### Warning Not to Use Unapproved 'Cures'

Deaths from "Sulphanilamide" Held up as Example of Danger.

Dr. J. W. S. McCullough, of the Health League of Canada, gives excellent advice in regard to the temptation to use unapproved "cures" for various diseases. He deems especially with "Sulphanilamide." Speaking of Sulphanilamide, "The red dye medicine," Dr. McCullough says:

This remarkable drug has got to a good start so far as free newspaper advertisement is concerned. Undoubtedly it is a valuable means of treatment but it cannot safely be used under all conditions.

The greatest danger in the use of "Red Dye" is in its combinations with other drugs, such as Epsom salts and some of the coal tar derivatives. So far, soda bicarbonate appears to be a safe vehicle for the drug.

The tragic loss of nearly 50 lives in the United States from one of these combinations indicates what care should be taken in the use of new-

## Timmins Stamp Club Column

### New Stamps Issued by U.S.S.R. Commemorate Daring Trans-Polar Flights

In commemoration of the conquest of the North Pole by the Soviet Union, the Postal Administration of the U.S.S.R. has announced a new series of airmail stamps with the values 10c, 20c, 40c and 50c, that will appear sometime during September or October. The design of the first two stamps shows four airplanes in flight from Moscow to the North Pole, their route being traced on a map in the background. The last two stamps symbolize the arrival at the Pole itself, and show the same four airplanes together with the banner of the Soviet Union.

Another series of airmail stamps is also in preparation and will be issued sometime in November. It commemorates the remarkable non-stop flight over the North Pole from Russia to the United States that was successfully carried out early this summer. The values of this series are 10c, 20c, 40c and 50c; and the symbolic design includes the portraits of the three Russian fliers, Tchkalov, Baidukov and Beliakov. Newspaper readers will recall that a later trans-polar flight under the leadership of the Soviet Lindbergh, S. A. Levanevsky, (portrayed on one of the 1935 Soviet airmail issues) was forced down somewhere on the frozen ice-fields of the Arctic and has not been



heard from since last August. These interesting stamps will serve to remind the world at large of the remarkable progress made by the U.S.S.R. in recent years in opening up the Arctic Circle to commerce. Under the leadership of Prof. Ctto T. Schmidt (also pictured in the 1935 airmail issue) an army of 40,000 men is colonizing and developing a vast region that was formerly used only as a place of exile for dangerous political offenders. Ice-breakers have made it possible for freighters to skirt the entire coast of Northern Siberia from east to west; and the Soviet government claims that a permanent base camp has actually been established at the Pole itself.



The dignity of the Bagpipes

"Mr. Horace Belisha, the Secretary of State for War, having just decided that he cannot agree to any alteration in the regulations which prevent pipers in the army from rising higher than the rank of sergeant, this pipers' organization, with the support of Highland M.F.'s, clan chiefs, and Highland societies in London, is determined to insist upon the Army Council taking up the whole question of piping in the army, the status and potential ranks of pipers, and the significance of pipe music in Scottish regiments.

"I am told that the English commanding officer of one Scottish regiment regards the pipe band of his unit as one of the best recruiting and disciplinary factors in his command."

"Such influential clan chiefs as the Mackintoshes of Mackintosh hold very strong views on the subject of pipe majors having to give up their rank as pipers if they wish to become ser-

### More Recognition Sought for Pipers

Old Country Society Seek  
Better Official Appreciation  
for the Bagpipes.

majors or attain any other warrant officer rank.

The ancient Highland Society of London, of which the Duke of Atholl is one of the chief office-bearers, as an integral part of their social organization are prepared to have discussions on the whole question of pipers' status in the army and to pass resolutions in support of the case for opening the higher ranks of the army to exponents of the bagpipes.

#### An Ancient Art

The Scottish Piping Society considers that even commission rank should be open to pipers in the ranks. Since its foundation over five years ago the society has steadily increased its membership and influence, and has manifestly improved the standard of playing among London pipers.

"Mr. Lewis F. Beaton, the founder and president, who was a pipe-major during the war period in the 7th Cameronians, has instituted inquiries into the army position, and visited recently one of the training centres near London of the Royal Air Force to find to his surprise that the bagpipes are included in several band units of the services.

"The attitude of the Legion should be the general attitude. There will be no such general agreement, however, as to the idea of discontinuing the 'piping in of the Haggis' at Burns suppers and similar events. That would mean almost a discontinuance of the events, as the 'piping' is always one of their most pleasing and heart-stirring features.
