### Coun. Laporte to Probe Advert. Bill

Aside from all that, said His Worship, there should not be two groups in the Council, one for one paper and one for another. The advertising should be divided proportionately.  
Proportionately to what, asked Councillor Laporte. One company should not get more advertising just because it was larger than the other. The Clerk put in the remark that the daily paper in Timmins had \$100 more advertising so far this year than the other publication.  
“Yes,” said the Mayor, “and you will find at the end of the year when there is a \$500 or a \$600 job to be done such as the voters’ list that the smaller paper will get it.”  
Why not if it gave a better price? Should the council not take the best price offered? asked Councillor Laporte. The Mayor said that the voters’ list job could have been done for half the price.  
The Clerk: “The tenders are there to be seen. There were two and I chose the lowest. They are right here in the building for anyone to see.”  
Councillor Wren told the council that he was amused although he did not look particularly amused. The bandying about of the word “discrimination” amused him. The Timmins daily paper was published daily. The other came out twice a week. The daily had \$100 worth of advertising more. That, he considered amusing.  
The question was, said Alderman Laporte, whether or not the particular advertisement under discussion was authorized.  
Had he made any attempt to investigate? Councillor Wren asked.  
Councillor Laporte: “Naturally not” was the reply, “since I was asked at the last meeting of council to let the matter stand over until there was a full meeting of all of the members of council.”  
Alderman Wren facetiously suggested that Alderman Laporte investigate the matter. The chairman of Finance accepted the suggestion with alacrity. The other members of council thought the suggestion quite sound.

### Proposes New Bureau for the Prevention of Crime

Two gold miners were killed 2,000 feet underground at Noranda yesterday when a loosened pile of rock toppled them to a fall of 100 feet.

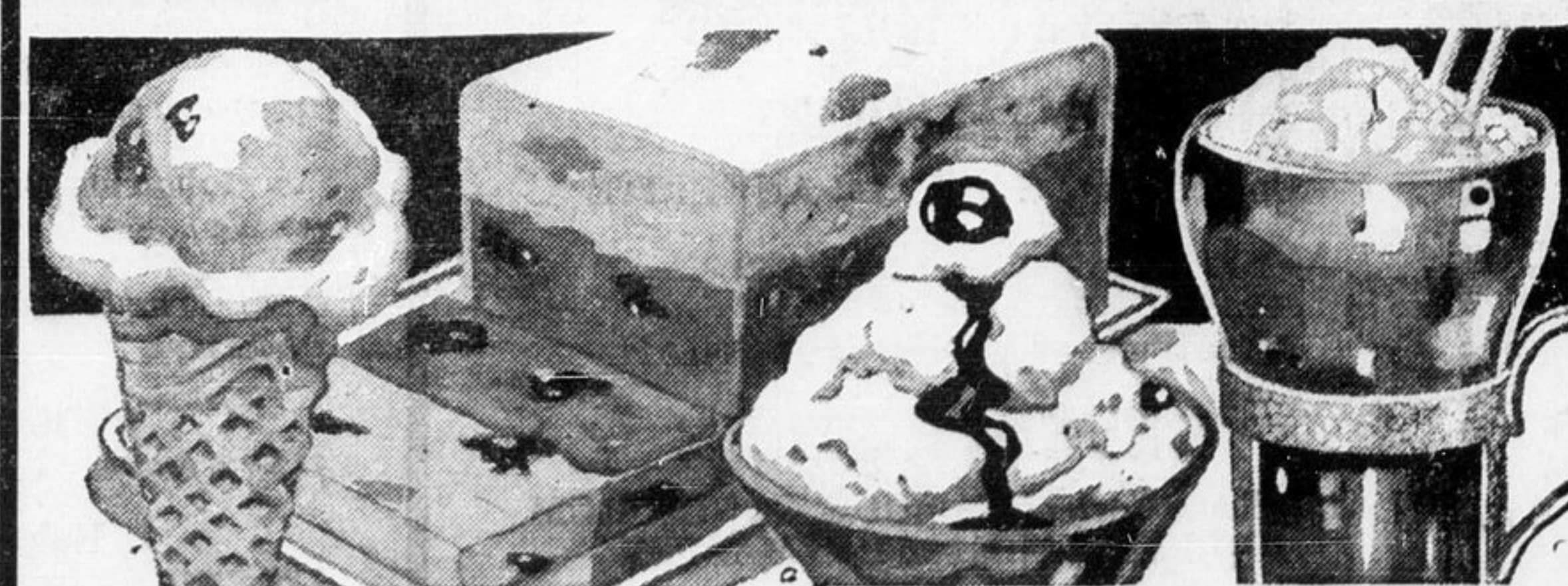
