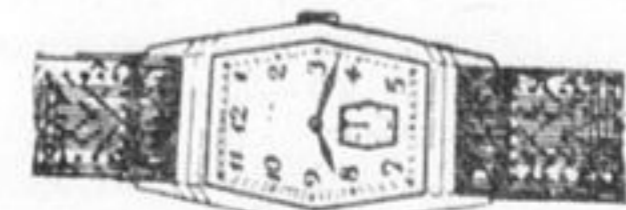

Lucky Tokens Taken for Nazi Propaganda

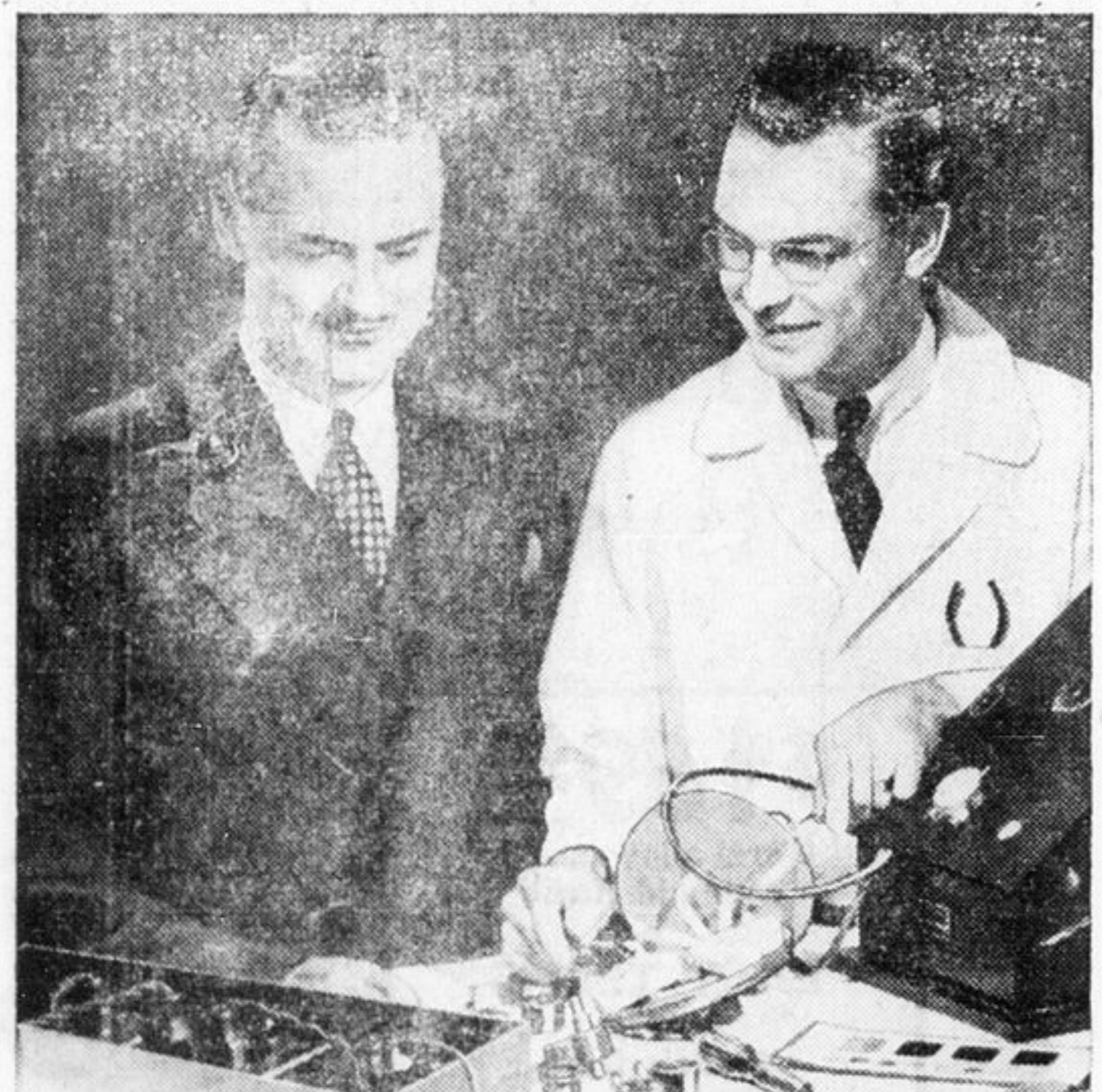
Looks as if Some Jokers Pulled the Mayor's Leg.

Recently Mr. Wilson, of the Riverside pavilion, brought a special orchestra to town for the pleasure of his dance patrons. And the patrons were pleased. One of the extra touches that particularly pleased the crowd was the fact that lucky coin tokens were given away as souvenirs. These lucky coin tokens had all the popular emblems of good luck engraved upon them. On one side of the coin, for example, there was an engraving of an Oriental magician gazing into a crystal. Below the design there was a picture of an eye with the words, "The all-seeing eye guards you from evil." On the other side of the coin token were the well-known emblems of good luck—the horseshoe, the rabbit's foot, the elephant, the swastika, the four-leaved clover, the wishbone, the heart and the key—good luck will accompany the bearer."

