Thursday afternoon, July 8th, a drowning occurred at Harmon Lake, which is about seven miles from Iroquois Falls, on the Porcupine-Cochrane road. Ledger St. Pierre, 18, walked out beyond his depth and not being able to swim, was unable to get ashore. His friends were not able to swim and went for help. It was an hour and a half before he was taken from the water. Dr. Ainslie and Dr. Legett, of Iroquois Falls, applied artificial respiration and although the heart was still faintly beating were unable to bring him to life.

The victim worked for Ross, the contractor who is doing repair work in Iroquois Falls.

Durnam Lives up to Reputation as One of Ontario's Best Pitchers. Games Attract Large Crowds. Best Seen Here This Season.

Kirkland Lake pitchers were responsible for the downfall of Timmins All-Stars in a softball double-header, played at Cyanide Park here yesterday afternoon. Kirkland won the first game 10 to 3 and Durnam, who pitched a no-hit, no-run second game was responsible for a 2 to 0 Kirkland victory.

First Game
Timmins dropped the first game of yesterday's double with a team representing the Kirkland Theatres, by a score of 10-3. The Timmins All-Stars, although they looked better than in the last series played with the Beattie Mines, did not seem able to connect with the fast balls thrown by the Kirkland moundman, Turner. The local infield looked good throughout the game but there were a few sad displays of fielding staged in the outfield.

For the home team, Mittle was the hitter of the day making two safeties, Carnegie, Hillman and Rhudell each drew one hit to make the total five hits for McIntyre.

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Toburn—Mittle, Carnegie, Savia, Hillman, Speck, Tramer, Juvenelle, Buserrie, Zalbo went in to pitch in the ninth inning.

Johnston scored the visitors' final run in the first of the last inning. He doubled to left field, went to third on a wild pitch and came in on O'Connor's second error of the game.

Giallonardo scored the first run for Timmins in the last of the second inning. He was granted a walk, stole second, went to third on a wild pitch and scored on Block's fly to Oliver.

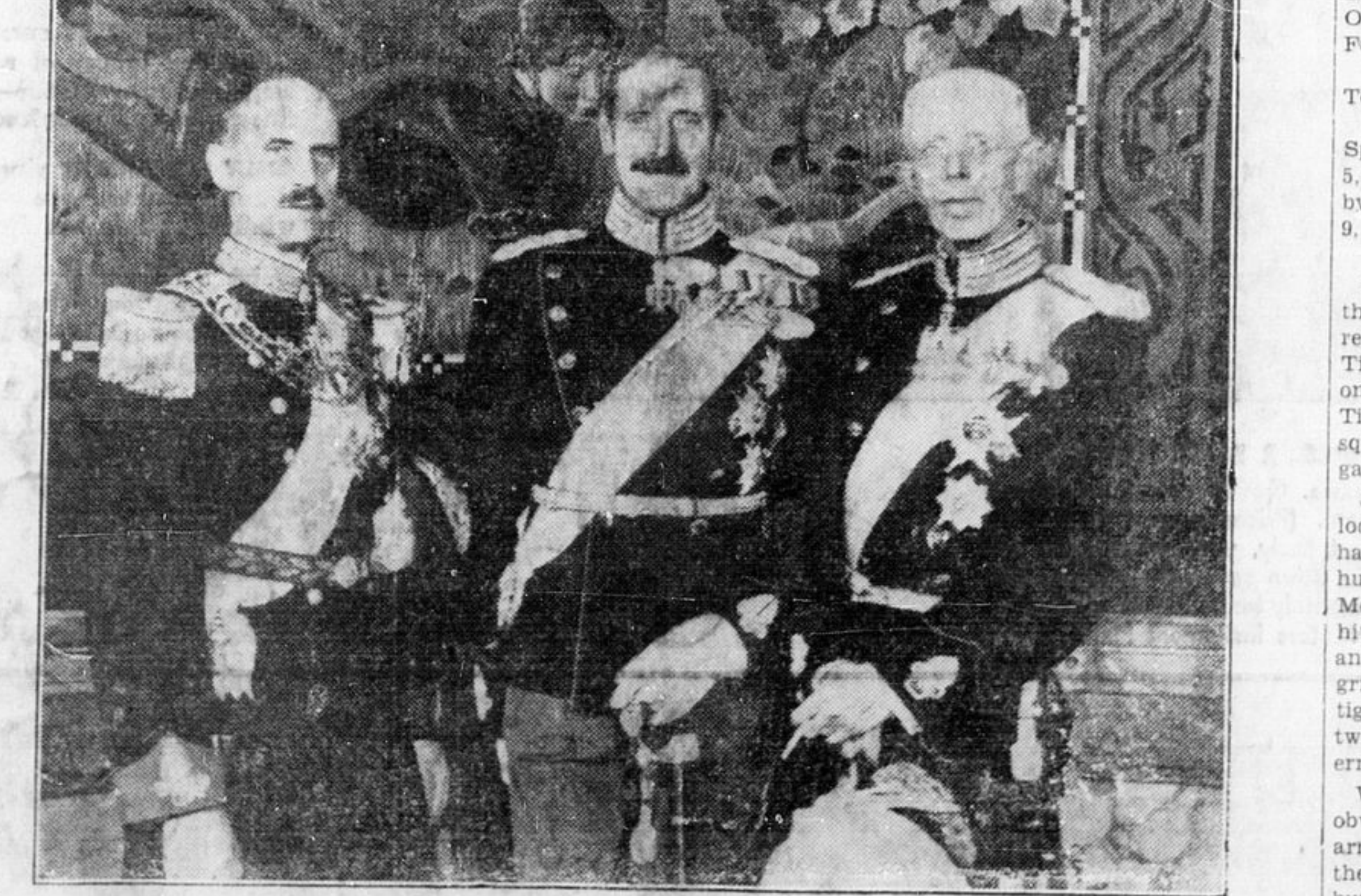
