## Exploding Boiler Hurls Youth's Body 182 Feet

Hurled 182 feet when the boiler of a portable lumber mill exploded, Roy Cooper, 17, of Redbridge, was killed on Monday, as his father and three brothers witnessed the explosion. Garnet Cooper, brother of the dead youth, suffered minor injuries.

Decapitated and his body mutilated by the force of the blast, young Cooper was blown outside the mill. His father had left the vicinity of the boiler a few minutes before the explosion.

Garnet Cooper suffered scratches about the face and head, but the other eye witnesses, Arthur and Harvey Cooper, and their father, George Cooper, escaped injury. George Cooper was operator of the mill a half-mile east of Redbridge, which is 12 miles northeast of North Bay.

The Cooper family originally came from the Tomiko region of Northern Ontario. Besides his father and three brothers present at the accident, Cooper is survived by two other brothers, Clarence at the New Golden Rose Mine, and Sam, Redbridge, and three sisters, Gertrude, in Saskatchewan; Mrs. Fred Rawlings, and Muriel Cooper, Redbridge.

## Snakes Restless Over Travelling With Bees

(From The National Revenue Review) Unusual incidents occur frequently at some of the large ports, especially at the border. A. H. Delziel, Collector at Windsor, Ontario, sent the Editor the following interesting items:—

About a week ago we had an unusual incident happen in our express department. A consignment of snakes, containing cobras, rattlers and king snakes from Mexico and Texas, was shipped to a circus which was scheduled to be shown in Windsor. The snakes did not arrive in time, and they remained in our express office about three weeks before they were released. In the meantime we received a shipment of bees, five crates, and these bees evidently aggravated the snakes, and one morning when the officer of the express department opened the warehouse doors he was greeted by a king snake about six feet long, also two cobras about four feet long, which had escaped from their boxes. This caused considerable excitement and commotion amongst the officers, also the public, as one finally got in the lobby where the elevators are. It was necessary to call a man who can handle these reptiles, to take care of them and return them to their boxes.

At different times there have been shipments of monkeys, ponies and homing pigeons which arrive by express. The pigeons after being cleared are released at the border to fly to different parts of the country.

Many tourists entering Canada from places such as Mexico, Hawaii and distant countries are under the impression when they enter Canada at Windsor that they can go to Montreal and Quebec and return the same day.

## Hole in Larder Lake Road Responsible for Accident

(From Northern News) An 18-inch hole in the Larder Lake highway at Swansea, brought about what might have been a serious accident Sunday night when a car driven by Allen Parcher 32, of 54 Lebel avenue, had its front end smashed.

The vehicle was proceeding along at a normal rate of speed when it struck the hole, breaking the front axle and springs. Provincial police said it was fortunate that the auto remained on the highway.

The driver of the car was not injured although he and two passengers were badly shaken up. Provincial officers are making efforts to have the hazardous hole repaired.

The only other accident to be recorded in the Provincial Police records over the week-end occurred a short time later when a car allegedly driven by Basil O'Grady, age 28, of 17 Taylor avenue, lurched off the highway at the Morris-Kirkland Mine and plunged down a 15-foot embankment.

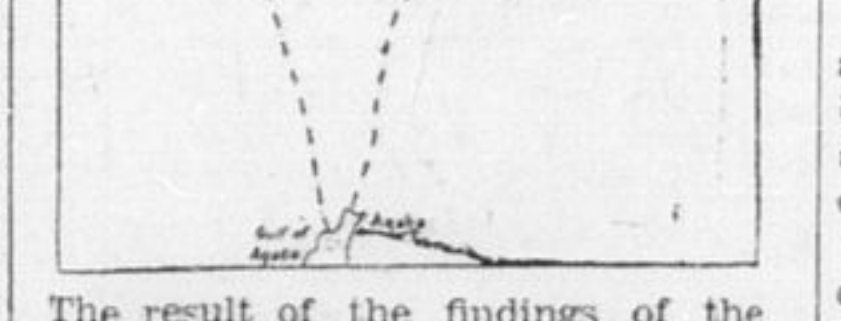
O'Grady was badly shaken up, according to Provincial Officer S. Young, who investigated the accident. Several other passengers in car also escaped injury. Police are considering charging O'Grady with reckless driving.

## Quebec Police Capture Men Wanted for Some Time

Edmond Perreault will appear at the next magistrate's court at Amos on a charge of non-support of his wife and family at Lorraine. The Quebec Provincial Police are prosecuting the accused who was arrested a few days ago in Duparquet township by Constable Matte.

