**South Porcupine Again Has Live Board of Trade**

**Protest Against Deviation of Highway One of First Questions for Discussion and Action. Organization Once Active Revived After Many Years' Inactivity. Other South Porcupine and Dome News.**

South Porcupine, August 14. (Special to The Advance)—A special meeting was called on Friday evening in the council chambers of the merchants of the town to discuss the reformation of a Board of Trade for South Porcupine. About 30 of the leading tradesmen and interested townspeople attended. The matter of the petition for the highway question was brought up and it was noted that five hundred signatures of the most prominent business people had been secured, and the petition forwarded to the proper quarters. In discussing the Board of Trade for South Porcupine it was discovered that the original charter was still in the town although a Board of Trade for South Porcupine has not met for 20 years. Therefore with due regard for law and order the group nominated and elected Mr. Sol Sky as president of the Board, with Mr. Eli Cantor as vice-president and Mr. J. D. McCarthy (lawyer) as secretary.

A meeting and round-up of members is to be announced shortly and as much publicity as possible given to the idea. With a real interest for the future and business prospects of the town this Board of Trade is expected to be a real help, benefit and booster of South Porcupine's interests, and should meet with the fullest co-operation of every citizen who has the welfare of our town at heart.

**Toronto Exhibition This Year, Aug. 27 to Sept. 11**
