

Funeral of Popular Girl at South End

Fern Helmer's Death Cause of Much Sorrow at South Porcupine

South Porcupine, Nov. 3.—(Special to The Advance)—The passing of the younger daughter of Mr. and Mrs.

George Helmer in her sixteenth year has caused great sorrow and much sympathy for the bereaved family to be expressed in town. It was known for some time that the heart condition from which she suffered might prove fatal, but she was a cheerful and uncomplaining patient, and her happy disposition and sweet character endeared her so much to her immediate family and friends that the shock is severe and very hard to bear.

To the parents, who are stricken with grief, we offer our sincerest sympathy. The knowledge, however, is theirs, that their pure and innocent little daughter, whose life although so short was a happy one, is now free from pain and suffering, and her memory a lovely thing to treasure all their days. She passed away on Saturday, and on Monday afternoon was buried in Tisdale cemetery, the funeral service held in the United Church being conducted

by Dr. Fraser. The Girl Guides, with their Captain, all in uniform, formed a guard of honour as the casket left the home, as it entered and left the church, and walked before the hearse to the outskirts of the town on the way to the cemetery. The girls were much affected as they performed this last sad ceremony for a departed comrade. The church was filled to overflowing with numbers of sympathisers, and Dr.

Fraser, after the hymn "Abide With Me" had been sung, addressed the mourners, taking as his theme, "She being dead, yet speaketh." He spoke of the Kingdom of Heaven and of Christ's setting a little child as an example for all to follow to enter the Kingdom. "A life," said Dr. Fraser, "may be very short and yet have in it such qualities that it will not be forgotten;" and "It is given even to a young child to enter into the blessed life," and he exhorted his hearers to keep the natural frankness and kindness of little children.

Mrs. A. Stanlake, in a most beautiful and feeling solo, sang "There's a Beautiful Land" before "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" was sung by the congregation.

Co-ordination Seen as New Hall Benefit

The men will be at the north east corner of the building and that for women on the west side of the building near the back.

Steel steps will lead to the cell block from the side of the building in order that prisoners will not have to be brought in the main entrance.

Main Floor
The main entrance to the main floor will lead directly into a lobby in the exact centre of the building. It will have a terrazzo concrete floor and a beamed and corniced ceiling. Offices will radiate from it on all sides.

At the front on the east side of the building will be the Mayor's office, with a waiting room. Two offices, also at the front, adjoin that of the Mayor.

Along the east side of the building will be the engineering department. It will be composed of a draughting room and a private office for the town engineer.

At the rear of the building, also on the east side, will be the assessor's office and office space for his staff.

At the west front will be a committee room for council meetings, an office for the clerk and one for the treasurer. The General town business office will be at the centre west side and at the rear will be offices for the auditor, tax collection and water works department. Entrances will lead from the lobby to

Second Floor
The public library will occupy the greater part of the west side of the second floor. At the front of the library section will be an office for the librarian and a book room. Walls and ceiling of the library will be plaster. The library extends the full length of the building.

At the north east corner will be a large room for the council chambers and court room. The magistrate will have his office at the front of the west side and there will be a detention room for prisoners and a witness room.

Also at the front of the east side will be a room to be known as the reception room. That room will be open to any service organization or club that wishes to use it. It may also be used as a court room when the council chambers is being occupied by the division court or mining court. All basement floors will be of wood. All walls in the basement, except those of the vault, which will be of brick, will be cement brick. Wash room floors will be terrazzo.

Rooms on the main and second floors will have wooden floors and plaster walls with wood trim.

The roof of the building will be flat. The larger rooms will be skylighted and enough windows are provided to have plenty of natural illumination in offices.

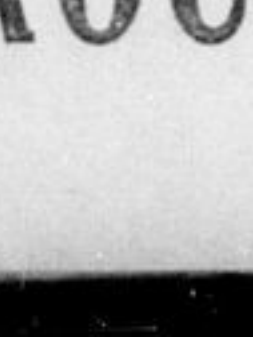
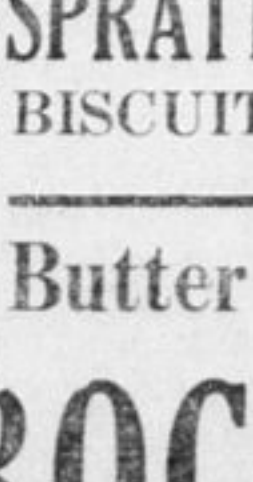
