percentages That Suggest How Best to Spend Money You Have for Furnishing Your Bedroom



Sprigged wallpaper, curtains and dressing table to match of white dotted swiss trimmed in ruffles and edged in red ball fringe made this a pleasant and comfortable room. The furniture is mostly maple and the rugs are oarided. The wallpaper is white with natural flower sprigs, the spread white and the window blinds light blue.



Here is a bedroom in a highly sophisticated mood—blonde wood furniture, walls in pink-beige, window and window wall draped in deep pink-beige nimon over paler nimon of the same hue. The light rug is beige, as is the furniture covering.

A word to the wise husband-to-be—don't worry if your girl friends shivers at the idea of a budget. It's perfectly normal for figures to give a lady a headache. But she'll probably end up as the best bookkeeper in the family.

And a word to the wise bride-to-be—if you'd rather have the fun of buying on the spur of the moment, that's your privilege. But you'll get a lot more for your money if you plan your spending on paper ahead of time. You'll find that you won't mind so much doing without a smart gadget that catches your eye when you know it will bring that lovely new rug a lot closer.

**Take It Slow and Easy**  
A budget isn't such an awesome thing when you get used to the idea, but it's a good plan to take it a little gradually or you may feel lost in the sea of numbers.

**A Bedroom Budget First**  
Suppose we begin today on budgeting a bedroom because that's fairly easy. Later we'll go into budgets for other rooms. Here is a pretty good approximate way to divide the money you have on hand for furnishing the new home:

Living room	27%
Dining room	38%
Bedroom	20%
Kitchen	8%
Bathroom	2%
Hall	5%

And of the 20% allowance for the bedroom, here is a safe way to apportion it approximately:

Floor covering	11%
Curtains	4%
Furniture	49%
Spring, mattress and pillows	19%
Bed linens	5%
Spread, blankets, comforter	12%

**Consider Future Expenditures**  
In planning your bedroom purchases, keep in mind the amount you can afford to spend on the room in the long run as well as what you have in hand right now. If you can reasonably count on money for additions later (and if you plan to include them on the budget, you can) figure these percentages on the basis of the ultimate amount to be spent on the room. This may avoid too cheap purchases that you will want to replace. In that case consider the order of making purchases according to your actual need.

**What To Buy First**  
In a bedroom, we'd say that bed, springs, mattress, pillows, sheets and blankets should come first if the budget is pinched. Next, a chest of drawers with a mirror and at least one chair. You could manage to get along then even if you had to stop there, although

you could add glass curtains in expensively and a couple of rag rugs. This would be better than buying a room full of cheaper things that you'll never really like.

**A Budget at Rock Bottom**  
Here's a bedroom budget worked-out by young couple who had to make \$500 furnish their whole house. That meant just \$100 for the bedroom. Here is how they spent it:

Furniture	\$80
Spring, mattress and pillows	18
Curtains	5
Linen	5
Spread and blankets	10
Lamps	2
	\$100

**For a More Affluent Couple**  
But for a young couple who feel that they will be able to spend more in the aggregate, it's better economy to buy better springs and mattress better sheets, better blankets. Those are life time buys if they're really good. Here for instance is the outlay of a typical pair of newlyweds who would spend all told two thousand dollars on their furnishings, which meant \$400 on the bedroom:

Rugs	\$39
Furniture	198
Spring, mattress and pillows	75
Curtains and draperies	20
Linen	15
Spread, blankets and comfortables	43
Lamps	10
	\$400

**No Hard and Fast Rules**  
Naturally these figures would vary according to personal tastes, what presents they received and a hundred and one other considerations. And if the budget says you have \$13.50 for a blanket or a rug, there's no law against paying ten or even fifteen so long as you balance it elsewhere. The budget figure is meant to serve as a guide only and as a help and must bear a lot of juggling. On a \$13.50 item on your budget, you would be going way off to pay \$30 . . . better keep closer on the track than that.

**The Aim**  
The aim of furnishing budget is to restrain us from ending up with a very elegant rug and not enough money left to buy furniture worthy of it. And it prevents such catastrophes as befell the family that bought the brass and irons which turned out to be far too grand for the mantel, and when a new mantel was installed, it was far too

### Toronto Man Says He Was Ill-Treated at Sudbury

A story of how he was "beaten up" by six men and he complained to city and provincial police and they refused to take any action, was told by John May, 21, London, Ontario, when he walked into the office of The Sudbury Star, Saturday, exhibiting a wound on his head which required six stitches to close.

May stated he walked into the grounds of the Gray midway shows, shortly after midnight, Friday, and at the instigation of Con. Gray, proprietor of the midway, six men proceeded to beat him up. He declared the assault was made without provocation. May admitted being involved in a similar mix-up when the show was playing at North Bay about three weeks ago.

Witnesses of the fracas told a reporter they noticed May involved in an argument with a man at the entrance to the grounds which precipitated the fight.

Employees of the midway declared May had been previously employed with the show but had been "fired" and had been making a nuisance of himself around the grounds. He had been repeatedly told to leave the grounds they said. They claimed May injured his head when he fell to the ground, contradicting the statement of the injured man that he had been struck over the head with a logging chain.