Another arrest made by the officer was that of Joseph Cyrille, also of Lorraine township. The accused had been wanted by the police for several months on a charge of an indecent assault on a young girl. He was eventually located in Duparquet then traced to La Sarre where he was arrested to be held for trial at the Amos assizes.

## The New Palestine



The result of the findings of the Royal Palestine Commission, headed by Lord Peel, calls for the dividing of Palestine into three parts. The heavily shaded area on the seacoast represents the area allotted for the realization of a Jewish national home, while the proposed British-administered neutral zone, including Jerusalem, is indicated by the lesser shaded part. The remainder, or two-thirds of the country, is reserved for the suggested Moslem sovereign state.

## Sudbury Constable Dies After Nine Days

Victim of Sudbury Shooting Case Succumbs. Reward of \$1,000 Offered for the Capture of Murderer.

Sudbury, Ont., July 21st, 1937. Sergeant Fred Davidson, Sudbury constable shot on July 11th when he went to question two men who were attempting to take the markers from a parked car, died on Tuesday morning after surviving seven bullet wounds for nine days. Immediately his death was announced, the warrants for the arrest of Victor Gray and Tom Ponsmardenko were withdrawn, and new ones issued charging the two men with murder.

Sergeant Davidson seemed to be making unusually good progress to recovery when pneumonia developed and soon his condition was hopeless.

Before the Sudbury constable died he made a deathbed statement in which he gave particulars of the shooting and accused the two men of the crime. He identified a picture of Gray as that of the man who did the shooting. Conscious from the time he entered the hospital almost until his death, Davidson said he came upon Szymonski and Shoke on Riverside Drive apparently changing license plates on an automobile. When he tried to apprehend them, one opened fire. He pleaded with his assailant to stop shooting after five bullets had struck him, but two more were fired into his body.

With the death of the Sudbury policeman the search for Gray and Ponsmardenko was renewed with double vigor. Gray is said to travel under several aliases—Victor Gray, Victor Szymonski, Victor Troy, Ponsmardenko is also said to use the names Ponsmardenko and Tom Shoke. Since the brutal shooting of Sergeant Davidson, the most careful search has been made by the police. Sudbury police, county police, provincial police and the R.C.M.P. have been combing all the area around Sudbury but without any success so far.

Sudbury city council offered a reward of \$250 for information leading to the capture of the pair, and the Ontario government has now raised the reward to \$1,000.

It is believed possible that the same pair were responsible for the armed hold-up of Ernest Colson, near Powassan, Saturday night. As noted in Monday's Advance Colson received a superficial wound when he resisted efforts of the two men to rob his place of business.

Provincial Constable Fred Simpson, of Burks Falls, and Constable Harwick, of Bracebridge, are working on the belief that the two gunmen have established a hide-out near Loring. It will interest many readers to know that Constable Fred Simpson was formerly provincial constable at Timmins and is remembered by many here.

It is the intention to take Sergeant Davidson's body to his former home in Wales. His mother, a resident of Wales, has been notified of his death on duty.

The two men so anxiously sought by the police have long criminal records, some of the charges being very serious.

Szymonski, who came to Canada from Poland, was identified by Davidson as the man who fired on him. The

## James Mollison Certain that Miss Earhart is Dead

Certainty Amelia Earhart had died in the lonely South Pacific Howland Island district on her round-the-world flight was voiced this week at Hamilton, Bermuda, by Captain James Mollison.

"She is a grand girl, but I'm afraid she has died—the way she would have wanted to," said the Scot, among whose aerial accomplishments are a solo trans-atlantic crossing and an England-to-South Africa flight.

"She knew flying better than most men, and certainly better than I," he added.

Captain Mollison said he believed the American flier had overshot the tiny Howland Island, their objective in the South Pacific. He said Miss Earhart was too cool and her navigator, Fredrick Noonan, too good a navigator to send out messages such as amateur operators had reported picking up from them while American Navy ships and airplanes searched 250,000 square miles of ocean in a vain endeavour to find the lost pair.

Mollison said he believed experimental flights had outlived their usefulness and could be best left to commercial companies. He added he would make no more experimental flights.

The British aviator will remain in Bermuda on holiday for at least a month.

## Richard Brooks Dies at Cobalt at the Age of 85

Cobalt, July 22.—(Special to The Advance)—Richard Brooks, for many years a familiar figure of the Cobalt camp, died yesterday afternoon in the municipal hospital in his 86th year. He had been a patient there for about six months past. The funeral is being held to-morrow afternoon to Silverland cemetery, where Mr. Brooks will be buried beside his wife, who died some years ago.
