### Kirkland Meeting Squelches Hecklers

#### Organized Gang at Liberal Meeting, but Speakers Get Good Hearing.

Kirkland Lake, Sept. 22nd, 1937. (Special to The Advance).

Kirkland Lake had a sample of the ballyhoo and bulldoze tactics that some people think will win elections when a quite evidently organized gang of hecklers attempted to interrupt the Liberal meeting on Monday night in the Strand theatre in the interests of C. V. Gallagher, the people's candidate in this riding in the provincial election. The speakers, however, were undaunted by the noisy gang and completed their addresses in good order. The speakers carried on so well that the interruptions were not very noticeable on the radio and did not particularly affect the success of the meeting, except in so far as a large number were disgusted at these slick tactics and found their further remark for a vote for C. V. Gallagher.

Another feature of Monday's meeting was the appearance on the platform of A. G. Slaght, M.P. Mr. Slaght happened to be in town on professional business, and his address was an impromptu one, but generally appreciated. The other speakers included the candidate, C. V. Gallagher, Hon. Paul Leduc and others.

Mr. Gallagher, who delivered his address in gay despite of his interrupters, briefly summed up his party platform, citing his long residence in the North and his municipal experience in the Township of Tisdale as good qualifications for his candidature.

Describing the Hon. Mitchell Hepburn, his leader, as a man who had introduced business into politics, Mr. Gallagher, referring to the question of highway construction, declared that at the outset the Liberal government had made it plain that nothing could be done until the budget was balanced and revenue made available for the purpose.

Mr. Gallagher went on to say that road work had been started in earnest during the current year, stating that some of the contracts had been let as early as in March.

The candidate criticized the Hon. Earl Rowe, leader of the Conservative party, for his opposition to progressive social legislation, and concluded with reminiscence of his long residence in the mining country.

Arthur Slaght, the next speaker in-

troduced by Mel G. Hunt, K.C., chairman of the occasion, declared that the Rowe platform lacked definite policy, and stated that "while he did not know what one might learn about mining sitting in a sulky behind a horse's tail, Mr. Hepburn had, when first elected, called in to consultation men who knew something about mining, including the speaker.

Appealing to his audience not to elect "the old gang masquerading behind Rowe," Mr. Slaght ended in anecdotal form.

Mr. Gallagher added that Mr. Hepburn and the Hon. Paul Leduc, minister of mines, and a speaker of the evening, had done a great deal for the mining industry.

At the conclusion of Mr. Gallagher's speech an enthusiast in the heckling ranks called for "three hearty Canadian cheers. Dobra, Dobra, Dobra."

Hon. Mr. Leduc, plunging with obvious joy into the stormy sea of heckling, held his audience steady throughout his entire speech. He detailed the Hepburn financial policy, and mentioned the income tax as particularly fair, since it made those pay who could afford it.

Mr. Leduc paid some attention to the Hepburn attitude on succession duties, and went on to explain that his leader was committed to the policy of not constructing new highways or repairing old ones until he had the money to do so.

He also spoke to his audience in French.

