To Interest U. S. A. in Canada's Mining

Exposition to be Held at New York in February Next.

Affording an opportunity for the general public in New York and the mining and metallurgical fraternity in the United States to obtain first-hand tangible information on the extent and latest developments of the Canadian mining industry, a Canadian Mining Exposition will be held in Grand Central Palace, New York City, from February 14 to 19, 1938.

"The forthcoming exposition," explained Mr. Petry, "should prove to be a revelation to Americans who do not appreciate the remarkable progress and potential possibilities of the Canadian mining industry."

"Through the exposition producing mines in Canada will have the opportunity, from an educational and patriotic standpoint, to present the romantic history and the practical side of their discoveries and development to the citizens of New York while companies which service mines in this country will be able to exhibit their equipment."

In connection with the exposition, Mr. Petry added, there will be a dinner held at the Waldorf Astoria in New York City on Tuesday night, February 15.

Dr. Lewis W. Douglas, the New Principal of McGill

Dr. Lewis Williams Douglas, former member of the Arizona State Legislature, and also for a time on President Roosevelt's famous "brain trust", has been appointed the new principal of McGill University, succeeding Principal A. E. Morgan, who resigned last April.

nection with the appointment is that Dr. Douglas, whose father and grandfather both were born in the city of Quebec, is a grandson of the man who contributed funds to construct the newly-built Douglas Hall, McGill's university residence for men. In making the announcement of the appointment Sir Edward Beatty said:—"Dr. Douglas comes to the university with a background of achievement, intellectual and practical, which ensures his success. Added to his great ability he possesses a personality and character which assures the university of competent and

wholesome administration. I am sure his colleagues on the faculties will find in him a wise and generous counsellor and friend. McGill is fortunate, and Mr. Douglas is sure of a warm welcome when he assumes office on January 1st, 1938."
