Old Home Week Netted \$5,600, Statement Shows

May be More to Come in from Event. Lions Propose to Turn Money over to Representative Committee to Proceed with Plans for Community Centre for Timmins.

The financial statement of the Timmins Silver Jubilee and Old Home Week sponsored by the Lions Club this summer, shows a profit of \$5,602.62.

The club decided, at its regular meeting on Thursday night to endeavour to have a committee of representative citizens appointed to conduct a financial drive in the interests of the community centre.

Chairman of the Old Home Week Committee, William Wren, presented the committee's report. The committee's report particularly lauded Lion Barney Sky for the work he did which enabled to a large degree, the committee to bring in such a favourable statement.

Report of the committee was signed by the chairman and by the members, F. H. V. Ball, R. McKnight, R. W. Hughes, W. King, F. Wolno and J. McGrath. It was as follows:

"The financial report of the above committee, audited by S. G. Fowler, shows a possible balance of \$6,000 after all obligations have been met, and outstanding accounts collected.

"The outstanding accounts are in the division of the work covered by 'The Book of Timmins and the Porcupine.' The accounts represent advertising contracts, and an account with the Timmins News Service for the sale of the books. A rebate for license, \$250, and \$100 for street lights also outstanding with the town office.

"It is regrettable that weather conditions curtailed the activities of this committee to a certain extent, for we are confident that favourable circumstances would have shown a more substantial profit for the work undertaken.

"The Timmins Silver Jubilee and Porcupine Old Home Week" has not only shown a profit of \$6,000 but has also given the members of the Lions Club invaluable experience that should reflect to the benefit of the club and the community as time passes.

"It is the wish of the committee that Lion Barney Sky be particularly noted for the share he had in creating the favourable financial report we have

presented. The house draw shows a profit of \$2,182.22, and the committee has expressed a sincere feeling of gratitude toward Lion Barney Sky for this substantial contribution to the net profit.

"The committee also expresses its gratitude to the club members at large for the hearty co-operation they have given in this enterprise.

"In presenting this final report on the activities of this committee, we make the following recommendation for the continuance of the work towards the attainment of our purpose, the erection of a community centre.

"That there be appointed a committee of representative citizens to conduct a financial campaign in the interests of the community centre. This committee to be selected entirely on merit and to include two or more members of the Lions Club. That the \$6,000 be placed in the hands of the committee as a contribution from the Timmins Lions Club.

"Further to the financial report of this committee, there is a considerable list of assets as yet not inventoried that will in due course be turned over to the club. These assets may be liquidated for a substantial sum."

The auditor's report was prefaced by an explanatory statement. It was as follows:

"At the request of your chairman I have audited the accounts of the Porcupine Old Home Week, the Carnival and the construction of the model home, to date and attach hereto the following schedules.

"Receipts and disbursements of the Old Home Week—Carnival—Construction of Model Home.

"The Carnival schedule is complete with the exception of a balance of \$40 outstanding on the sale of lumber and shows a net profit of \$5,605.62 and includes no item, in my opinion, other than that strictly appertaining to the carnival and which profit is transferred in total to the Old Home Week schedule.

"The total amount after transfer, amounting to \$5,338.53, will be affected by outstanding advertising accounts in the Porcupine Book, the sale of books by the Timmins News Service, the possibility that the license fee of \$250 will be refunded, the amount of \$285.50 paid on behalf of the Boys Band, any other account which may yet be outstanding.

"The outstanding features can be briefly summarized as follows: Carnival \$5,604.52 House draw 2,182.22 Car draw 1,545.55

"The Porcupine Book, in the statement showing an adverse balance, could show a profit when collection of outstanding accounts is completed.

"The general activities of members, coupled with the fact that the club does not aspire to be carnival experts, and inclement weather, results, in my opinion, in a satisfactory financial return.

"In the preparation of this report I desire to express my appreciation particularly to Lion Ball, whose records, maintained until he left for the convention, left nothing to be desired."

The general report of the auditor covering the receipts and expenditures for the whole affair was presented. After the general statement a breakdown was given.

Funeral of Donna Reed at South Porcupine Friday

Many Floral and Other Tributes to Popular Young Girl whose Tragic Death by Drowning Saddened all at South Porcupine Last Week. Tribute from Brown Owl to "Her Little Brownie."

South Porcupine, Aug. 27th, 1937.—(Special to The Advance)—The little daughter, Donna, of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Reed whose sad death by drowning on Wednesday was announced in the last edition, was buried Friday afternoon in the South Porcupine cemetery. Friday afternoon at two-thirty the funeral service was held at the United Church, which was filled with sympathizing friends and neighbours of the family. Little Donna, with her lovely copper curls, had been a favourite with all who knew her and their grief was very evident.

In the absence of Rev. Fraser, the Rev. Mr. Tait of Schumacher, officiated. The first hymn, "When He cometh to take up his jewels," was sung very feelingly by everyone. Then Mr. Tait spoke: "Friends I have a very difficult task before me because if there is one place a minister has cause to fear it is in the face of death. When a person has lived his three score years and ten and is called away, he hates to leave, because life is so sweet, but when a young life is taken so suddenly, so tragically, one asks 'My God, My God, Why?' and that some day, some where we will understand. He went on to give many examples of God's love and His way of showing it. Mr. Tait in his gentle soothing voice gave a great deal of comfort to the broken-hearted parents of little Donna. The service closed with the lovely child's hymn 'Jesus love me.'"

The friends were allowed to pass by the coffin to see once more the face of the dear little child who had been closed so suddenly away.

The coffin was carried by nine little girls, her Sunday School class: Jean Sumerville, Jean Carruthers, Barbara Ann Hepburn, Hilda Harry, Evelyn Syvret, Helen Mairs, Edith Bennett, Robin Curtis, Lo's Laffin.

The Brownie pack in full uniform led by Brown Owl formed a double line at the door of the church, stood at attention and gave their Brownie smiles to their little departed friend as the cortege followed by a great many went on to the Tisdale cemetery for burial. She leaves her parents, one brother 13 years old, one sister 8 years old, a baby brother 13 months old.