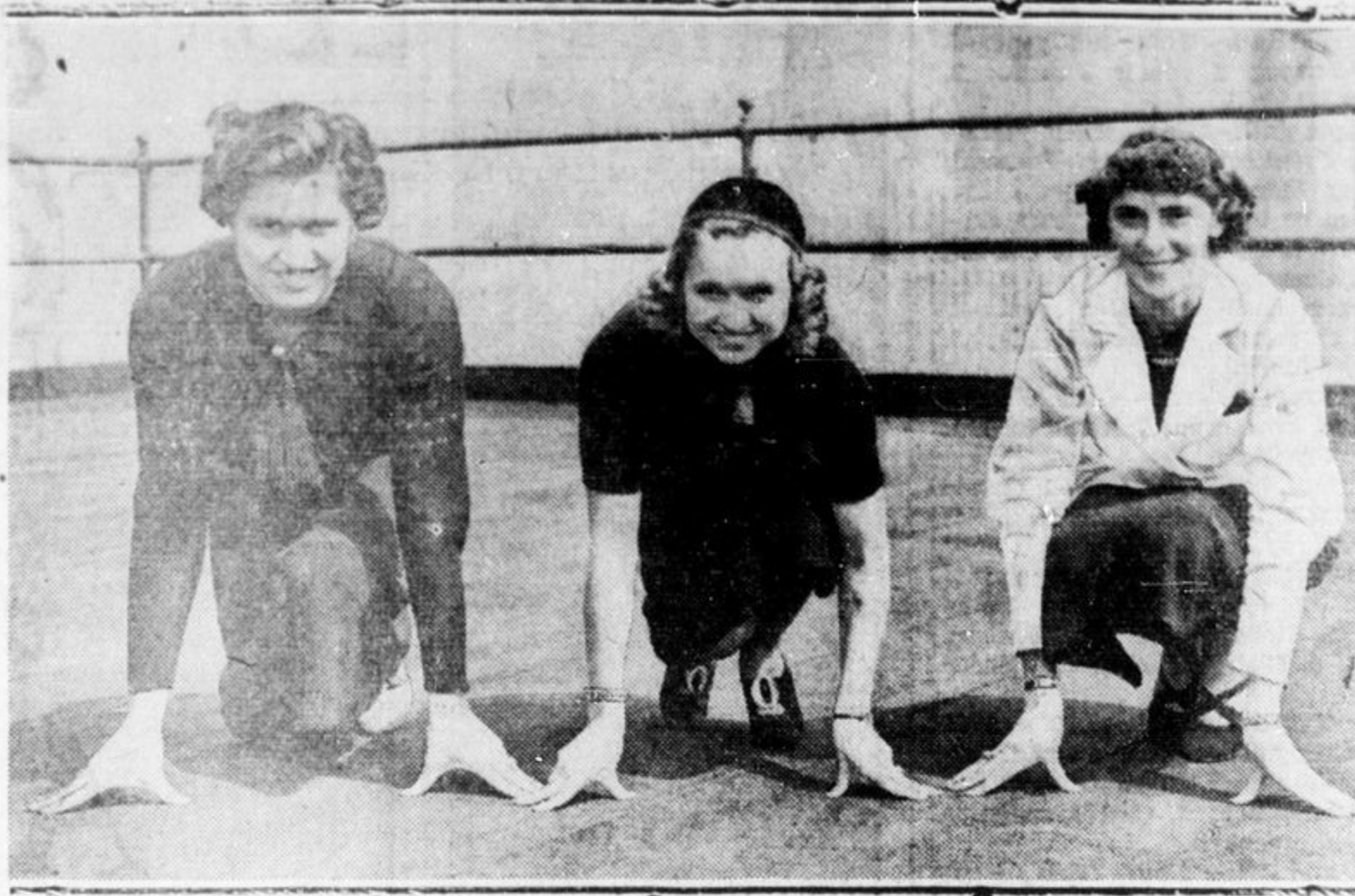
### Schumacher Church Harvest Home Event

### Highway to Go Through South End

#### Mean Report to Contrary Just a Political Trick.

A couple of weeks ago The Advance announced that through the good offices and interest of C. V. Gallagher, the liberal candidate, full assurance had been given by the Government that South Porcupine would continue on the highway and not be sidetracked as has been feared by many for some time past. Highway Dept. engineers, no doubt with Southern conditions in view had drawn plans for straightening the highway from Golden City to Timmins, with the special idea of avoiding the right angle turn at the entry to South Porcupine main street. Men were working on the new route following these plans. Mr. Gallagher, however, went to Toronto recently and showed the Government that the main purpose of highways in this North was to serve the people and industries here and to bind together the towns of the North. As a result the Government decided to follow the logical route and have the highway follow along South Porcupine's main street as at present. As an evidence of the success of Mr. Gallagher's representation, the crew of men working on the cut-off was taken off and new plans made to use the proper highway route. Ballyhoo artists however, have been spreading the yarn that as soon as the election is over the highway will be proceeded with on the route that will avoid South Porcupine. Official advice is to the effect that there is no foundation in fact for this story. In other words, it is just another of those campaign "whispers" that should not be considered. Men at work on the route

seemed to give some colour of truth to these fabrications, but it develops that the men so working were all engaged in clearing up preparatory to abandoning the "new" route. It is definitely, emphatically and officially declared that South Porcupine will be on the highway and that all thoughts of anything more drastic than minor changes to assure more safety on the roads have been abandoned. The highway will not miss South Porcupine. The whispering gang are absolutely and completely astray when they suggest that the highway may avoid South Porcupine. The highway will continue to serve the people as it has done for the past many years.

### Series is Evened up at Kirkland Lake
