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Miss A. Macphail

Miss Agnes Campbell Macphail, M.P., was born in Proton township, Grey County, Ontario, on March 24th, 1890, being the daughter of Dougal Macphail and Henrietta Campbell, his wife, "both Scottish," says the Parliamentary Guide, but that seems scarcely necessary in view of the names. Miss Macphail was educated at Owen Sound Collegiate Institute, Stratford Collegiate, and Stratford Normal School. She taught school for some years and then entered public life as a candidate for the House of Commons as a representative of the United Farmers of Ontario. She was first elected to the House of Commons in the general election of 1921 and was re-elected in 1925, 1926, 1930 and 1935. She has thus been a member of the House for over 16 years. She was the first woman to be elected to the House of Commons of Canada.

Miss Macphail, M.P., is very popular in her own riding and is in great demand as a speaker. This demand for her as a speaker extends much beyond the bounds of her own riding, or even her own province. In the early part of November for example she is engaged to give a series of lectures in the United States, but will return to Canada in ample time to be here for the High and Vocational School Commencement.

In the House of Commons Miss Macphail has been prominent in debates, especially in regard to social welfare matters. She took a leading part in the debates that brought on the investigation some years ago into conditions at Kingston penitentiary.

In the Parliamentary Guide, Miss Macphail's church affiliations are given as "The Re-organized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints," which is the official name for the religious group commonly known as the Mormons.

**Funeral R. Chevrier of Dome Extension**

Many Beautiful Floral Tributes. Large Attendance at Funeral of Popular Young Man

South Porcupine, Ont., Oct. 20, 1937.—(Special to The Advance)—The funeral of Robert, the 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Chevrier, of Dome Extension, took place on Tuesday afternoon from the United Church, South Porcupine, the service being conducted by Dr. Fraser.

The church was filled with sympathizing neighbours and friends of the lad, who until quite recently was a pupil at the High School, although in delicate health. His former classmates from Form I were present at the funeral and showed their feeling at the passing of a school chum who had been quite a favourite among them.

The hymn, "Safe in the Arms of Jesus," was sung before Dr. Fraser gave a most comforting address to the sorrowing family.

He spoke of youth's innocence and the knowledge that a life, no matter how short, was sent by God to earth for some good purpose, and for the parents to think of this in their grief; and to remember that their son passed on to God in his innocence.

The hymn, "Abide With Me," was sung before the casket, borne by six young men—Harry Chevrier, Fred Gerwin, Richard Chevrier, Thomas Webb, Jack Burke and Kenneth Thomas—was taken to the waiting hearse and on to Tisdale cemetery for interment.

Robert was born in Quebec but has lived most of his life here in camp and was the eldest of a large family of children of which seven boys—Carson, Sylvanus, Clarence, Billy, Harry, Gerwin, and two girls, Hazel and Olive, survive.
