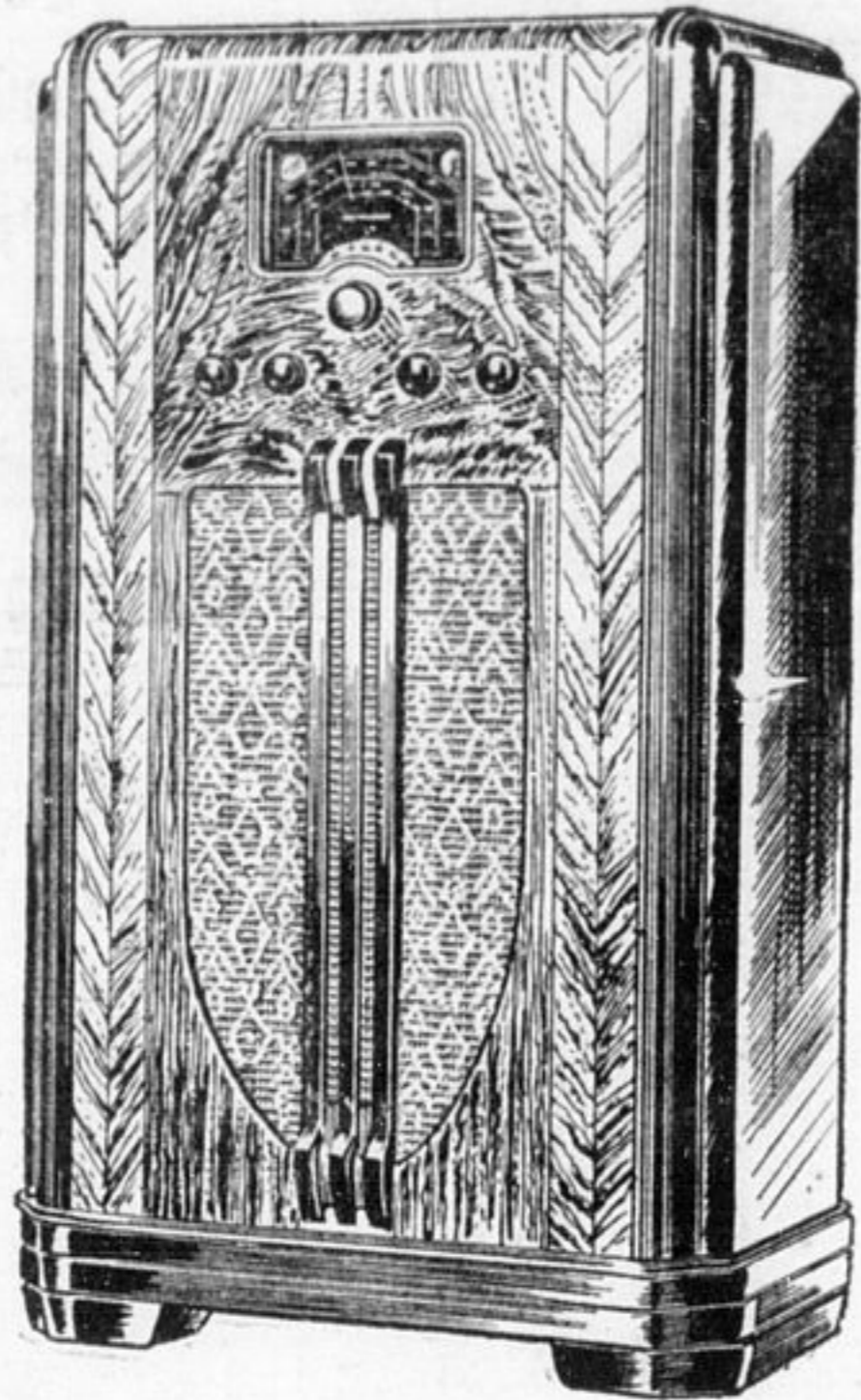

## Records Fall as Student Athletes Compete Friday

Central School Wins Annual Public Schools Field Day Held at Central School on Monday. Boys Shatter Four Records and Girls Same Number.

If one is to judge by the results of the annual public schools field day, held on the grounds of the Central Public School on Monday afternoon, the athletic ability of the younger generation is increasing. Shattered records cluttered on the school yard all afternoon and the young student athletes went through their places.

