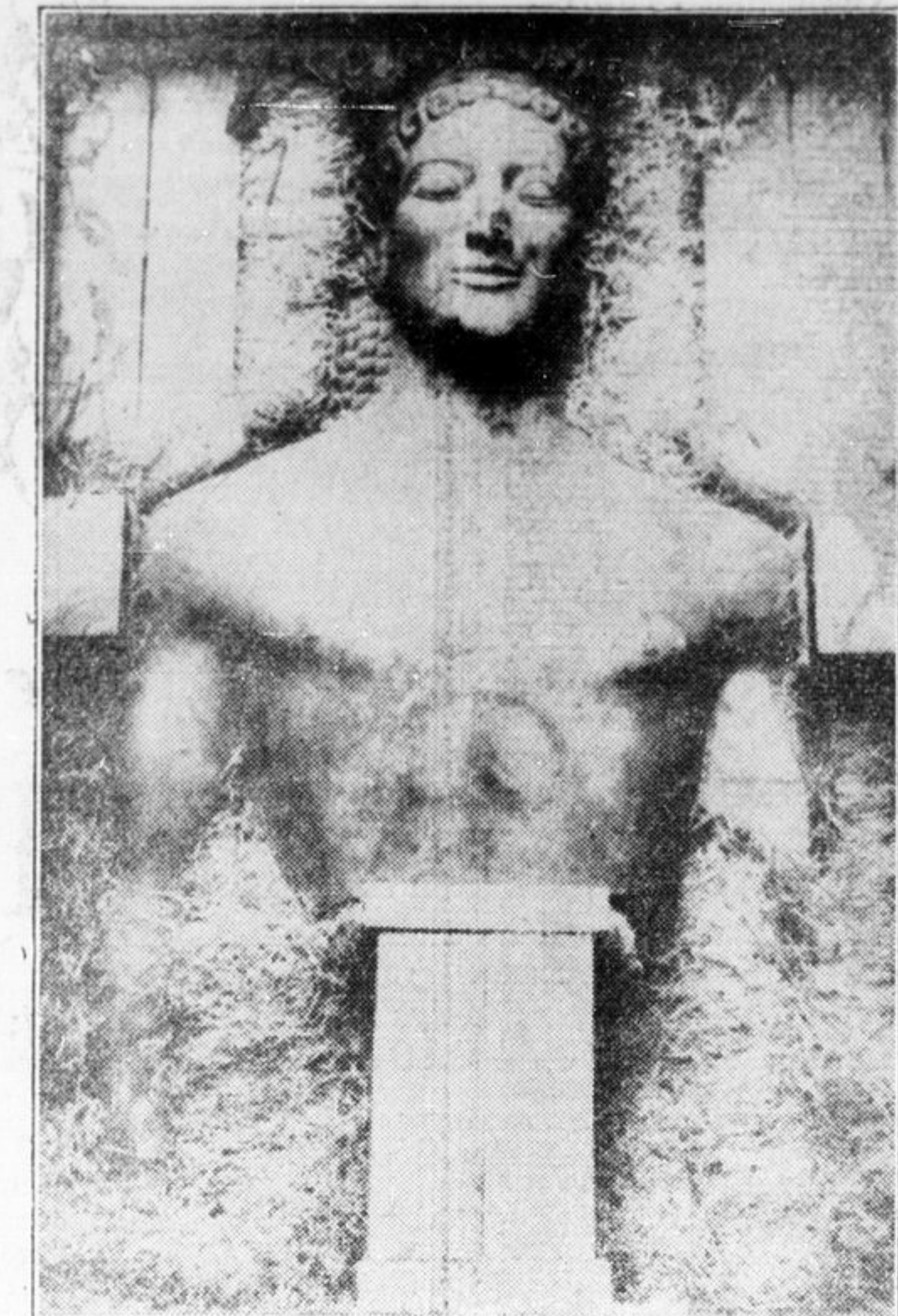

A coloured statue of the Apollo Kouroi, of the best Hellenistic period which was regarded as lost to Greece since 1932. It has been recovered and returned. It was found at Anavrysson, near Soumion, France, by peasants who were illegally excavating, and it was eventually found in the hands of Michael Roussos, who was persuaded to surrender it to the Greek Legation in Paris. This statement is completely unfounded. It is a condition of admission to the Co-operative Union of Canada to which this society is affiliated, that strict neutrality shall be observed in matters of politics and religion.

