### Death of Worker on Roads Accidental

Victor Poulin Buried by Blast Near Earlton.

Earlton, Ont., Dec. 8.—(Special)—A verdict of "accidental death" was returned here yesterday to Coroner Dr. W. C. Arnold of Haileybury, by the inquest jury which probed a fatality yesterday morning at the crushing plant Schumacher; Miss A. G. Doherty; Dome Olson, H. D. Ostrosser; Wm. Oxley, of the MacNamara Construction Company, two miles north of Earlton on the main road and in which Victor Poulin. young road worker employed there since last September, was buried under a

> a blast there. His neck was broken. Poulin, the jury learned, had assisted in final preparations for the blast, to be fired by the day shift after night vorkers had made preliminary arrange ments. Harry Green, shift foreman, and Fred Clark, electrician, swore they were last to leave the pit, and evidence was given customary warning signals were called and men posted at different points to prevent approach to the scene of the blast. The 21-year-old victim, whose home is near Englehart had been seen a half hour before the blast, but no one had observed him enter the pit.

> The body was not recovered unti last evening, 11 hours after the accident. Witnesses said Poulin was in good health. He was not missed until some time after the blast and when a check-up failed to Jocate him, the steam shovel started excavating the rock blasted in a charge of 1,800 pounds of dynamite, and eventually a hand protruding gave first intimation of the man's fate.
