

High School Boys Electing Their Athletic Leader Today

Members of High and Vocational School Athletic Association Hold Annual Election Today. Boys' Association Regulates and Controls All Sport in the School.

Members of the Boys' Athletic Association of the Timmins High and Vocational School will, this afternoon, elect their officers for the coming year. Great interest is taken in the annual election to the executive of this organization which, independent of teachers and instructors, controls athletics in the school.

Ballots have been distributed and all boys except first formers will have a vote.

In the field for the presidency are five boys who have been active members of the various school teams. All of them were members of the rugby team which, last year, won the Northern Ontario Secondary Schools Association title, with the exception of Bruno Bernardi, who was unable, through illness, to play. Nominated for the position at a recent meeting were Louis Millette,

Cecil Linder, Bill Copps, Donald Mortimer and Bruno Bernardi.

Vice-President of the Association will be the boy who receives the second highest number of votes for president. Nominated for secretary were Bert Hornby, Sam Habib, Herb Hatton, Eddie McLeilan.

Five boys were nominated for the position of treasurer. They were Ward Allen, Julien Baderski, Leo Copps, Ralph Ferrari and Heige Hongisto.

The Boys' Athletic Association of the Timmins school directs the sporting activities of the school. The boys elected to office will have full charge of all game arrangements and other work necessary to successful sport promotion. They are at liberty, and often take advantage of the opportunity, however, to consult their teachers on anything with which they find difficulty.