It must be clear that in a true co-operative society, formed for the purely economic objective of providing material necessities for its members there must be represented all shades of opinion.

Where all members of a nominal co-operative society are sufficiently unanimous to spend their surplus on the support of a political candidate, instead of devoting it to the purposes of the society's business, the society should rather be called by the name of the party to which that candidate belongs than by the name CO-OPERATIVE.

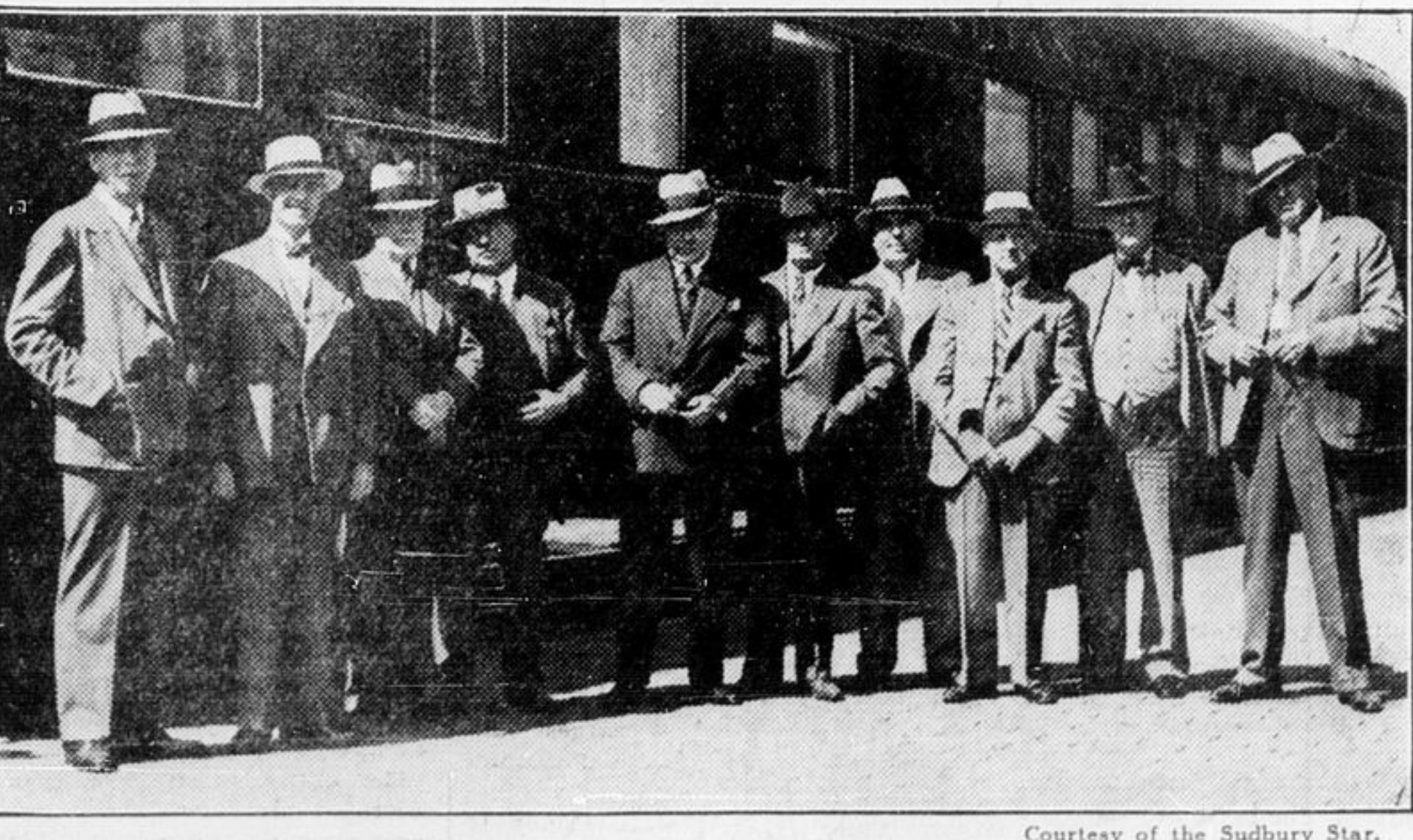
