

Timmins Curlers Expect Membership of Over 200

Icemake From Haileybury Making Ready for Flooding

Expect to Hold Tournament Before Christmas With Turkeys as Prizes. Local Club Will Defend Englehart Cup Won Last Year at Noranda. Other Interesting Notes About Curling

With every indication that the membership will go over the 200 mark, the Timmins Curling Club are looking forward to one of the biggest seasons in their history.

Icemaker Silas Cook, of Haileybury, arrived in Timmins for the season on Sunday and is rapidly getting the rink in readiness for flooding, which will start about the end of the week provided the weather is favourable.

While it is likely that a tournament will be held before Christmas with turkeys as prizes, games in the regular draw for the season will not start before January 3.

This year the Timmins club will have to defend their possession of the Englehart Cup, which they won at Noranda last year. The Dome team, winners of the T. & N. O. Cup last season will also be called on to defend the silverware against district rinks.

Mines Hockey Will Start Season Soon

Arrangements Regarding Entry of Dome Seniors and Hollinger Jrs. Not Complete.

With many details yet to be worked out, plans for the Porcupine Mines Hockey League season are progressing as rapidly as possible. December 12 will likely be the opening date.

Intermediate teams have been entered by Pamour, Coniour, McIntyre and Buffalo-Ankerite mines, while Dome will have a senior rating with Hollinger operating a Junior "A" team. It was at first suggested that the Hollinger Juniors and Dome both operate in the same league with the Intermediate teams but on account of regulations in force, a junior team would forfeit its rating through participation with teams of more advanced calibre. It has been suggested that the Hollinger club will play home and home games with South Porcupine while if the Dome team play in the local mines circuit their games may be considered exhibition fixtures having no bearing on the league standing. It is also considered probable that in addition to league exhibition games that Dome will play throughout the season with Kirkland Lake.

Langdon, Timmins, president of the Northern Ontario Boards of Trade, that the annual meeting be held at the same time as the northern bonspiel at Kirkland Lake. The resolution also urged "close, active co-operation" between the various boards in the best interests of Northern Ontario.

There wasn't a quorum at the Kirkland Lake meeting last week and therefore there was no legal session.

Entries from Six Teams Received at Meeting Held in Schumacher High School Wednesday Night. Games to be Played Three Times Per Week.

Entries from six teams were received at a meeting of the Porcupine District Basketball Association held in Schumacher high school last night. While the schedule for the season has not been completed it is planned to have the first game on December 6.

The schedule when drawn up will be in two sections, the first section to finish about the third week in January and the second about the middle of March. Games will be played on Tuesdays in South Porcupine, Wednesdays in Schumacher and Fridays in Timmins.