The boys lowered four. Howard David raised the junior running broad jump mark from 12 feet, 8 inches to 13 feet five inches and Ed Ferrari set a new mark for the junior hop, step and jump with a leap of 28 feet, 2 inches.

The senior boys' pole vault mark was increased from 7 feet, 3 inches to 8 feet, 5 inches by Harvey Kenty and the senior hop, step and jump mark was increased to 32 feet, 4 inches.

Four girls' records were shattered and one tied. Stella Shornys set the new broad jump mark at 11 feet, 10 inches and Helen Crispin set a new standing board jump mark with a jump of 6 feet, 1 inch. Kathleen Martin increased the senior running broad mark to 13 feet, 1 1/2 inches, and Amelia Chap set a new mark of 6 feet for the senior standing broad jump.

Beulah Bezonson tied the record of 3 feet, 8 inches for the junior high jump. Point standing indicated that Central school won the title with a total of 102. Of that total the boys garnered 53 and the girls 49. Mattagami boys won 42 points and the girls, 20 to put that school in second place with a total of 62. Birch street totalled 40. The boys won 20 points and the girls 20. In fourth place was Moneta school with 24 points of which the boys won 11 and the girls 13.

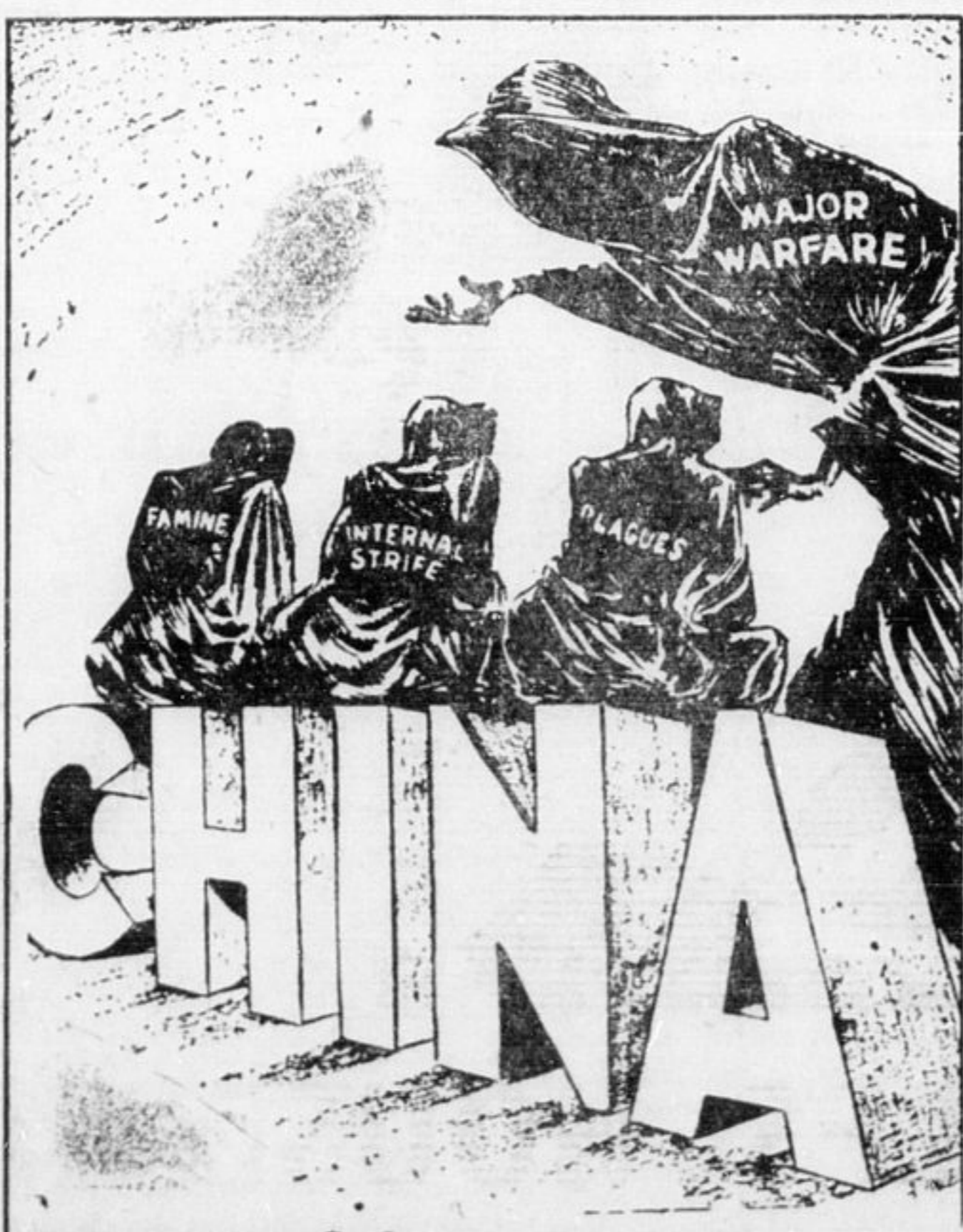

## Lavoie Committed for Trial on Three Counts

Chooses Trial by Judge and Jury. Is Carefully Guarded While Here and Shacked Before Being Taken to Halleybury. Not Allowed Bail. Faces Two Charges Theft, One of Jail Breaking.

Wilfred Lavoie, who broke jail here a week ago last Sunday, left yesterday for Halleybury where he will await trial before a judge and jury.

Lavoie was captured in Toronto on Monday by police after a furious chase through the city. Chief Gagnon immediately went to Toronto and brought

him back to face trial. They arrived yesterday and Lavoie was haled before Magistrate Atkinson on three charges, two of automobile theft and one of escaping custody.

