



# TEN YEARS AGO IN TIMMINS

Ten years ago the police had a call to the Mattagami section, where people said they were mystified and alarmed by a man masquerading as a woman.

A trip to the district from which the complaint was sent resulted in the arrest of a local man who was past the age of dresses by some forty years. George was just standing on Wilcox street. He was a sight for any kind of eyes, sore or otherwise.

An alarm of fire from the ho-doo box, No. 13, ten years ago, attracted a big crowd in a few minutes. The damage done was less than \$5000, but without the prompt and effective work of the fire brigade, and with any wind blowing, the results might have been more serious.

The twenty-fifth anniversary of the T. & N. O. Railway was celebrated at North Bay ten years ago. Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Premier of Ontario, and Mrs. Ferguson, being the guests of the city and the railway for the occasion.

The Toronto newspapers pointed out that the Crusaders from the North made it their day, and so it was only appropriate that the speeches at the directors' luncheon that day should represent Northern Ontario chiefly.

Ten years ago, the body of a man, found dead in front of 6242 Elizabeth street west, Detroit, was identified as that of Simcoe Green, 58-year-old bachelor, prospector and miner of Cobalt, Ont.

From Iroquois Falls ten years ago came the story illustrating the ingratitude of some people for kindness shown them. A Ford car was stalled by the side of the road near Val Gagne, when an Iroquois Falls car came along. The young man driving the Falls car was connected with a garage in the Paper Town and after noting that the Ford would have to be taken to a shop for repairs, he invited the passengers to get into his car and he would run them into town, and then if they wished he would return and get their car so that it could be repaired.

## Does Pasteurizing Less Value of Milk?

## Health Experts Reply that Nutritional Value is Practically Unchanged.

(By J. W. S. McCullough, M.D., D.P.H.) Doctor Reedman of the School of Hygiene, University of Toronto, says that the most recent studies show that the nutritional value of milk is practically unchanged by properly conducted pasteurization.

The stock argument of the opponent of pasteurization, whether or not he knows anything about the subject, is that the process destroys the vitamin C. It has long been considered that the content of vitamin C (the agent concerned with the prevention of scurvy) was low and that milk is an unimportant source of vitamin C in the diet.

vitamin C in the diet. It is not normally required to do so. Oranges, tomatoes (fresh, canned or dried) cabbage, lettuce, green peas, potatoes and spinach, are all rich in the anti-scurvy vitamin.

Pasteurization causes no appreciable injury to the nutritional value of milk, and it must be remembered that the dangers of raw milk in transmitting disease far outweigh any minor objections to careful and efficient pasteurization.
