The findings are based on the results of experiments in which a number of rabbits were dusted with quartz dust while others were dusted with similar dust to which less than one per cent of metallic aluminum dust was added. Sectioning of the lungs showed that silicosis had become well established in those rabbits subjected to the quartz dust alone, while no damage resulted to those in which aluminum dust had been added.

Investigation has also shown that silicosis is caused not by the physical presence of the dust but rather a result of the solubility of the dust retained in the lungs.