Now, it is not likely that Mr. Wilson really believed that the tokens would actually create luck for the unlucky, but he felt that the token at least was harmless and a pleasant gesture of goodwill. Few people are sure that a Christmas or New Year's card will force good luck, long life, prosperity or happiness. Still people keep on sending out cards. At least it is a pleasing and a kindly gesture. No doubt that is the way Mr. Wilson felt about the lucky tokens. Accordingly, he was much surprised when the mayor called him up on the phone to say that complaints had been made that the lucky tokens

were just Nazi propaganda. Mr. Wilson's reply was that he was certainly not in the Nazi propaganda business, and he felt sure that the man responsible for the distribution of the lucky tokens—the orchestra leader—was equally innocent of anything like that. The orchestra leader was a Jewish gentleman, and had brought the tokens along for distribution as a novelty and a mark of good-will. Certainly he would not be in any Nazi propaganda work. Moreover, the tokens on their own part disproved any propaganda. There were clearly nothing more than they pretended to be—just good luck tokens. It is true they had swastika crosses on them, but they had all the other lucky signs as well. The swastika was not a Nazi sign in this case but a good luck emblem. There was no more Nazi propaganda about a token with a swastika sign on it than there is to the name Swastika on the T. & N. O. station near Kirkland Lake. The station was named long before the Nazi were in existence, and the swastika has been the "lucky cross" for centuries before Hitler saw the light of day. The Advance does not know whether the mayor was satisfied or not with Mr. Wilson's explanation, but surely there is no room for any doubt in the matter. It looks as if some joker pulled the mayor's leg in this matter.

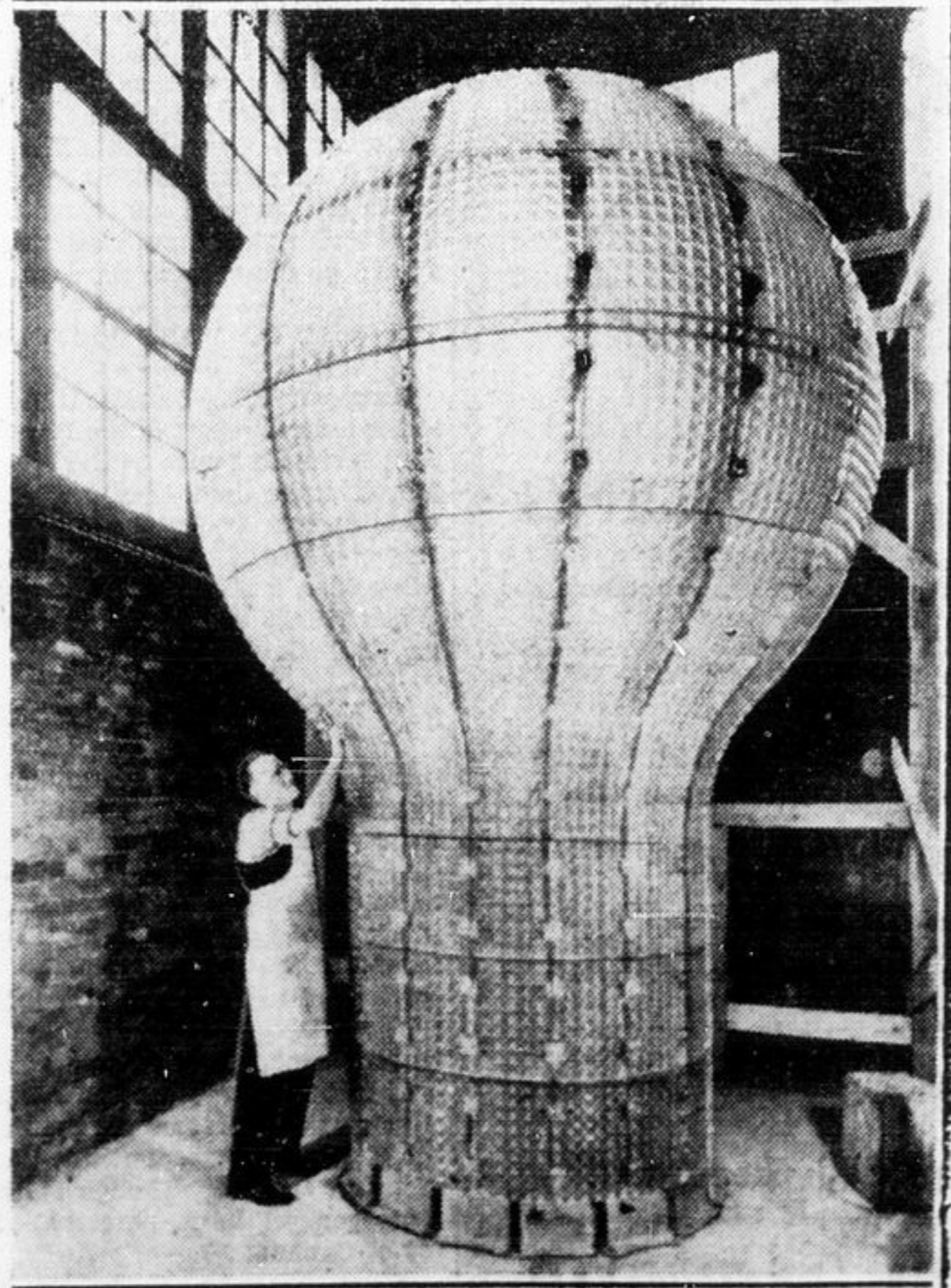

CHILDREN love to roam and play in forbidden places. Here, danger may lie unsuspected especially where explosives have been used and blasting caps left carelessly around. The brightness of the aluminum or copper caps attract children's attention. They will pick them up, play with them or pick

cap into a fire in which case the caps would explode and the flying fragments may cause injury to the child or others in close vicinity.

Protect the children by proper supervision, see that each blaster accounts daily for caps taken out of storage. When a job is finished recheck and see that the blasting caps are not left carelessly lying around, but that they are returned to be properly stored away.
