Record High Temperature in Rouyn and Noranda Area

The first week in August was a "scorcher" in Timmins and districtat least some days were-but as one local man said, "It's cool here compared to Rouyn and Noranda." He had just talked over the phone to Rouyn and had been told that the thermometer there (Saturday, Aug. 7th) stood at 104. That looked too hot to be true. Official figures in The Rouyn-Noranda Press show that the figure quoted was slightly exaggerated, or the thermometer had gone foolish with the heat. The maximum temperature on Saturday, Aug. 7th at Rouyn and Noranda was 94 degrees. The Rouyn-Noranda Press, however, notes that while 94 degrees was the official maximum, local thermometers registered much higher, some of them indeed going to 110 degrees. Unofficially then Rouyn and Noranda got a high as 110, but officially only to 94 degrees. But let no one be fooled! Ninety-four is mighty hot officially or unofficially.

Magistrate M. G. Gould, of North Bay, conducted his first court session here on Tuesday afternoon. Through arrangements made by the provincial government, Magistrate Atkinson, who regularly handles the Timmins court, is having an official holiday, the first since he has been off the bench. During his absence Mr. Gould has been ap-

pointed special magistrate.

Remanded cases and pleas of guilty shortened the court session considerably on Tuesday. The one criminal case of any import was that of Cylvia Asse lin and Mrs. Florence Lebrun, of Mountjoy township who were charged under the same information with common assault. They were alleged to have assaulted Louis Pelletier by striking him on the face, hicking him on the body and scratching his neck. After hearing the evidence, Magistrate Gould dismissed the charges.

Through an interpreter Pelletier, an elderly man, testified that Albert Lebrun, who was charged under the same information with assault, but who did not appear in court, came to his house and struck one of his boarders who was sitting on the verandah.