The accused man, given the option of summary trial before the Magistrate or trial before a judge and jury, chose the latter. A preliminary hearing was held by the Magistrate and the prisoner was committed for trial.

Charges were that Lavoie stole an automobile from G. K. Brown, of Timmins; that he stole an automobile from F. E. Kindrake, of Schumacher, and that he escaped lawful custody here on Sunday, September 12.

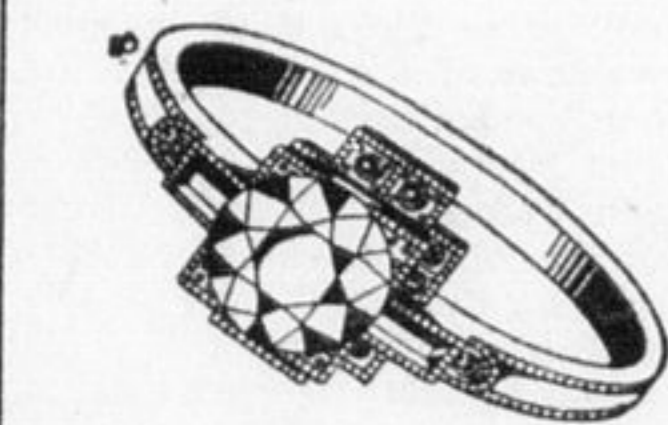
Constables Culhane and Guolla testified that they stopped Lavoie in a service station some weeks ago while he was driving a stolen car. The automobile was carrying stolen license plates and the ones belonging to it were in the back seat. Chief McInnis, of South Porcupine, testified regarding the theft in Schumacher. Chief Gagnon, of the Timmins force, told of the jail break. Lavoie wrenched two locks off his cell door with a poker, he said, and made a key of wire to open the outer door leading to freedom.

Asked if he had anything to say, Lavoie made no reply. He was committed for trial by the Magistrate. The Magistrate ruled that Lavoie be held in custody until the fall assizes for the district of Cochrane.

During the time between when Lavoie was committed and when he was taken to Halleybury at 1.45 he was kept in the cells under special police guard. He was handcuffed to another prisoner on the train and his legs were shackled.

So ended the first chapter of Lavoie's exciting career since he was apprehended some weeks ago for the theft of an automobile. At the time he was arrested he was on parole. He asked the Magistrate for an adjournment of his case to get defence counsel. The Magistrate granted the request on Tuesday. On the following Sunday night Lavoie broke jail. A little more than a week later he was captured in Toronto. Brought back he was committed for trial and now will face the judge and jury.

When he arrived back in Timmins in Chief Gagnon's custody yesterday morning Lavoie looked quite natty. He wore a well pressed light grey suit and a matching hat with white shoes.
